The 25th annual district meeting to be conducted jointly by the Kentucky Federation of Homemakers and the Home Economics Extension Service of the University of Kentucky is scheduled for District 6B at Harlan, Kentucky, April 28th at 9:00 (C. S. T.) at the Harlan Baptist Church.

The all-day meeting is open to anyone who wishes to attend. The theme for the day will be "Home Guided Missile."

Of particular interest will be an address by Mrs. R. P. Matheis of Covington, Kentucky, 1957 delegate to the triennial meeting of the Associated Country Women of the World in Ceylon. She will illustrate her talk with colored slides, including her visits in countries where the United States is giving technical and financial assistance.

(Since 1936, when the Federation joined the ADWW, the Kentucky homemakers organization has sent a delegate to each of the triennial world meetings.)

Miss Viola Hansen, chairman of the university's home economics Extension Committee, will also speak. She has chosen for her subject, "Keeping Open the Windows of Our Minds." Mrs. Virgil Grayson, district president of the Federation, will discuss "The Space-age Homemaker," at the first six meetings of the series.

County Magistrates Set \$60 Monthly Salary

Robert Madden Fined, School Law Violation

Robert Madden became the sixth parent in the last six weeks to be fined for failure to keep his children in school regularly. Judge Money Ed Cummins fined him Saturday, in quarterly court.

Three days of unexcused absence constitutes a violation of the compulsory attendance law.

The attendance authorities of Rockcastle County say they intend to make every effort to see that these laws are enforced, because the money that the County schools receive from the State is based on attendance.

Rockcastle County magistrates voted themselves a salary of \$60 per month for trying criminal court cases at the regular meeting of the Rockcastle County Fiscal Court, Tuesday.

The magistrates could have voted a salary of \$100 under a bill recently passed by the State Legislature.

The group compromised on the \$60 salary after County Treasurer Ernest Bullock told them the county needed its money for expenses other than salaries.

On top of the \$60 a month salary, the magistrates will receive \$15 per meeting. They ordinarily meet the first Tuesday of each month and have one called meeting each quarter. The salaries will begin April 1, but cannot be paid until a new budget is set up or an amendment is made to the present one.

During the meeting a letter was brought before the court for approval. It was directed to the National Surety Company, the bonding company for the Crawford, Mahaffey and Cornett contracting firm, and was from representatives of the county school system.

The letter informed the company that the ground had not been broken for the new Roundstone School, and reminded them that the County Board of Education expects to occupy that school for the next school year.

The letter said the county would feel justified in asking for damages incurred if the school is not completed by the fall term. The school would have to re-arrange its schedules and send children to other schools if the building is incomplete. This would incur considerable expense.

Jack Crawford, who is the contractor, told the court, "weather conditions have been so bad that work is impossible." He stated an all-out effort can be made, "even by putting on a double shift to meet the deadline." The court agreed to send the letter.

Prepare Tobacco Bed With Special Care

Tobacco bed preparation in Kentucky is now about three weeks behind because of cold wet weather in March; for that reason, says Russell Hunt, Kentucky Agricultural Extension Service specialist a better than usual job of bed-making must be done this year.

He warned: "Don't rush in and do a poor job this spring; wait until soil conditions are right and then use care in preparation to insure that beds are as free as possible of weeds. If beds are made when the ground is too wet, and preparation is poor, we will get weedy beds, poor plants, etc."

Here are four important points farmers should remember in view of the adverse weather and the delayed bed-making factor:

- (1) Use one of two methods, burning beds or gassing them with methyl bromide. Because

February Bond Sales In Rockcastle, \$9,843

The citizens of Rockcastle County purchased \$9,843 in Series E and H Savings Bonds during February, bringing the county's cumulative sales for 1958 to \$41,387 toward the annual goal of \$84,520.

Sales of these bonds throughout Kentucky during February amounted to \$5,956,056, for a cumulative total of \$12,450,734 toward the state's annual goal of \$58,700,000.

Mr. Edward H. Hilliard, Louisville, Volunteer State Chairman, expressed gratification with Savings Bond sales for the first two months of this year. He pointed out that sales for February, alone, showed an increase of 22.1 percent over February 1957, while for the two-months period the increase was 21.6 percent, the best two-months sales record for any year since 1955.

Mr. Hilliard gave credit to the many Kentuckians who helped "strengthen America's Peace Power" through the purchase of U. S. Savings Bonds, and to the volunteers who made this excellent record possible. "We've started this year off with a bang," he said, "let's keep up the good work and finish the same way."

Kentucky Farm Income High In 1957

The State Department of Economic Development says "more diversified production" was a major factor in carrying Kentucky farm income in 1957 to the second highest mark in five years despite a sharp decline in tobacco receipts and depressed regional and national marketings.

U. S. Department of Agriculture figures, cited by the agency, place each receipt from Kentucky farm sales last year at \$588,091,000, up \$2,842,000 from 1956 and more than \$16,000,000 above the 1955 total. Marketings in 1957 were the highest of the past five years, with the exception of 1954 when sales reached \$558,800,000.

By contrast, farm sales last year fell below 1956 by 1.2 percent in the nation as a whole and 6.9 percent in the 16 states comprising the South Atlantic and South Central regions, according to the development department. Nationwide marketings in 1957 were more than \$1 billion, or 3.8 percent lower than 1956.

"The most significant feature about Kentucky's increasing farm income is that it has been accomplished in the face of a steep reduction in the dollar volume realized from tobacco marketings," stated Frank Lebus, head of the agency's agricultural development division. Lebus said cash receipts from 1957-58 crop year came to only Kentucky tobacco sales in the \$219,736,000, a drop of about \$24 million from the previous year as well as from the 1954-55 total when the last highest farm income was reported.
