The State agency maintains at Louisville, a "central register," or tabulated card index of names and addresses of everybody in Kentucky who is known to have the disease.

From this file, the agency knows positively of 7,000 persons in Kentucky who have active tuberculosis.

By providing statistics on the number of known cases, the register serves as a basis for preventive work and research.

The register enables the agency to notify the local health department to check with members of the patient's family, to check on the patient's status and to visit him twice a year. It shows whether the patient has moved away or is in a sanitarium.

The major work of the department is finding unknown cases for listing in the register. The work involves seeking those most likely to have been exposed to the disease. The agency tries first to test relatives and contacts of known cases.

Here's the policy of the department regarding chest X-Rays, given by local health departments and mobile units, and tuberculin skin tests, which show whether a person has been in contact with someone having tuberculosis.

For age 41 and above, get a chest X-Ray every year. For ages 21-40, get a chest X-Ray every year if you have a positive skin test, every other year if a negative skin test. For ages under 21, get an X-Ray only as physician recommends.

State Increases Allotments For Mental Patients

Kentucky spent 26 per cent more for daily treatment of each patient in fiscal 1957 in the previous year and led all other states in percentage increase, the commissioner of mental health, Dr. H. L. McPheeters, has reported.

Kentucky spent \$2.68 a day for each patient in four mental hospitals in 1957—56 more than the \$2.12 allotment of 1956, he added.

In one year, Kentucky advanced from the position of 44th state to 38th in per capita expenditures for mental patients, McPheeters said. In fiscal year 1958, about \$3.04 is being spent for each patient daily, and the last legislature also increased the allotment for the next two years. Estimates indicate that

## New Telephones Soon

# Two Million Dollar Loan Due To Establish Dial System

Documents are now being prepared by the Rural Electrification Administration to loan the Northeastern Telephone Corp. \$2,451,000 to establish modern dial telephone service in Rockcastle and Pulaski counties, REA officials informed the company today.

In a letter to Perry D. Woodward, executive vice president of Northeastern, the REA indicated a loan commitment letter will be sent as soon as final papers are signed.

Although the REA did not commit itself officially to the loan, the letter is in effect tentative approval. The actual commitment letter is merely a formality.

Northeastern officials immediately began ironing out legal matters. A petition was filed with the Public Service Commission at Frankfort which asks the PSC for authorization to borrow the \$2,451,000 to purchase the telephone plant of the Rockcastle Telephone Co. and the Pulaski County Telephone Co. and to construct a new dial telephone system to serve some 3,686 subscribers.

Also in the petition, the company asks for a permit of convenience and necessity to operate in the two counties. In the area of eastern and northeastern asked the PSC to establish temporary interim rates through the period of building and construction for subscribers served by exchange at Mt. Vernon, Brodhead, Science Hill and Eubank.

The company also filed for the establishment of city telephone rates to become effective at the time of conversion to dial.

A hearing on the petition has been set for 9 a. m. (CST), June 25, at the Commission's office at Frankfort.

Clair Bruner, manager of Northeastern's Southern Division at London, reported speaking of telephone lines will begin in the county very soon.

"We hope to get at least one doctor, Ericson, and one for Mt. Vernon," he said, "and we are confident that we will get them somewhere."

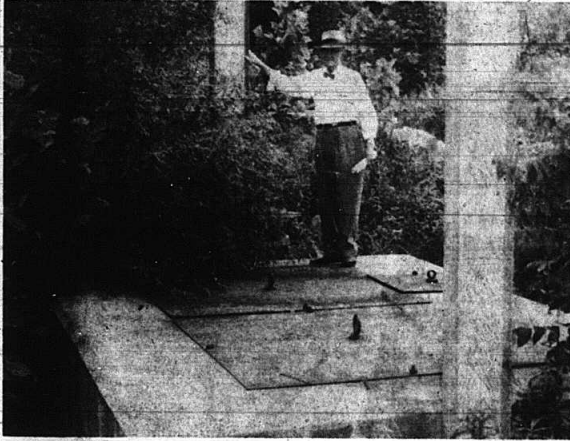
"There is no danger that we'll have to close the hospital down due to being unable to find a doctor," he said.

# City Of Livingston Completes Plans For Municipally Owned Water System

The City of Livingston has just completed plans for a municipal water system, and construction is expected to begin on the processing and filtration plant at a later date.

Within six months, at a cost of between \$60,000 and \$75,000, the system is expected to be completed.

Dr. R. G. Webb, chairman of the city Board of Trustees, said there will be about 100 hookups to the system as soon as it is ready.

Most of the equipment for the system was bought or leased from the L & N Railroad, Webb said.

He said one of the Roundstone Creek "boils"—places where the stream shoots water to the surface after having run underground—would supply the water.

Several years ago, Webb said, the railroad had a concrete well down in one of the boils and installed two large pumps there. This will supply the city.

The city has acquired a 30-year lease from the railroad and has set up the water works so that it will pay for itself in that length of time without any support from taxes.

Persons desiring to hook on when the system is ready, will be required to pay an initial fee of \$60, Webb said. Half of this will pay for the individual's water meter.

Webb said the city had saved about \$25,000 by acquiring the L & N equipment and being able to avoid the building of a dam.

In the past, all water in the city has been supplied by privately owned individual wells.

Webb pointed out that the new water system would carry other advantages besides just providing plenty of water.

"For instance," he said, "with city water, we can install fire plugs, get a fire truck, and insurance rates will become lower."

To handle the legal details of setting up the system, the city retained Ernest G. Baxter, a Stanford Attorney.

The engineering is being planned by Maurice Miller, St. Matthews, Louisville, and executed by Jack Crawford, Reno, Va.

Webb remarked that Livingston was perhaps the only city in the county which had a complete sewer system—finished last year—before it had a municipal water system.

The Rockcastle County sheriff's force confiscated a large quantity of moonshine whiskey last week in a raid on the first time in about a month.

LeRoy Doan, about 55, a resident of the Sand Springs section of the county, waived examination and was held to the Nov. 10 term of Federal District Court at London.

He was charged with the illegal possession of untaxed liquor and released on \$500 bond.

Officers participating in the raid on Doan's home were County Sheriff Walter Sowder, Deputies Robert Abney and Sam Hoskins, and Fifth District Constable Ollie Mullins.

Hoskins said the raid, which took place Saturday, netted three gallons and one-half pint of moonshine.

He said that the officers found Doan, who had apparently been drinking, breaking bottles of the moonshine behind his house.

# Suit Filed In Circuit Court In Protest To Annexation

A suit was filed in Rockcastle Circuit Court Wednesday afternoon naming the City of Mt. Vernon as defendant and asking that Ordinance No. 254, which proposes to annex certain property adjacent to the city, be declared "null and void and of no effect."

The complaint, filed by attorney Fritz Krueger for Charlie Childers, says that "75 percent of the freeholders of the territory proposed to be annexed . . . are opposed to annexation."

The plaintiff also states that the ordinance is of no effect because its "purported enactment was passed by said City Council at a time when it was not properly in session."

Childers—a citizen and freeholder owning property adjacent to the present city limits—charges that he and the other "freeholders in said proposed annexed territory will suffer great and irreparable injury" by the passage of the annexation ordinance.

The complaint says that "the annexation of said territory to said city would be to the manifest hurt to both the city and the freeholders of the territory sought to be annexed."

It asks that the judgment of the Court prohibit the annexation.

Prior to the filing of the suit, on Tuesday night, some 40 men, women and children attended a public meeting in the county courthouse that was called to actively protest the proposed annexation.

Thirty of those present donated \$5 each to make a total of \$150 toward retaining an attorney to represent them in the case.

The law provides that the ordinance proposing the annexation must be published in four issues of a weekly newspaper. This issue of the Signal carries the fourth publication of the ordinance.

Formal protest is to be made within the period of the four publications.

About 105 property owners' names were presented at the meeting. Each had supposedly opposed annexation and tentatively agreed to contribute \$5 to help in the battle against it.

The 105 are believed to have represented a large portion of those property owners in the area which may be annexed. Estimates at the meeting placed the total number of property owners at between 130 and 150.

If 75 percent of the property owners living in the area proposed to be annexed oppose

## City Council Cuts Tax Rate

The Mt. Vernon City Council, at its meeting last Thursday night, passed an ordinance lowering the 1958 city tax rate from 80 to 75 cents per \$100 assessed property value.

According to Kentucky statute, cities of the fifth class—of which Mt. Vernon is one—cannot have a tax rate higher than 75 cents unless the additional rate is for a specific bond issue.

The bond issue which Mt. Vernon had been paying off for several years was reported as retired at the February Council meeting.

It was issued to provide funds for a public works project, and, in the beginning, had raised the tax rate to 95 cents per \$100.

Through the years, the bonds were gradually paid off and the rate lowered accordingly until, this year, the final payment was made and the tax rate decreased to its normal 75 cents.

Police Judge Larney Durham testified in his report to the Council that the city's share of fines and forfeitures from police court during the month of May totaled \$127. Most of this, he said, came from convictions for public drunkenness.

The next regular Council meeting will be the first Thursday in July.

## Quality Isn't Enough

Waterfield Says Schools Need Quantity, Also

LA Gov. Harry Lee Waterfield has taken issue with educators who will open colleges only to the brightest students.

He declared "we need quantity in education" as well as quality.

In a speech at Morehead State College commencement exercises, Waterfield asserted that "the possibility must be given to the development of the bright students" because "we can not afford to dissipate

their genius." He added, however, "While stressing quality we must also realize that we need quantity in education. Our system should not restrict entrance to the relatively few well-to-do, nor to those of extremely high intelligence. Our greatness has been achieved by offering opportunity to all."

The lieutenant governor said that the Kentucky state government should continually strive to give Kentucky's public school

pupils the same service that is received by the average student in the nation.

If this requires higher salaries for teachers, Waterfield indicated he is for such. He said: "In 1947 I advocated a per capita appropriation sufficient to bring the average salary of teachers in Kentucky equal to the national average. On this, I have not changed my mind."

## Farm And Home News

### Leaf-Spot Diseases May Strike Tomatoes:

Leaf-spot diseases may hit Kentucky tomato plants in the near future. Use one of two recommended sprays to check such fungus diseases, says Kentucky Experiment Station pathologists.

The recommended materials contain zineb or maneb. During rainy weather, spray weekly; in dry weather, spray every 10 days to two weeks. Follow label directions carefully.

When fruit begins to set start a spray program that will last the remainder of the season. Leaf-spot diseases will appear on practically any transplants, but those shipped in from such areas as Florida should be most carefully watched.

The various diseases—late blight, early blight, etc.—attack stems as well as leaves. For that reason examine field plants closely for first signs of such diseases.

Diseased plant specimens should be mailed the plant pathology department, Kentucky Experiment Station, Lexington, for positive identification. Mail them in a plastic bag and do not add water to the plant to aid in the shipping. This extra water frequently causes the plants to rot in transit.

### 4-H Club Work Equips Youth For College Education

**AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF LIVINGSTON, KENTUCKY** DECLARING it is necessary for the City to construct a water treatment plant and a water distribution system for the protection of the health and property of the residents of said City; to lease from the Louisville and Nashville Railroad Company the pump well, valve box and

water lines owned by said company; purchase two submersible deep well water pumps owned by said Railroad Company; employ a consulting sanitary engineer and a special attorney; and contract with the residents of Livingston for the sale of services and water.

WHEREAS, the City of Livingston, Rockcastle County, Kentucky, has no source of water properly treated for safe human consumption or for fire protection, and

WHEREAS, the health and property of the residents is endangered by the lack of such water facilities and economic development is impeded as a result thereof, and

WHEREAS, neither individuals nor private corporations have in the past been interested in the furnishing of said facilities and there are no prospects that they may do so in the future, the best interests of the inhabitants of this City can best be served by the City of Livingston acquiring and operating a municipally owned water system, and

WHEREAS, the services of

experts in the fields of engineering and law are required to formulate a successful plan for acquisition of such a water system,

NOW, THEREFORE, THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF THE CITY OF LIVINGSTON, KENTUCKY, DOES ORDAIN AS FOLLOWS:

**SECTION I.**

IT IS DECLARED that for the protection of the health and property of the citizens and residents of the City of Livingston, IT IS NECESSARY for the City to purchase, lease, construct and operate its own municipal water system consisting of a pump well, valve box located near the "Boils" in Roundstone Creek, and the pipe lines leading therefrom to the West side of the main track of the Louisville and Nashville Railroad Company, and located on land belonging to said Railroad Company; purchase land for the site of and construct a filtration plant and a distribution system approved by the Kentucky Board of Health; employ a qualified engineer for the formulation and development of plans and specifications for the construction and operation of such a system; and employ an attorney qualified to advise the City and its agents of the legal steps necessary to be taken in order to carry out

said policy.

**SECTION II.**

The Chairman of the Board of Trustees of the City of Livingston, Kentucky, Dr. R. G. Webb, for and on behalf of the City of Livingston, Kentucky, is now hereby authorized and directed to sign and deliver a contract with the Louisville and Nashville Railroad Company, dated May 12, 1958, leasing to the City of Livingston a pump well, valve box and water lines therein described, for a period of thirty (30) years, for the consideration therein expressed, and the City Clerk, \_\_\_\_\_ is authorized and directed to attest the signature of said Chairman and attach the Seal of the City of Livingston, Kentucky.

**SECTION III.**

The said Chairman of the Board of Trustees, Dr. R. G. Webb, is authorized and directed to purchase from the Louisville and Nashville Railroad Company, two deep-well submersible pumps for the sum of Two Hundred (\$200.00) Dollars, and in payment therefor, deliver a check drawn on the account of the City of Livingston, Kentucky, by the City Clerk or City Treasurer.

**SECTION IV.**

Maurice L. Miller, consulting engineer, 118 Bauer Avenue, St. Matthews, Louisville 7, Kentucky, having presented to

the Board of Trustees a contract for his employment as engineer for the City of Livingston in all matters concerning the acquisition and construction of a municipal water system, dated June 2, 1958, and it having been read, discussed and duly considered, IT IS NOW HEREBY APPROVED, and the Chairman of the Board of Trustees, R. G. Webb, IS ORDERED AND DIRECTED to sign and deliver said contract for and on behalf of the City of Livingston, and file City Clerk is ordered and directed to attest the signature of said Chairman and attach thereto the Seal of the City of Livingston, Kentucky.

**SECTION V.**

Ernest G. Baxter, attorney at law, Lincoln County National Bank Building, Stanford, Kentucky, having presented to the Board of Trustees a contract for his employment as special attorney for the City of Livingston in all matters pertaining to the acquisition and construction of its municipal water system, and it having been read, discussed and duly considered, IT IS NOW HEREBY APPROVED, and the Chairman of the Board of Trustees, R. G. Webb, is ordered and directed to sign and deliver said contract for and on behalf of the City of Livingston, and attach thereto the Seal of the City of Livingston, Kentucky.

**SECTION VI.**

In order to provide definite proof that the citizens and residents of the City of Livingston desire to patronize the municipal water system proposed to be provided for them by the City of Livingston, and there will be sufficient customers and income to service and retire any bonds issued by the said City for cost of acquisition and construction of said system, and induce the public to purchase said bonds, it is advisable and necessary that the City at once enter into a contract with the citizens and residents of Livingston in which they shall agree to use water and pay therefor a definite rate when the system is completed and at once pay for cost of connecting their individual lines with the

main lines of the distribution system, and metering the water to be distributed to them, the Chairman of the Board of Trustees, R. G. Webb, is now hereby authorized and directed to execute for and on behalf of the City of Livingston, Kentucky, a contract with the citizens and residents of Livingston for the sale of services and water at the rate therein set out in words and figures as follows, to-wit:

such annexation, the annexation cannot take place "unless . . . failure to annex would materially retard the prosperity of the city and of the owners and inhabitants of the territory sought to be annexed," according to KRS 81.110.

One member of the group said they should file a suit whether they actually oppose annexation or not.

"If we oppose this in court," he said, "they

(meaning the city, apparently) will have to promise us something—some sort of improvements. So far they have not."

First District Magistrate G. H. Griffin was named treasurer of the group, which, so far as could be determined, had no other officers at that time.

### SETTING-OUT TIPS GIVEN STATE BURLEY FARMERS

Transplanting burley plants from bed to field is in full swing now; here are a few pointers, says the Kentucky Agricultural Extension Service.

Don't transplant if temperatures are more than 90 degrees F. If necessary, transplant in early morning hours or late afternoon when heat is less.

Use of sturdy, stocky plants is desirable, however. This year's plants are irregular and will need the best of care.

Farmers should keep 2, 4-D materials and equipment for use on these materials away from tobacco fields. The material is injurious to tobacco, and specialists say plant-bed damage has been noticed this year; apparently stemming from farmers' use of small, pressure sprayers that once had been used to spray weeds with 2,

4-D or similar weed-killers. Fleabeetles and cutworms are doing considerable damage, both in beds or in fields. Before pulling plants, beds should be sprayed or dusted with DDT; transplanted plants also should be watched carefully in the fields for fleabeetle or cutworm damage, and fields sprayed or dusted with DDT if the pests are found. County agents have full details on proportions for the dust or spray.

Watering of beds is very important, particularly in the "late season" such as experienced this year. Water beds amply before pulling plants; and give them a good "dose" of water every three or four days rather than small applications daily. Use clean, clear water in setter barrels—and DO NOT use starter solutions or insecticides in the barrels.

After setting out is complete, replace canvas over beds and water through the canvas if remaining plants are to be used.

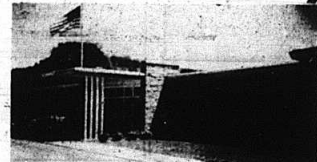
