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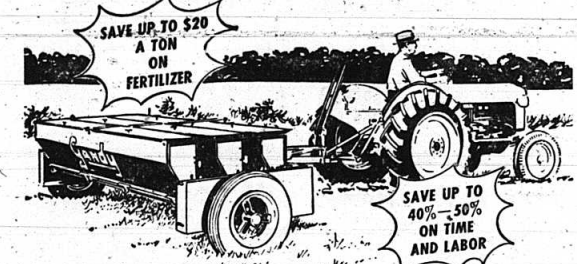

City Council Says 'No' To A Poolroom

The Mt. Vernon City Council voted to keep its poolroom ordinance, at a meeting of the council, Thursday night.

The most recent vote on the poolroom ordinance, which prohibits the operation of a poolroom in the city, came about when a Livingston man, requested at the March council meeting to be allowed to operate a poolroom in the city.

At that time, the council said it would consider the request if the poolroom site were on Main Street and well lighted.

Three local ministers appeared at the April meeting, Thursday night and protested. The council then voted not to repeal the ordinance, which means no poolroom in the city.

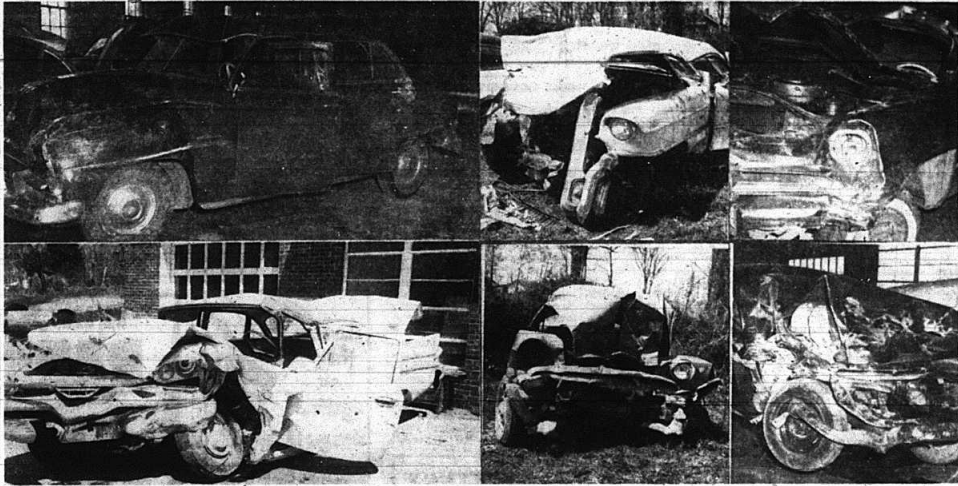
The decision apparently means, as far as the present council is concerned, during its tenure of office the poolroom question is settled.

The council also heard read a list of rules and regulations to govern city business. The council did not vote on the list.

There was some discussion on the annexation issue at the meeting. The council has before it a proposal to annex several areas surrounding Mt. Vernon. Currently, the city is waiting the outcome of a survey of the city limits before deciding on a course of action.

2 Die; 12 Injured In Series Of Rockcastle County Wrecks



ACCIDENTS ON COUNTY HIGHWAYS during the last few days have claimed the lives of two persons and injured 12. In the auto, top left, a Hammond, Indiana, woman was killed when she was thrown from the auto near Brodhead. In the auto, lower left, a Dayton, Ohio, man died instantly in a four-car accident near scenic View on Route 25, about three miles north of Mt. Vernon. The rainy weather and poor visibility was blamed for several of the accidents. But police said most occurred because of speed and carelessness.

Two out-of-state people were killed, and 12 persons injured, in a series of accidents in Rockcastle County, over the week end.

Barbara Jean Main, 20, of Hammond, Ind., was killed instantly early Monday, about a mile west of Brodhead, when she apparently lost control of her auto on a sharp curve.

Miss Main was thrown from the auto and was trapped underneath when it rolled over on her. A 17-year-old girl in the car was injured slightly and her brother uninjured in the accident.

State Trooper Willis Martin reported the girl's auto ran off on the shoulder as she rounded a curve. It overturned when she made an effort to get it under control. All occupants of the auto were thrown out.

Killed instantly, in a four car pile-up Monday noon, near scenic View on Route 25, was Ort Albert Keyser, 76, of Dayton, Ohio.

Hospitalized with undetermined injuries were, his nephews, David A. Schulz, 16, of West Milton, Ohio, and Tom Metz, about 17, of Dayton, Ohio.

In another auto involved in the accident, Mrs. Margaret Estes, 47, of Detroit, Mich., reportedly suffered a broken back, a skull fracture, broken ribs, M. Estes, 58, cuts and bruises. A daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Estes, and a girl friend, were uninjured.

In the third auto, Jess Goins, 42, of Nevsdale, was shaken-up and bruised. A fourth auto plowed into a ditch to avoid the accident. The occupants of this auto were uninjured.

According to Trooper Martin, the Goins auto was going north on the highway when it crossed the yellow line at a point where the three-lane highway narrows into two lanes. The Schulz car, which was headed south, with Goins auto and the Estes auto struck the wreck out from the rear.

Brodhead Farmers Win Top Awards In District

Burley Tobacco Support Level Of \$58, Set-\$55

The 1958 burley tobacco crop will be supported by the Federal Government at an average of \$55 a hundred pounds. That is \$3.30 above the support level for last year's crop.

The support rate for this year's crop was announced this week in Washington by the United States Department of Agriculture.

At the same time, the Department announced these minimum-support prices for other Kentucky-grown tobacco crops: 1958— Kentucky - Tennessee fire-cured, Types 22 and 23, \$38.80. Same as last year; dark air-cured, Types 35 and 36, \$34.50, also unchanged from 1957.

The Department announced that the support price for flue-cured tobacco will be increased to \$54.50 a hundred; up \$3.40 from the 1957 level.

The support rates for burley and flue-cured tobaccos, the Department said, are designed to reflect 90 percent of parity at the beginning of marketing seasons. They will be adjusted upward before sales of this year's crop open should the parity price rise.

Parity is a standard for measuring farm prices by a formula declared by law to be fair to farmers in relation to the prices they pay.

The higher the support price for Kentucky's 1958 burley crop still would be \$5 less than the \$60.94 a hundred actually paid for the 1957 crop.

Kentucky's 1957 burley crop totaled 341,626,370 pounds, according to the State Department of Agriculture. Payments to growers amounted to \$208,197,697.48.

Because of acreage reductions and a bad growing season, last year's crop was well below the 351,958,639 - pound Kentucky crop sold in 1956. That year payments to growers reached an all-time high of \$225,925,035.46 and so did the average of \$64.19 a hundred pounds.

This year in Kentucky, the chief burley-producing state, farmers are two to three weeks behind schedule in crop preparations because of bad weather.

The Agriculture Department this week also announced it will conduct a referendum June 5 to 7 to determine whether

SOIL CONSERVATION NEWS

Rockcastle County may again some day get a sizeable income from forestry products. Many people of the county are showing increased interest in the woodlands in our county.

The Fiscal Court, last year, made it possible for farmers to have wide fire protection. Mr. C. G. Stewart has been employed by the State Division of Forestry as Fire Guard and is now lining up fire-crews in all areas of the county. Sufficient towers will be built to give complete coverage of the county along with existing towers of the Forest Service and the Division of Forestry.

Tree setting is also increasing. 30,000 tree seedlings were delivered from the State Division of Forestry last week. Farmers getting trees were: E. E. Bullock, James W. Lambert, L. G. Shiple, W. D. Moore and W. S. Stewart. 16,000 tree seedlings remain to be delivered

this spring.

It takes about 1,000 seedlings to set an acre. If 80 percent of them live, which is normal, the trees will completely cover the ground with needles in 6 to 10 years. Trees should be thinned to about 300 per acre at 12 to 15 years of age. These 300 trees could easily be worth \$3.00 each at 30 years old. This is a value of \$900.00 per acre for an investment of \$15.00. What better investment could be made in Rockcastle County?
