Six Accidents Reported

Two Jailed In Connection With Weekend Auto Wrecks

Two men were arrested and jailed as a result of one of the six automobile accidents which occurred in Rockcastle County last Saturday.

Jack Edward Martin, 25, Hamilton, Ohio, and Rockcastle County, and Elmer Chennutt, 27, Orlando, were arrested at Rockcastle County Baptist Hospital while being treated in the county jail, Martin on several charges.

State Trooper Willis Martin said Jack Martin drove his car into two parked cars on West Main Street about 3 p. m. Saturday, and about an hour later wrecked his own car about four miles east of town on Brush Creek Road.

The officer said Martin was charged with hit-and-run, public drunkenness, and drunken driving.

Chennutt, a passenger in the Martin auto when it wrecked on Brush Creek Road, was arrested for minor cuts and bruises and placed in jail on charge of public drunkenness.

OTHER WRECKS

In the other wrecks that Trooper Martin investigated, no one was hurt and no charges were preferred.

These wrecks included: A two-car accident involving Paul Vanarsdale, 34, Lexington, and Robert H. Christman, Jr., 47, Mt. Vernon, which occurred north of the city on U. S. 25 about 9 p. m. Saturday.

A two-car accident when Kathryn Lou Wisenhofner, 57, Phoenix, Ariz., stopped the car while driving on the pavement to allow a driver in front of her to make a left turn. Her car was struck from behind by a car driven by Earl D. Fink, 30, Canfield, Ohio.

The accident occurred about one and one-half miles north of Mt. Vernon on U. S. 25 about 4 p. m.

The other wrecks which occurred in the county over the week end were investigated by a state trooper from Laurel County. No information was available except that nobody was seriously injured in any of them.

Forest Fire Warning Given In Kentucky

A plea to Kentucky farmers to observe "good fire prevention rules" in forests and fields of the Bluegrass State was issued today by the Kentucky Tree Farm Committee.

Pointing out that more than 42 per cent of Kentucky's 11 million acres of forest land is owned by farmers, Committee Chairman Harold C. Moser said his committee asks the farmers to be especially careful with fire during the summer and fall fire seasons.

"Fires are the No. 1 enemy of productive forests in Kentucky," Moser said. "Fires greatly reduce the value of the standing trees in many cases and they destroy the young trees which should form the future crops of timber from our forests."

Under a law passed by the legislature this year, all forest land on the state will be given organized forest fire protection within five years. At the present time, only about 60 per cent of Kentucky's forest area is afforded organized protection by the State Division of Forestry.

Moser urged all farmers and others to observe the state fire laws and to help protect the forests which afford recreation to all, jobs to more than 18 thousand Kentuckians and soil conservation protection to 11,497,000 acres of the Bluegrass State.

The Kentucky Tree Farm Committee has certified 71 privately owned, taxpaying tracts of timberland which have been managed for continuous production of timber, for harvest and which are protected from fire and destructive grazing. These Tree Farms cover more than 58,000 acres.

Assessment And Rate Unchanged For Year; Revenue Up By \$4,239

The Rockcastle County budget for fiscal 1958-59, approved by the Fiscal Court last Friday, provides for a total expenditure of \$48,524,895—\$4,239 more than the period just ended.

The tax rate remains the same as last year: 50 cents per \$100 dollars assessed valuation on real and personal property. The assessment, also, remains unchanged.

The \$48,524 set aside for the general fund is broken down as follows:

- General Government, 226,400
- Protection to Person and Property, 35,000
- Health and Sanitation, 51,670
- Hospitals, Charities, and Corrections, 93,950
- Libraries and Other Educational Institutions, 800
- Debt Service, General Fund, 2,300
- Miscellaneous, General Fund, 11,271

The highway fund for 1958-59 gets a total of \$15,100. The hospital bond fund receives \$17,271, which will go toward retiring the bond issue for the Rockcastle County Baptist Hospital.

The only other fund included in the budget is the forestry fund which receives \$800 for the protection of private forest lands against fire.

Where is this money coming from? Here is the way the estimated income for the coming year breaks down:

Tax levies, \$63,095. Of this total, \$45,824 will go to the general fund, and \$17,271 will go to the hospital bond fund. Truck license distribution, a refund from the state, will provide \$14,400, all of which will go into the county road fund.

Fines and forfeitures will go toward the \$2,400 of the total estimated income. This sum will go into the general fund.

The general fund also gets the \$1,200 which is granted by the state to pay for elections.

The 2 cents tax on private forest land provides a total of \$800, which, as was noted before, will go to the forestry division of Forestry to use for local fire protection.

From the U. S. Forest Service, the county will get \$700, which will go into the road fund.

This completes the total estimated income for the fiscal year 1958-59.

Here, in brief, is the Rockcastle County budget for fiscal 1958-59 as approved by the Fiscal Court last week:

In a tentative program has been drawn up by the Department of Agriculture and submitted to State SAC committees throughout the county for study and comments. The general highlights of the tentative program for next year, the Rockcastle County chairman said, are as follows:

(1) The proposed national average annual rental payment to participating farmers will be \$130 per acre, compared with \$100 per acre in previous years of the program. The tentative average annual payment rate for 1959 in Kentucky is \$15 an acre, compared with \$10 an acre under 1958-58 contracts.

(2) County and individual farm payment rates will be determined by ASC committees as in the past primarily on the basis of the relative productivity, rental rates, and agricultural land values. County committees will have more freedom to

Annexation Answer Is Filed

The City of Mt. Vernon last week filed its answer in Rockcastle Circuit Court to the complaint of Charlie Childers in connection with the controversial annexation.

The suit arose out of the protest of a group of property owners who live in an area which the City has proposed to annex. The complaint was filed June 11 after public meetings were held by several residents of the area.

Admitting that Childers was a citizen and a freeholder of the territory proposed to be annexed, the City denies all other allegations in the complaint.

The answer, filed June 25 with the circuit clerk, states that "the complaint fails to state a claim against defendant (the City) upon which relief can be granted."

"Defendant denies each and every allegation of plaintiff's complaint not admitted . . . the pleading further states. . . ."

It asks for dismissal of the complaint at the plaintiff's cost; the defendant's costs herein expended; and "all proper relief of the territory proposed to be annexed . . . as opposed to annexation."

It also charged that the ordinance proposing annexation is invalid because its "purported enactment was passed by said City Council at a time when it was not properly in session."

It asks for dismissal of said territory to said city would be to the manifest hurt to both the freeholders of the territory sought to be annexed," the complaint states.

If 75 per cent of the property owners living in the area proposed to be annexed oppose such annexation, the annexation cannot take place "unless the failure to annex would materially retard the prosperity of the city and of the owners and inhabitants of the territory sought to be annexed," according to Kentucky statute.

Fritz Krueger, a Somerset attorney, is acting as counsel for the plaintiff, and City Attorney John Allen filed the City's answer.

The case is expected to be docketed for trial during the term of Rockcastle Circuit Court which begins July 21.

The ASC Says: Acreage Reserve Pay Does Not Affect Plan

Even though a Rockcastle County farmer receives his acreage reserve payment in the form of a check from the Acreage Reserve Commission, the full payment will be made in the form of a check from the Acreage Reserve Commission, the Secretary of Agriculture, Mollins said.

Under the agreement, no crop may be harvested from the Acreage Reserve in 1958. No crop may be planted on it except certain crops for harvest in 1959 or later as approved by the State ASC Committee. Also, the Acreage Reserve may not be grazed in 1953 except under certain emergency conditions upon written permission of the Secretary of Agriculture.

A farmer who willfully and knowingly violates any of the terms may be required to return his payment and also is subject to a civil penalty of 50 per cent of the amount of the payment, Mollins said.

Soil Bank Mollins also announced that the work is under way in setting up the Soil Bank Conservation Reserve program for the 1959 crop year.

Farmers who will be able to offer land at less than the regular rate if he wishes. This may make his offer more certain of acceptance in certain cases.

In addition to the annual rental payment, a farmer who participates in the Conservation Reserve can get a payment covering a substantial part of the cost of establishing approved conservation practices on reserved land.

Salary Law Set Aside As 'Squires Settle For Fewer Meetings

The Rockcastle Fiscal Court, in a called meeting Friday, voted without dissent to revoke both its April 1 order to pay each magistrate a salary of \$80 a month, and its June 3 order to meet three times each month.

Magistrates believed that the county budget for fiscal 1958-59 would not have been approved by the State Department of Revenue had the two orders not been set aside.

In keeping with the approved budget, the Fiscal Court will meet twice each month during the coming year. The anticipated called meetings during the period.

Legally, the county judge said, the magistracy of the Court anytime he deems it necessary. However, the anticipated revenue for the coming year was not enough to provide such magistrates with pay for more than two meetings a month.

According to law, they are each paid \$15 each time of the meeting of the Fiscal Court.

This per diem amount is apparently what gave rise to the June 3 order of the Court, to meet three times a month.

The General Assembly just past, enacted a law allowing the county magistracy to pay for criminal cases following a Court of Appeals decision that they could not hear such cases in which they had a financial interest.

Prior to the appellate court's decision, the magistracy of the court in the form of fees from fines due to convictions.

Several weeks after the salary law was passed, it was declared unconstitutional in Mulheisenberg Circuit Court because of an emergency clause which had been placed in the law immediately upon its passage.

Kentucky's constitution forbids the changing of an official's pay during his term of office.

To allow \$50 to be paid to Louis Miller to audit the county treasurer's books.

The Fiscal Court also passed: An order to sustain the request of the Mt. Vernon Independent School to levy a tax of \$1.50 per \$100 assessed valuation on real and personal property, 40 cents on taxable bank shares, and \$2 poll tax on all male residents between 21-65 years of age.

An identical order was passed in regard to the county schools.
