## City Council Forfeits Pay, Will Hire Extra Policeman

In a unanimous action this week, the mayor and all members of the Mt. Vernon City Council agreed to forfeit their salaries as city officers and use the money to defray the cost of hiring a third-city policeman. City Judge Larnie Durham, in an interview later, also agreed to donate a sum equal to a councilman's salary.

Earlier in the called meeting Wednesday night the Council set up a tentative schedule for the new policeman. There are several applicants.

The plan is to have the new man relieve each of the two present officers for one and one-half days each week, and to work on Saturdays with one of the other officers.

The two policemen have been working on a schedule of seven days a week, and the council felt that some relief should be given them.

In discussing the decision to forfeit salaries, Mayor Carl Brown said, "I took this job to try to help this town and I think this is one way of helping it. The Council agreed."

In other action, the council accepted the offer of Mr. and Mrs. Carl Leach to grant the city water works an easement through the Leach property to the Owens Subdivision.

In view of other difficulties, however, it appeared that the easement alone would not result in immediate city water service for the subdivision residents.

The distance that the main must travel seems to be prohibitive economically, according to one source.

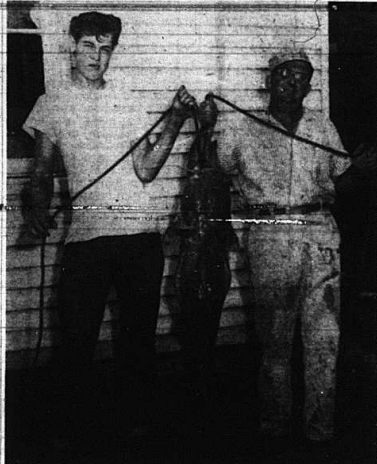

## Congress May Establish Rural Life Commission

**Senator Cooper Supports Bill**

Sen. John Sherman Cooper said this week that the establishment of a second Country Life Commission could "give to farm families new assurance that their welfare continues to be of primary importance to the welfare of the nation as a whole."

Cooper expressed the hope that the House Committee on Agriculture, holding hearings on the proposal to establish a Presidential Commission on Country Life—on the fifth anniversary of the first such Commission, appointed by President Theodore Roosevelt.

Recommendations of that committee led to agricultural extension and the county agent system, 4-H Clubs, co-op teaching, the Federal Land Bank, and a system of farm credit, farm-to-market roads, parcel, soil conservation and reforestation programs.

Cooper's statement was made before the Family Farm subcommittee of the House Committee on Agriculture, holding hearings on the proposal to establish a Presidential Commission on Country Life—on the fifth anniversary of the first such Commission, appointed by President Theodore Roosevelt.

ORDINANCE NO. 255

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF MT. VERNON, KENTUCKY, ACCURATELY DEFINING THE BOUNDARIES OF THE UNINCORPORATED TERRITORY PROPOSED TO BE ANNEXED TO THE PRESENT CITY BOUNDARY.

DOES ORDAIN AS FOLLOWS:

Section I. That the City of Mt. Vernon, Kentucky, desires to annex the following unincorporated territory to the now existing boundaries of the City of Mt. Vernon, to-wit:

corner of same; thence S 72 degrees W 440 feet to a stake; thence S 63 degrees 30 minutes W 257 feet to a stake; thence S 77 degrees W 250 feet to a stake; thence S 89 degrees 30 minutes W 89 feet to a stake; thence N 79 degrees 30 minutes W 57 feet to a stake; thence N 82 degrees W 108 feet to a stake; thence N 64 degrees W 205 feet to a stake; thence N 69 degrees W 168 feet to a stake; thence S 62 degrees 30 minutes W 438 feet to a stake, intersecting with the NE right of way of the Ky. Utilities Company Transmission line; thence with the NE right of way of said Company N 46 degrees W 833 feet; thence with said right of way line N 33 degrees 30 minutes W—crossing Highway No. 150, also crossing over L & N R. R. over tunnel, intersecting fence that surrounds Ky. Utilities Co. sub-station at 1322 feet crossing county road 100 feet; thence N 42 degrees E 1931 feet to a stake, being S 42 degrees W 102 feet from the center of the old Broadhead road at the entrance

road to Hunt residence; thence S 66 degrees E—crossing old Broadhead road at 165 feet, crossing original Boone trail road at 680 feet, passing 150 feet north Helloms barn, passing between Hysingers residence and barn, in all a distance of 3882 feet to a stake at the base of T.V. Tower—along to Carter Owens, et al., also being 472 feet West of the NW corner of present City Limits; thence East 372 feet to the present NW corner of city limits; thence south with the west line of present city limits 4460 feet to the beginning.

Tract No. 2. Beginning at a stake in the present city limits and being in the present north boundary a distance of 377 feet west of the NE corner of present city limits and also being in the west right of way line of the L & N R. R. property line; thence N 28 degrees E 320 feet with the west property line of 1834 feet; in all a distance of 1542 feet to a stake; thence leaving said right of way line N 42 degrees E 1931 feet to a stake, being S 42 degrees W 102 feet from the center of the old Broadhead road at the entrance

thence N 51 degrees W, a distance of 1366 feet crossing present U. S. Highway No. 25 to a stake in the west shoulder of said highway and the same point being in the intersection of old U. S. No. 25 which leads to Horseshoe Bend; thence due west a distance of 1164 feet crossing Negro Town Road to a stake 12 feet west of said road; thence S 36 degrees W a distance of 1691 feet to a point in the property line between Willard Hammond and Robbins; thence N 6 degrees West with Willard Hammond property line, a distance of 242 feet to a stake in said property line; thence S 29 degrees west, a distance of 792 feet to a point in the north boundary of the present city limits, also the same said point being a distance of 716 feet east of the N. 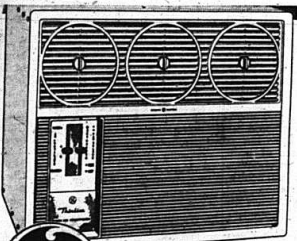

# Farm And Home News

## Brucellosis Testing

The area brucellosis testing program in Rockcastle County is progressing very well according to Dr. James Laughlin, area veterinarian.

The county has been divided into 50 communities by the Rockcastle County Brucellosis Committee, with the help of some other cattlemen that were appointed to do this job. These men also appointed a committee member for each one of these areas to line up the cattle for testing in their prospective communities.

At the present time we have six communities that have completed their first test. These communities will be completely finished as soon as their re-testing is completed.

These areas are: (1) Area between Roundstone and Disputa. From Roundstone to Walnut Grove area to county line. (2) Area East of Highway North of Roundstone. (3) Area West of US 25 North of Sawyer. (4) Copper Creek Area. (5) Buffalo Creek, Elkhorn Branch and Eagle Creek.

The area from Roundstone to Hurricane Hill is being tested at the present time by Dr. Rudolph Burdette and will be completed after more days of testing. The area from Broadhead to Lincoln County line on U.S. 150 has one more day of testing in it. Dr. Porter of Lancaster, who has bought Dr. Marx's practice, will finish that area.

The area north of Broadhead on the Old Copper Creek Road has had one day of testing in it by Dr. Marx, Lancaster. There is one more day of testing in the Negro Creek Area which will be completed by Dr. Burdette.

Dr. Hicks from Stanford is back from vacation and will start testing in the Ottawa area. Dr. Lackey or his assistant, Dr. Wuldrige will start testing on Highway 461 in the near future.

Current areas are being lined up by the following men: Bradley Saylor—Highway 461 area; Clyde Sutton—Old Copper Creek Road area; Wallace Proctor—Ottawa area; Bradley Brock—area west of Broadhead; Colson Stevens—Negro Creek area; Taft Bullock—Patton-Moore—Hansford area; Ott Kirby—Well Hope—Old Chestnut Ridge area; Joe Blackburn—Rocky Bend—Beech Grove area; also Sand Hill—Victory area.

Areas completed and line-up men for the areas are as follows:

Bill Wren—Areas west of U.S. 25 North of Snyder. L. A. Alexander—Areas

East of U.S. 25 North of Snyder. Bill Stewart—Roundstone—Wildie area. Clyde Linville—Roundstone—Walnut Grove area. Matt Graves—Buffalo Creek area.

Dr. Finley of Richmond, will test the area. These students are: West of U.S. 25 and Mr. Henry Wynn will do the lining up for him.

On July 1st four veterinary students came to Rockcastle County and will start testing as soon as they are oriented to the area. These students are: Richard Featherston, Lexington; Paul Estes, Vaughn's Mill; James Neville, Birmingham, Alabama and Curtis B. Souley, Lexington. These students were slated to start testing July 3rd in the Pine Hill area. This area was lined up by W. A. Stokes.

Dr. Laughlin said the cattlemen in the county are cooperating in the county are keeping their cattle up and helping to handle them better than any county I have been in. Dr. Laughlin also stated the line-up men are helping immensely. If it were not for them it would be almost impossible to get anything done. I sincerely hope that the cattlemen of Rockcastle County are well pleased with the services we give them and if there are any problems relative to the brucellosis testing program feel free to talk them over with me.

## New Market For Pine Posts

A new outlet for pine, below saw-lumber size, has been opened in this general area. The company buying the posts is known as the Mountain Forestry Company. The company yard is located on the College Railroad Spur at Berea.

Interested producers should contact R. H. King, 41 Jackson St., Berea. His phone number is 3469.

The company is operating a machine which peels pine posts timber and poles in preparation for a preservation treatment. Peeled posts and materials are being shipped to Codell Bros., at Winchester. Codell's have installed a new pressure treating plant; the Omose preservative process is being used in preserving the fence posts, guard rail posts, other small poles and construction lumber.

Posts sizes and dimensions range from 5 1/2" diameter with 7 1/2" length to 10" in diameter with 16" length. Standard rails posts range in diameter from 7" to 10" and 6 1/2" in length.

Although the most important bloom period for roses is in the spring, many varieties will continue to develop buds throughout the summer and fall. To encourage blooms, some home gardeners let the first blossoms remain on the plant. The bushes then make good growth by fall when some flowers can be cut.

The flowerheads which are not cut should be clipped off just above the top-most leaf after the petals fall. This will encourage continued blooming. This suggestion is found in a recently revised publication, "Roses for the Home" by the U. S. Department of Agriculture, says Miss Martha Owen, home demonstration agent, in Rockcastle County.

Other valuable suggestions from the bulletin:

For best keeping and best color, cut the bud in late afternoon just before the petals start to unfold. Leave at least two leaves between the cut and the main stem.

To avoid injuring the bush, use a sharp knife or sharp garden scissors when you cut roses. Breaking or twisting roses will damage the stem and permit diseases to develop.

To much cutting can starve the bush and affect its growth and future bloom. Cutting too many long-stemmed roses will weaken bushes by removing too many leaves. This holds true for established plants as well as those with their first season of bloom.

Hybrid tea roses usually have three leaflets at the top of the rose stem and below that a spray of five leaflets. When cutting these blooms, make the cut just above the top-most spray of five leaflets if the stem is weak; if it is particularly thick, the cut may be made lower.

"Roses for the Home" gives pointers on the culture of home garden roses, and also on disease and insect control. It also describes different classes of bush and climbing roses. Single copies of "Roses for the Home" (HG-25) are free upon writing to the Office of Information, U. S. Department of Agriculture, Washington 25, D. C.

## THE RIGHT TO KNOW

The Publisher's Auxiliary, a newspaper for newspapermen, this week carried as its number one story on the front page an account of an address made by an Iowa editor to a group of secondary school educators.

In his address, the editor, W. Earl Hall of the Mason City Globe-Gazette, warned the educators of two disturbing tendencies which exist in America today. These are, Mr. Hall said, the lack of concern of high school youngsters about freedom of the press, and the denial of access to public records by government officials.

Now, before our present spiel is marked off as another tirade against public apathy and in favor of more appreciation of newspapers by the public, let us hasten to say that, regardless of what we may think, the right to know has been—and will continue to be—if not our only, then certainly one of the most important safeguards against the exploitation of our citizens and against the existence of corrupt public officials.

It should have taken only one glance at the front page headlines of almost any daily newspaper in the country during the past two weeks to convince any skeptic that, without the protection offered by a free press and free access to records and information, unimaginable stories of pecuniary persuasion and official incompetence would never reach the ears of those of us who foot the bill for our government—the taxpayers.

The threat of secrecy exists not only at the national level, but also on the state and local levels. This is not an alarmist essay intended to write an epitaph for our present way of life. It is a simple statement of fact and a reminder to us all that, unless we take an interest in our government at all levels and demand to know those things that the law says we should know, we can expect to be gradually deprived of the basic right to know.

The founding fathers of this country realized the importance of an informed citizenry when they wrote into our Constitution the First Amendment. Judges and legislators since that time have wisely upheld the right to know as basic to our democratic government.

The laws of our nation and state are explicit in setting forth what we as citizens have a right to know. It is up to us all to maintain an interest in these things and to see that we are not deprived of them.

## Signalites

The City Council of Mt. Vernon is to be commended for its unselfish action this week in forfeiting salaries in order to pave the way to hiring an additional policeman. The new officer will relieve the pressure on the other two officers of working every day, and, as the mayor said, "help the town."

This act of these men should serve as a not-to-egotize hint to the rest of us to give a little of our time and effort to "help the town."
