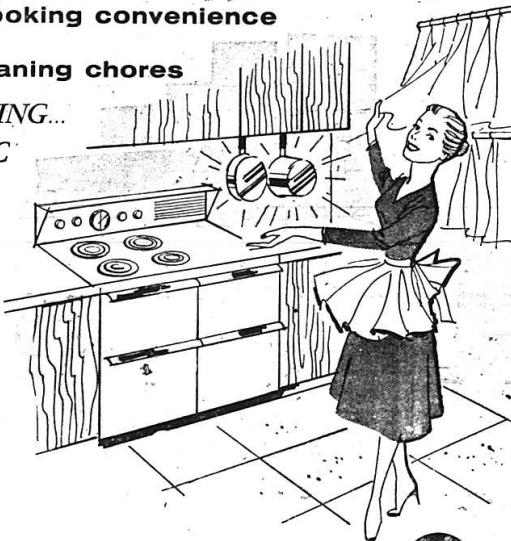

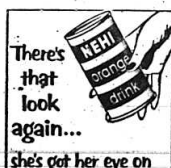

BRUCELLOSIS PROGRAM
The following letter was received this week by Mr. John Houston, President Rockcastle County Livestock Improvement Association from Dr. Robert H. Singer, D. V. M. Acting State Veterinarian. Dear Mr. Houston: I wish to acknowledge receipt of petitions which you submitted from Rockcastle County for the Kentucky Area Brucellosis Control Program. We have found the petitions to be in order and wish to inform you that Rockcastle County will be declared under the Area Brucellosis Program within a reason-



able time after July 1, 1958. I will contact you about 30 days prior to the date of declaration and would like to meet with you during that time in order to go over the plans for the execution of the Area Brucellosis Program in Rockcastle County. I shall be looking forward to working with you, the Rockcastle County Brucellosis Committee, and the cattle owners of Rockcastle County in the near future.

All persons over twenty years of age are urged to make sure they do not have tuberculosis by having a chest x-ray. The service is being made available through the cooperation of the Kentucky State Department of health, the Rockcastle County Health Department and the Kentucky Tuberculosis Association.

Nearly three-fourths of all cases of tuberculosis in Kentucky are being discovered through these mass x-ray survey programs. The units tour throughout the state and approximately 300,000 persons get chest x-rays annually under the program.



Persons under twenty years are x-rayed only if they have had a tuberculosis skin test or upon a physician's referral. The tuberculosis case rate among this younger group is quite low. All teachers and food handlers are required to have an x-ray made.

Voting Machine Salesman Talks With Fiscal Court

Rockcastle County could have voting machines which would be the usual two or three days and save money too, according to Ollie Montgomery, former State Senator.

Mr. Montgomery visited County officials, Thursday, and explained that voting machines could be rented for 10 years for almost half of the usual election cost and at the end of ten years the machines would belong to the county.

The county spends about \$4,000 yearly for election officials and ballots. The cost of renting voting machines would be around \$2100. This would mean that the county would break about even financially for ten years and at the end of that time it would save something over \$2,000, Senator Montgomery reported.

Mr. Montgomery, who now resides at Frankfort, will bring a voting machine to the Courthouse April 26. The machine will stay about a week. Everyone is invited to inspect it.

May 8, the Fiscal Court will meet and vote on whether or not they favor purchasing voting machines.

Clarence Carter, County Clerk, said, "I would be able to have election results in an hour and a half. He also said that perhaps some election precincts would be combined. Where we now have 30 precincts we would only need 13, he declared.

Rocky Bond had 13 voters last year and Mullins Station had 28. The cost to the county is the same whether the precinct has 13 or the limit, which is 300.

Mr. Carter said that voting machines as many as 700 can vote in one precinct. A bill is now before the State Legislature to allow \$40 per precinct where \$20 is now allowed if they are voting machines.

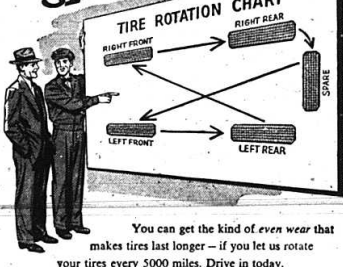

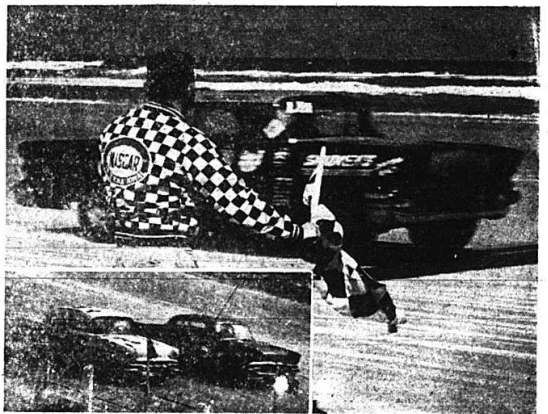

Fifty years later, the National Wildlife Federation is carrying out this year's Wildlife Week, March 16 - 22. The theme is: "Protect Our Public Lands."
More than one-fourth of our country's area is held in trust by local, state and federal governments.

Some of the public lands resources are renewable. There includes trees, game and fish, and grasses. The non-renewable resources are oil, gas and minerals of all kinds.

With adequate protection the renewable resources of the public lands can be maintained at a level to meet the demands of our growing population. The value of natural resources can be typified by the 181.8 million acres of National Forests. These public lands with their tree covered watersheds supply water for 14 million acres of irrigation, 600 power developments and 1,800 towns and cities. The National Forests have contributed to our well-being through all kinds of outdoor recreation. Last year over 400 million recreational visits were made to our forests, parks and wildlife areas.
