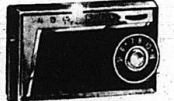

## Arrest 2 For Working Still

A large crowd of curious people gathered around the County Sheriff's car which was parked in front of the Rockcastle Courthouse, Monday afternoon, when Deputy Sam Hoskins opened the trunk to remove some confiscated still equipment and produce.

Russell Rector, 50, and Al Pasley, 30, have been charged with manufacturing untaxed whiskey and operating an unlicensed distillery. Both men are from Garrard County and reportedly are farmers.

They were found at Fall Bush Hollow, which is on Copper Creek Ridge on the Garrard County line. They were operating a still which has a 34 inch worm and six inch boiler. The mash was being cooked on a kerosene burner which had a pressure tank attached. The pressure tank was operated with a manual fire pump.

Rockcastle County Sheriff Walter Sowder, and Deputies Sam Hoskins and Robert Abney took the men into custody in cooperation with Claude Williams of the Alcohol Beverage Control Commission. Deputy Sam Hoskins, in wet shoes and his pants were wet to the knees when he returned from the escapade.

The County and Federal authorities confiscated a gallon of moonshine and about 1/2 gallon of rye beer at the still. They also destroyed three 50 gallon barrels of mash.

Other products found at the still were: 100 pounds of sugar; two bushel of rye and a five pound bag of commodity flour which, according to Deputy Hoskins, is used to seal joints on the still, so the moonshine will not be lost as steam.

When Rector and Pasley were arrested they were brought to Mt. Vernon and put in jail. After deliberation Rockcastle officers decided that the still was in the edge of Garrard County, so Rector and Pasley were taken to London, where they appeared before Federal authorities. Each man filled a \$500 bond and was released.

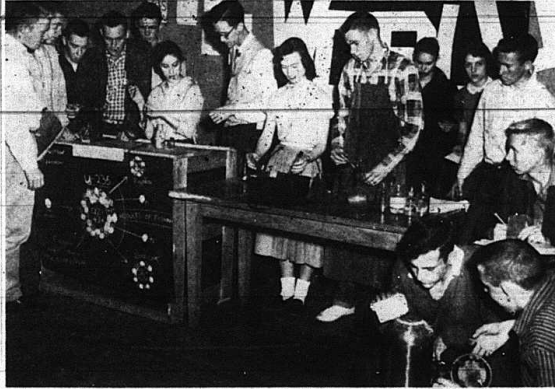
They will be tried Sept. 8, at Richmond in Federal Court.

## Livingston To Require More Math and Science

### Mother's Day Fund Aids Needy Patients

Floyd Owens, Administrator of our local hospital, announced this week the opening of the annual Mother's Day campaign for funds. These funds are used for charity work and to purchase new equipment as the hospital expands its services.

The hospital is now in its 11th month of service to the citizens of Rockcastle and surrounding counties. The hospital is owned by the Rockcastle County Fiscal Court and operated by the Rockcastle Association of Baptists.

Since the opening in September, 1956 \$5,524 people have received service and care at the hospital. Some of this group were admitted as patients, some received x-ray and laboratory examinations, and some were treated as emergency room patients. There have been 236 babies born at the hospital; 152 operations, 2,002 laboratory examinations, 215 x-rays; 61 heart examinations and 87 blood transfusions.

Services have been rendered to members of every religious faith.

The hospital has never refused admission to anyone since it opened in September, 1956. Some of those admitted cannot pay and charity work cannot be done without cost to somebody. Mr. Owens emphasizes the fact that the hospital does not "pad" the paying patients' bill in order to give free service to those who cannot pay, nor does the hospital "make" enough money to purchase new equipment for expanding service. It is for these reasons that the "Mothers Day Offering" has been established.

Contributions to the offering will be solicited only by the churches of the County. Those who wish to give to the Mothers Day Fund, should do so through the church of their choice, or by making their offering directly to the hospital.

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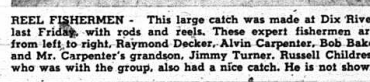
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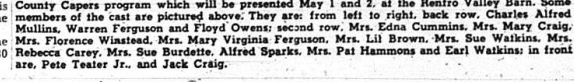
