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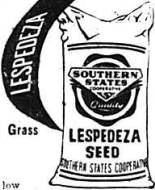

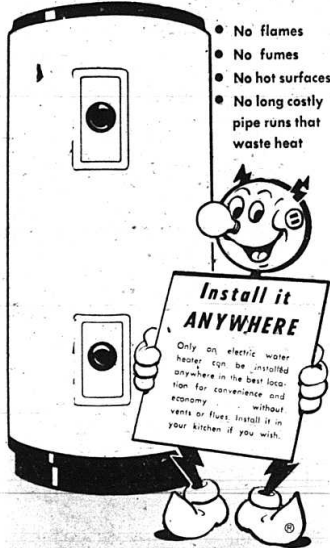

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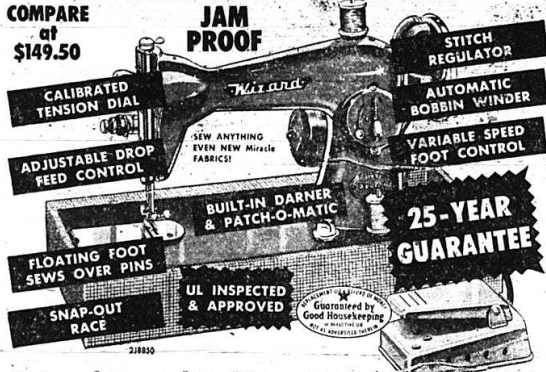

Get More Meat For Your Money
When you buy meat, what percentage of your purchase is edible meat and how much is bone, fat or gristle?
That is a question for every thrifty housewife to consider. Says Mrs. Letty Jasper, UK marketing specialist, for the cut of meat that is lowest in price might actually be very expensive when the percentage of lean meat is concerned.
Take, for example, some of the popular cuts of pork, suggests Mrs. Jasper, and their average percentage of lean meat as determined by meat authorities. Whole ham is 63 percent lean meat; spare ribs, 59 percent; picnic "ham," 61 percent; and Boston butt or shoulder, 84 percent. Fat, skin, bone and gristle made up the remainder of these cuts.
To find the cost of the lean meat of any of these cuts, divide the retail price per pound by the percentage of lean meat that particular cut yields as given above.
For instance, says Mrs. Jasper, let's say that whole hams retail at 60 cents per pound. The cost of the lean meat of ham is found by dividing the cost per pound, (60 cents) by 63, giving 95 cents as the actual cost of the lean meat of ham. The ham bone and fat are not regarded as lost values by most housewives, as the former can be used in soups and the latter with vegetables.
Spare ribs require more careful buying than ham, as the percentage of bone runs higher than in any other pork cut, up to 40 percent being rated as a loss in bone.
If the retail price on spare ribs is 50 cents per pound, divide that amount by 59 (the percentage of lean meat) giving 91 cents as the actual cost per pound of the edible portion. In-as-much as a pound of spare ribs makes only two servings, it is plain to see this is an expensive cut of meat.

A picnic "ham" is really a shoulder cut of pork. At 40 cents a pound, the cost of the lean meat is learned by dividing 40 cents by 61, making the cost of the lean meat 65 cents per pound, considerably less than the real ham cut. Again the ham bone may be used with dried vegetables or in soup; hence, a picnic ham is rated as a good buy.
One of the most economical cuts of pork is the Boston butt, or the bagged, rolled shoulder. If it is priced at 61 cents per pound, divide that amount by 54 (the percentage of lean) to find that the cost of the lean portion is 72 cents per pound for three to four servings.

## Rockcastle's 3 Teams Get Ready For Basketball Tournament

### Sales For County Factory Site Stock Reach \$16,000, R. H. Hamm Tells Group

A total of \$16,625 in stock to purchase a factory site in Rockcastle County, has been subscribed for to date, according to an announcement by R. H. Hamm, who is acting in behalf of the Rockcastle County Development Corporation.

He reported several stocks, known sold, have not been turned in and the figure will reach about \$18,000 to \$20,000 when subscriptions are turned in.

Mr. Hamm reported the new figure at a meeting of about 90 persons Monday night, at the Mt. Vernon City Hall and Fire Station.

He said, "This is a small start when you realize that, if we are to obtain a factory, we must have a building which is estimated to cost about \$80,000." The most hopeful note made by Mr. Hamm was, "We could have a factory move into the county by the time we got a building ready, if we only had enough money subscribed to begin a building."

A factory in Monticello has been visited by R. H. Hamm, Floyd Owens and Charles Eddie Hurt. It produces shirts, army fatigue caps and light weight jackets. If that factory should come here, it would require a building with between 25,000 and 30,000 square feet. This is 11,000 feet larger than the Windstead building, located in Mt. Vernon.

The Brodhead skating rink has been considered as a possible site. (Continued on page 4)

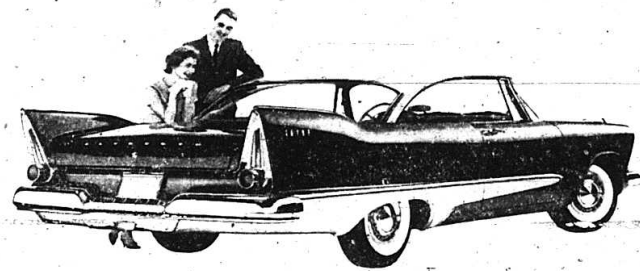

# Rockcastle County Development Corporation

The Rockcastle County Development Corporation was incorporated by the presidents of the Farm Bureau, the Mt. Vernon Lions Club, the Rockcastle Chamber of Commerce, the Rockcastle Development Association, and the Rockcastle Junior Chamber of Commerce.

It is incorporated in the amount of \$30,000.00, which means that when that amount is subscribed for, or promised, on certain legal forms that a Board of Directors can be formed and the corporation may legally do business.

There are 1200 shares of stock priced at \$25.00 each. When the full amount of \$30,000.00 is subscribed, a stock holders meeting will be called and a board of ten directors will be elected. Each share of stock will have one vote for each of these directors or may vote all ten votes for one director.

If a person has subscribed for more than one share of stock he will vote 10 votes for each share he will own. For instance, if he has 10 shares he may vote 10 times for each director or 100 votes for any one director. When you elect the directors they are legally empowered to do business with any industry who may wish to establish a plant here. Under the articles of incorporation they may buy land, build or buy buildings or lease either land or buildings. It is anticipated that you would elect directors who would not spend or even ask for the money which you have subscribed until they had a lease or purchase agreement with an industry.

Since this organization was proposed there

have been three companies contacted concerning Rockcastle as a possible industrial site and all three have expressed interest in the locality. However, all these prospects and State Economic Development Board have told us that they or no other industry will settle here unless they have assurance that this county will be now, and in the future, friendly to their enterprise. All three suggested that the only way they could be sure of this continued friendliness and cooperation would be for many of the people in the area to be financially interested in their enterprise. This is possible at no loss to the people of the area if our people own land and - or buildings occupied by the industry and rented to the industry. This is the reason for the stock subscription program, which will result in wide ownership of some land or building to be rented to an industry.

The location of the factory would be left to the choosing of the industry, not to the directors of the corporation just so it would be in Rockcastle County.

Since the formation of the Rockcastle County Development Corporation there have been two public meetings at which time various members of the organization have explained the program to the folks attending. There have been many questions asked at these meetings, which may be also in the minds of people who were not able to attend. These questions and the answers are included below.

**(1) WHY DO WE NEED INDUSTRY IN OUR COUNTY?**

**ANSWER:** In addition to the obvious reason of employing more of our local people and therefore putting many thousands of dollars more money in circulation here, the following are some of the reasons expressed at one or both of the public meetings (1) Keep more of our young people from having to go a long way from home to find work (2) According to the United States Chamber of Commerce figures we may expect the following benefits for every 100 new factory workers in our area. This is learned on past experience all over the country. We could expect 296 new citizens or old citizens who might wish to return to their old homes for work. There would likely be 112 more new homes in the county; \$596,000.00 more in personal income; 174 more workers in other lines than the factory itself; 107 more cars; four more retail stores, and \$360,000.00 more annual retail business. This is for an industry employing only 100 people. Each of the prospects contacted have indicated they would likely employ at least 200 persons which would double the above mentioned benefits to our county.

**(2) WHAT IS A STOCK SUBSCRIPTION?**

**ANSWER:** It is a promise, signed and legally binding to buy stock when called for by the board of directors of a corporation.

**(3) WHY IS A STOCK SUBSCRIPTION NECESSARY IN THIS CASE?**

**ANSWER:** It is a means of showing an industrial prospect that we are willing to invest money in their enterprise, without actually having to put up this money until a firm is ready to sign a lease or rent the property.

**(4) WHEN WILL WE BE CALLED UPON TO PUT UP THE MONEY WHICH WE HAVE PROMISED BY SIGNING STOCK SUBSCRIPTIONS?**

**ANSWER:** The legal answer to this is that it may be called for at any time the board of directors so decides. However, the committee which has organized this venture suggests that at the stock holders meeting when members of the board of directors are elected, you vote only for nominees who pledge that no money will be called for until an agreement can be entered into with a company who will operate a factory here.

**(5) IS THIS ATTEMPT TO LOCATE AN INDUSTRY IN ANY ONE OF OUR THREE TOWNS OR IN ANY SPECIFIC SPOT OF THE COUNTY?**

**ANSWER:** No, the money is subscribed to show our county wide interest. The industry's choice of the location will decide where in the county the factory will be located.

**(6) IF A FACTORY IS LOCATED IN ANY ONE OF THE TOWNS IN THE COUNTY, DOES THAT MEAN ALL THE WORKERS WOULD BE HIRED FROM THAT TOWN?**

**ANSWER:** No, there are not enough people in any one town to supply enough labor, therefore workers would have to come from all over the county.

**(7) IF I SUBSCRIBE FOR \$100.00 AND THE FACTORY LOCATES IN THE COUNTY, WOULD I EVER GET MY MONEY BACK?**

**ANSWER:** Yes, your money will be used to buy or build a building, stockholders would be repaid as rent is received, or if building is sold, your money would be returned.

**(8) WHY WON'T A FACTORY MOVE IN WITHOUT US PUTTING UP THIS MONEY?**

**ANSWER:** An industry wants to know if the people want the factory to move in their county, they feel that if a large group of people own shares in this development corporation, then the factory can be assured of good cooperation from the people.

**(9) I HAVE ALREADY SIGNED UP FOR TWO SHARES, CAN I SIGN UP FOR MORE?**

**ANSWER:** Yes, if you sign up before March 10.

**(10) IS THERE ANY LIMIT TO THE NUMBER OF SHARES I CAN BUY?**

**ANSWER:** No.

**(11) WHERE CAN I SIGN UP FOR SHARES?**

**ANSWER:** The following are a few of the business places in the county that have them: Mt. Vernon Locker Plant; Bailey's Jewelry; Sinclair Refining Co.; Bank of Mt. Vernon; Dr. John D. Henderson's office; Rockcastle County Baptist Hospital; Watkins Florist; Mt. Vernon Sign Office; Clarence Carter's Office; Mt. Vernon Hotel. In Brodhead some of the following: Maggard Sundry Store; Eddie Hurt, John Sowder, Jack-Owens, Les Elder, Bradley Bros. Service Station, In Livingston: Dr. Webb's office, Calvin Webb, Mack Bales. In County: Hiatt and Parsons at Wildie; Earl Turner at Pine Hill; and others who have picked up stock subscriptions or you may mail in the coupon in this signal and you will be contacted, or a stock subscription will be mailed to you.

**(12) HOW MAY WE BE SURE THAT OUR DIRECTORS WILL DEAL FAIRLY WITH US AND CARRY OUT OUR PROGRAM IN THE CORPORATION?**

**ANSWER:** It is believed that since the stock holders are composed of many hundreds of Rockcastle County people, they will assure themselves by their vote for directors that only men who are honest and interested in our county's welfare will be elected directors of the corporation.

**(13) I HAVE BEEN TOLD THAT IT COSTS A LOT MORE THAN \$30,000.00 TO PUT UP A BUILDING FOR A FACTORY. WHY HAS THIS AMOUNT BEEN SET AS A GOAL?**

**ANSWER:** The laws of our state under which the corporation was set up require that some amount be decided on and enumerated in the Charter. None of us can know how much will be needed. The amount will be determined by the size of the factory which locates here. One person at the last meeting suggested that he hoped we would need two or three times this amount for it would mean that much more employment and additional wealth to the county.

The amount of \$30,000.00 is approximately \$2 for each man, woman and child in the county and it was felt that amount would be enough to at least show county wide interest. If a really big factory comes here; this amount of interest would show them that we could raise what ever amount might be necessary.

There will be another public meeting on March 10 at the Courthouse at 7 p. m. At that time bring in all the subscriptions which you have not already turned in or bring to the meeting any person who might decide at that time to subscribe for shares in the corporation. If you sign or interest anyone else in signing a subscription, before that time and can come to Mt. Vernon, please bring the subscription to Mr. R. H. Hamm at the Sinclair Refining Co., for he is expecting a visit from one of the industrial prospects before the next meeting and would like to show this man how interested we, in Rockcastle County are in his project.

### Consider Shade Trees In Home Landscaping

Give shade trees first consideration when you think of landscaping your new home or the present one. Trees not only increase the value of your property, but they make it more attractive and inviting. They are a protection against the winds of winter and the hot sun of summer.

Trees are the real foundation plants for the home although many new home owners think first of a foundation planting of shrubs. Trees are the most permanent and also the most prominent feature in the completed landscaping, while shrubs, evergreens and flowers are secondary. However, one should keep in mind that the best trees are not the fast growing kind, hence if planted this spring, they can be growing while other landscape work is being done. Some trees that make good shade trees are: sugar maple, red maple, Norway maple, pin oak.

### New Natural Wood Finish Developed For House Siding

An practical finish that retains the rich natural beauty of wooden house siding has been developed, lasting for about four years, or as long as the average paint job.

Heretofore, it has been necessary to treat houses every year to keep them from rotting. The new finish can be made in several colors, such as cedar, or dark or light red wood.

Only a single application is recommended, says James A. Newman, UK Extension specialist in forestry, as two coats may cause alternate glossy and dull spots. On a smooth surface, a gallon will cover 400 to 500 square feet on an unplanned surface, half that area.

To obtain the formula, write to the Forest Products Laboratory, Madison, Wisconsin, asking for Report 2096, "Natural Finish," October, 1957.

Rockcastle Needy Receive \$367,835

During 1957, a total of \$367,835 went to residents of Rockcastle County in public assistance payments, according to a year-end report released by Vevo E. Barnes, commissioner, Department of Economic Security.

Four types of aid are administered by the Department's Division of Public Assistance: Old age assistance, aid to dependent children, aid to the needy blind, and aid to partially and totally disabled persons. Total 1957 payments in Rockcastle County were distributed among the following recipients as follows: \$200,575 to aged people; \$145,245 to dependent children; and \$7,887 to the needy blind; and \$14,122 to partially and totally disabled persons.

Old age assistance payments total \$27,147,089, for the year, he said. Aid to dependent children grants totaled \$16,609,389; aid to the needy blind, \$1,556,100; and aid to the disabled, \$1,836,107.

**Farm Bureau Favors Tobacco Program**

"Both the American Farm Bureau and the Kentucky Farm Bureau Federation are supporting the 90 percent support and acreage control program for tobacco," according to Jack Welch, Owenton, first vice-president of the Kentucky Farm Bureau and chairman of its Tobacco Committee.

"In spite of some newspaper stories that have created some misunderstanding," says Welch, "Farm Bureau at all levels is supporting out tobacco program. This includes American Farm Bureau president Charles B. Shuman, who spoke to some 65 county Farm Bureau presidents in Louisville, Feb. 12."

"This means," continues the statement by Welch, "that Farm Bureau does not endorse the recommendations of Secretary of Agriculture Ezra Tatt Benson and the Eisenhower Administration in calling for a flexible price support program for tobacco."

In a statement released in Louisville, Feb. 17, Charles B. Shuman, president of the national Farm Bureau organization, said that the AFBF has supported the present tobacco program providing for 90 percent price supports because of the special situation existing with regard to production and marketing of tobacco and because of the seeming willingness of producers to adjust the acreage to effective market demands.

"The American Farm Bureau," continues the Shuman statement, "is giving constant re-

view and consideration of current price support and adjustment programs in an effort to find solutions designed to accomplish our objective of high per family, net income. We hope that the tobacco producers in Kentucky and other states will continue to give study to the production and marketing of tobacco, and will make recommendations for changes in the program designed to facilitate the maximum marketing and utilization of tobacco."
