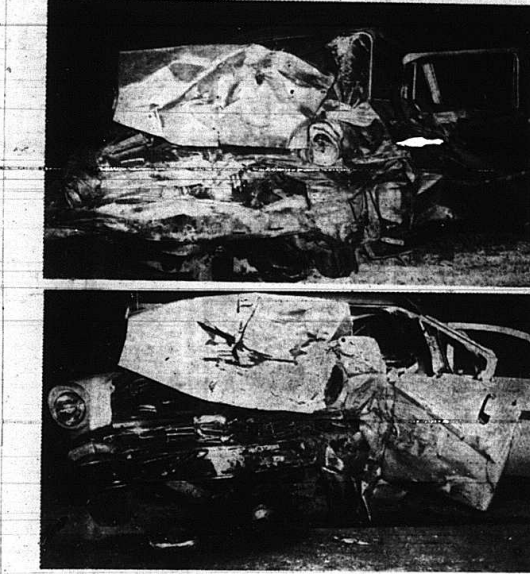

Wreck Near Mt. Vernon One Of Nation's First And Worst of Weekend

Death took part of its national holiday toll near Mt. Vernon as four persons were killed and eight injured in a traffic accident on the Fourth of July. Dead in the 3-vehicle accident were:

Earl Baker, 37, and his 18-month-old daughter, Debra, Barbourville; Shellee Anders, 55, Shelbyville, Ind.; his son, James, 21, Fairland, Ind.; Baker's wife and five other children, and Freddie Brown, a passenger in the Anders car; passengers in the Anders car were all treated at the Rockcastle County Baptist Hospital.

Also injured was Mrs. Dillie Holbert, 38, of Louisville, a passenger in a pickup truck with Roy Harding, 46, also of Louisville.

Harding told state police that he and Mrs. Holbert were headed south on U. S. 25 when they were rammed from behind by the Anders car about five miles south of Mt. Vernon near the Pine Hill section.

The accident, which occurred about 1:30 p. m. Friday, apparently began when the Anders car attempted to pass Harding. The Anders car sideswiped the truck, veered on the shoulder of the road, then pulled back onto the surface and crashed into the Baker car, which was traveling in the opposite direction.

The injured, their ages and injuries were:

Soil Improvement Assistance May Be Granted By Government Agency

Cost-sharing for conservation practices for use of liming materials, rock phosphate and pasture renovation is available now, Shellee Mullins, chairman of the local ASC Committee announced today.

Particular emphasis is given at this time of the year to those practices which may be performed during the summer and early fall. Cost-sharing to farmers has been made available. Soil tests are required.

Farmers desiring to apply for cost-sharing should take a soil sample of the field to be treated or seeded to the county agent's office. Hundreds of acres of grass soil in the county should be renovated and additional seed used.

Legumes may be seeded in August and September for counties in the central part of the State, with fairly good results on grass soil fields which have been worked with a disk.

Cost-sharing for use of fertilizers will be given according to needs as shown by soil tests.

Mullins, pointed out that the best conservation practice is that of obtaining a good vigor-

Recommended By State Committee Is Named To Study Fire-Protection Improvements

The City Council, upon recommendation of a division of the State Fire Marshall's Office, appointed a committee last Thursday night to study the feasibility of buying a new fire truck.

The Division of Fire Prevention and Rates of the Fire Marshall's Office, in a letter to the city, had recommended that a new, more modern fire truck be bought to replace the 20-year-old one now in use in Mt. Vernon.

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A SCIENCE LESSON

Hardly had the holidays begun last week when four persons came to sudden, violent deaths just outside of town in a manner which has become all-too-common in the past few years.

In the usual procedure before holidays, safety officials and law officers had pleaded with the public to take it easy and live, while statisticians anticipated the extent of the foreseeable massacre and bookmakers made bets on the number expected to die.

In spite of all efforts, hundreds of Americans went madly along their separate ways to a common end on bloody, glass-littered patches of asphalt.

Nothing could stop them—not even the thoughts of death. This seems to point in a grim sort of way to the falsity of the scientific doctrines that have been preached in ever-increasing numbers since the launching of the first earth-satellite a few months ago.

The critics, all tell us that the only thing wrong with this country is that we are not training enough scientists and technicians—persons expert in the art of producing powerful machines.

They tell us that we must forget this nonsense of teaching our children to adjust to their surroundings and each other—and concentrate on teaching them how to build a better something-or-other.

After the holiday festivities—as after so many others in the past, and, we suspect, after many more to come—we felt a little helpless at seeing the number of dead that was recorded in the short, frantic period.

It seemed that there might be a lesson there for the pro-science-anti-everything-else faction of our society. If we could learn to live with ourselves and each other, and to control our emotions, then could we not stop this periodic massacre on our highways and this frenetic darting from place to place? Could we not be content to do things a little more slowly and safely, and by doing so, stay around to enjoy the scientific accomplishments we already have?

Or are such things too intangible for the thing-lovers? Should we just teach Johnny to make machines and turn him loose to kill himself with them?

If these many people who died this last week-end could speak, maybe they could tell us.

Attention Needed For Insects Now
Four major insect pests of tobacco need control measures now, says the Kentucky Experiment Station Entomology Department. They are budworms, hornworms, aphids and flea-beetles. Some may not have appeared all over the state as yet, says Richard Thurston, entomologist, but they are "on their way."

The control measures: BUDWORMS: These greenish caterpillars develop during two to three weeks after transplanting operations are over. They are found in the developing buds of young plants. Hit them with one of three materials, TDE, DDT or Endrin, used as a spray or dust. TDE and DDT are used at the rate of one pound actual material per acre; Endrin at three-tenths of one pound actual material per acre. Care must be taken in application so that a too-heavy concentration of material isn't put directly into the buds. Thurston says they could—particularly—the emulsion concentrates—cause deformed leaves. Best way to apply the materials is to hold applicators about 15 inches above the plant and spray directly downward.

HORNWORMS: These large worms, marked by a prominent horn, can be controlled with TDE or ENDRIN. Use TDE at the rate of a pound of actual material per acre. Endrin at two-tenths of a pound actual material per acre, as a spray or dust.

Farm And Home News

Repellents Developed Against Biting Insects

Here's good news for you if mosquitoes, ticks, mites and other biting insects have made the summer season unpleasant in years past.

Several repellents—against such insects have now been developed, according to Miss Martha Owen, county home demonstration agent, and are almost as pleasant and easy to use as hand lotion. A few drops from a bottle, or a spray from a pressurized container may be safely applied to the skin or lightly rubbed on clothing in places where insects may be troublesome.

A relative newcomer to the list, developed through USDA research, is diethyltoluamide. Said to be one of the most effective, it is non-greasy and gives protection for several hours.

Four other repellents—ethyl hexanediol, dimethyl phthalate, dimethyl carbate, and Indalone—are also very effective, and are put in various combinations.

CAUTION: Do not apply repellents near your eyes or mouth. They will not harm cotton or wool garments, but may damage synthetic fabrics or blends. They can also damage fingernail polish, plastics, or varnished articles.

The new repellents are sold under trade names. Miss Owen suggests, you look for them at

drug stores, food markets, sport goods shops, gardening or auto supplies and the like. Read the label on the container to see if it contains any of these new and effective repellents.

Got a weed problem? Then see County Agent H. Lee Durham. He has information on a long list of weed-killers that can help you.

For instance: Dalapon, one of the newer chemicals, is very effective in controlling perennial weed grasses such as quack-grass, Bermuda grass and Johnson grass.

A second material, Sesone, can be applied to newly cultivated soil to suppress weed growth before it starts. And Amitrol is first-rate for killing poison ivy in shady places or where the wind drift from 2,4-D or 2,4,5-T would endanger other plants.

Two new herbicides like Monuron and Simazin can be used to treat tennis courts and driveways, areas where elimination of all vegetation is desired. Silvex is very useful in killing broad-leaved weeds such as dandelion, plantain, wild garlic, etc. and chickweed—the latter being a tough customer.

Many of the newer chemicals are more selective in killing properties and less volatile than the 2,4-D or 2,4,5-T compounds which, in drifting, could harm nearby vegetation. Here are two reminders, incidentally, in handling weed-killers: Keep one set of spray equipment (or watering can) for weed-killers, separate from your insect spray equipment, etc. Second, don't store weed-killers with seeds, feed, fungicides, insecticides and other farm and garden supplies.

ORDINANCE NO. 255 AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF MT. VERNON, KENTUCKY, ACCURATELY DEFINING THE BOUNDARIES OF THE UNINCORPORATED TERRITORY PROPOSED TO BE ANNEXED TO THE PRESENT CITY BOUNDARY.

SECTION I. That the City of Mt. Vernon, Kentucky, desires to annex the following unincorporated territory to the now existing boundaries of the City of Mt. Vernon, to-wit:

Tract No. 3—Beginning at a stake in the present city limits and being in the west boundary

and 826 feet north of the SW corner of same, thence S 72 degrees W 440 feet to a stake; thence S 63 degrees 30 minutes W 357 feet to a stake; thence S 77 degrees W 250 feet to a stake; thence S 89 degrees 30 minutes W 89 feet to a stake; thence N 79 degrees 30 minutes W 168 feet to a stake; thence S 62 degrees 30 minutes W 436 feet to a stake, intersecting with the NE right of way of the Ky. Utilities Company.

Transmission line; thence with the NE right of way of said Company N 46 degrees W 833 feet; thence with said right of way line N 33 degrees 30 minutes W—crossing Highway No. 150, also crossing over L & N West Va., intersecting the fence that surrounds Ky. Utilities Co. sub-station at 1222 feet, crossing old county road—1824 feet, in all a distance of 517 feet to a stake; thence leaving said right of way line N 42 degrees E 1931 feet to a stake being 102 degrees W 102 feet from the center of the old Brodhead road at the entrance road to Hunt residence; thence S. 66 degrees E—crossing old Brodhead road at 165 feet, crossing original Boone Trail Road at 680 feet, passing 150 feet north Heltons barn, residence and barn, in all a distance of 3882 feet to a stake at the base of Tr. 7, extending to Carter Owens, et al., also being 472 feet West of the NW corner of present City Limits; thence East 472 feet to the present NW corner of city limits; thence south with the west line of present city limits 4660 feet to the beginning.
