Insects Of Tobacco Beds

At least four pests are snafus or garden snails, as they are sometimes called, may be present in the tobacco bed. These include garden slugs and cutworms, flea beetles, cut-metaldehyde baits applied at

the rate of two pounds per 100 square yards. At times cutworms may be a problem in tobacco plant beds. Cutworms generally feed late in the evening and at night and hide throughout the day. Most cutworms feed on the portion of the plant near the surface of the soil and sometimes cut off the stems. These insects can be controlled effectively with 10 percent DDT dust applied at the rate of one ounce per 100 square yards or a DDT spray of one pound of 50 percent wettable powder in 50 gallons of water applied at the rate of 4 or 5 gallons per 100 square yards. Against cutworms the insecticide should be applied on the ground as well as on the plants.

Flea beetles are small, generally dark, insects that hop much like a flea, hence their name. These insects may attack tobacco seedlings, and if the beds are not quickly and effectively treated, severe damage may result. DDT is the recommended insecticide for this purpose. DDT is a 10 percent

dust may be applied at the rate of one pound per 100 square yards or two pounds of 50 percent wettable powder dispersed in 50 gallons of water may be applied at the rate of 5 gallons per 100 square yards. Applications of DDT should be applied as needed and can be repeated in six to eight days if necessary. It is important to make an application of DDT just before transplanting.

Serious damage may be caused by grubworms in tobacco plant beds by their rather large size and the peculiar manner in which they move. The grubs are thick-bodied and of an off-white color. They move about by crawling on their backs rather than on their legs.

Grubworms may be satisfactorily controlled in tobacco plant beds by using a 1 percent Parathion dust applied at the rate of two pounds per 100 square yards. Parathion dust should be applied on the ground through the dry bed cover at the first sign of infestation.

Planting Strawberries
Most folks seem to be waiting for high prices before they plant more strawberry plants. Is this good judgment?

It has been talked time and again that the fellow that stays on an even keel is the one that comes out winner. Set strawberry plants as early as the ground can be worked in March or early April.

Tennessee Beauty is the most popular variety in Kentucky commercial plantings followed by an equal demand for Blakemore or Pocahontas. It takes about 4,500 Tennessee Beauty or Pocahontas plants and 4,000 Blakemore plants per acre. Make your plans to plant early and get good plants.

Planting Trees, Shrubs and Evergreens
March is the time to begin setting trees, shrubs and evergreens. In fact, the sooner these plants are set in the spring, the

better, however, the soil must be given time to dry some or it will be impossible to do a good job of planting.

The way plants are set means much in the starting and future life of the plant. There are four main points to always keep in mind in setting woody plants. (1) The hole must be dug large enough around and deep enough to enable the roots of the plants to be sprigged out in a natural position.

(2) If the soil removed from the hole is poor, it should be discarded and good, fresh soil from a field or vegetable garden brought in to use for planting.

(3) Trees and shrubs should never be planted with the roots wound in a bunch or twisted around the stem of the plant. Evergreens will have a ball of earth around the roots when obtained from the nursery, and this ball should be handled carefully so it will not be broken. Soil should always be tamped firmly around the roots to bring it in contact with the roots and eliminate air pockets. (4) Each plant should be watered liberally at planting time.

Among the small trees that do well under Kentucky conditions are the American hornbeam, redbud, flowering dogwood, flowering crabs, and Washington thorn. Good trees of medium height are southern magnolia, green ash, sour gum, holly, white pine and yellow-wood.

Sugar maple, sweet gum, Norway maple, hackberry, beech, pin oak, Norway spruce, Austrian pine, hemlock and ginkgo are a few of the large trees that do well under our conditions. When these large trees are used, plant them in a location where they can have sufficient space to grow.

It is better to have a few selected trees, properly located and planted, than to have a

large number of trees indiscriminately selected and located.

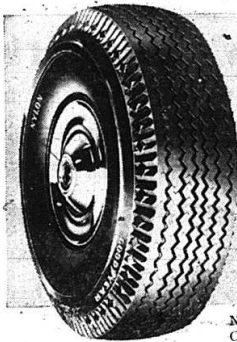

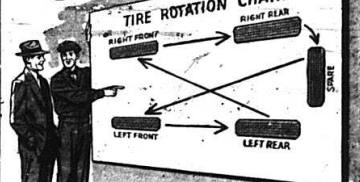

The Signal Says--

ONCE AGAIN, A "TIME" PROBLEM

If the Kentucky State Senate has its way, there will be little or no confusion this year on the matter of "fast" or "slow" time. Though everyone won't be pleased, at least everyone will know what time it is.

The senate has passed and sent to Gov. A. B. Chandler a bill making Daylight Saving Time (fast time) illegal in Kentucky and establishing the time as that designated by the Time Zones in Kentucky, which are Central Standard Time and Eastern Standard Time. The bill carries fines and penalties on persons and cities for observing "fast" time. To date, the bill has been on the Governor's desk and he has not signed it. If he does not sign it, the bill will die where it lies.

Various polls have been taken since the bill came into the news. One poll shows Fayette County readers of the Lexington Herald-Leader favor "fast" time by two to one. Other polls are being taken and, generally, "fast" time is favored. Last year a poll of Mt. Vernon citizens showed "fast" time was desired four to one.

Looking back on last year's observance of "fast" time in Rockcastle, we do not see too much confusion as a result of Mt. Vernon and Livingston being on "fast" time and Brodhead and the county on "slow" time. After a few days, not many minded too greatly.

As last year, we do not believe it is a matter of whether residents "like" or "dislike" fast time. It is a matter of uniformity—that is, being the same as neighboring cities, or having everyone on the same time.

Also as we said last year, we prefer "slow" time, but the bill dies on the Governor's desk, then again this year we should observe "fast" time, because Lexington, Louisville, Stanford, Danville, Richmond, Berea and London are going to observe it. At the moment it looks as if the day is coming when a time uniformity may have to be established by law since some towns are on "slow" time all the year, some on "fast" time all the year, other on "slow" time part of the year and others on "fast" time part of the year.

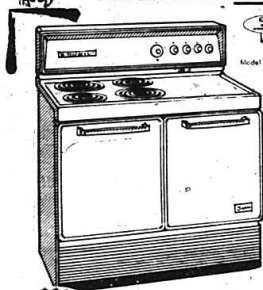

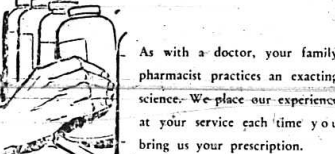
