Many a Beraean will try to prove this as fact by citing bystanders who witnessed the happening—or by pointing out the exact tree which suffered thus for art.

Ernie got the chance in 1949 to display his art when he was picked from a group of 250 to show audience to substitute for the show's star, Red Foley, who was ill.

From there the boy who said he just couldn't "help singing" advanced by bounds. He was even commissioned a Kentucky Colonel.

One critic characterized him as a "combination of Paul Robeson, Perry Como, and Singin' Sam." Another described his voice as

being like "a friendly hand-shake."

Also coming is Red Foley, another Beraean native. With him he is bringing performers on his ABC-TV Country Music Jubilee show from Springfield, Mo.

State Safety Commissioner Don S. Sturgill reported that 10 per cent more criminal complaints were made in the first quarter of 1958 than were made during the same period last year.

He said areas hardest hit by the recession showed the greatest increase.

School Officials Get Warnings On Safety

FRANKFORT, Aug. 25—Public-school superintendents have been warned to take stern precautions in the 1958-59 term because of recurrence of the school-bus tragedy in Floyd County, Feb. 28, when 26 pupils and the bus driver drowned. State Supt. of Public Instruction Robert R. Martin mailed the warning Friday.

LOUISVILLE, Aug. 23—A. Scott Hamilton, Commonwealth's attorney of Jefferson County, announced Saturday night he will support Lt. Gov. Harry Lee Waterfield for the Democratic nomination for governor next spring.

Hamilton's announcement indicated a break in Jefferson County's solidity for Wilson W. Wyatt for the Democratic nomination.

The new appointees are well known in Rockcastle County. Clyde Linville is superintendent of city schools, and Billy P. Cass, of Brodhead, is assistant conservation agent and does general farming.

County Director of Pupil Personnel John L. Saylor said anticipated enrollment will be about the same as last year—some 2,750 in the entire system.

He said there will be 111 classroom teachers this year.

There are seven beginning teachers in the rural schools, although many other schools will have different teachers than last year.

Brodhead High School will have a new music teacher, Melvin Isdale, who studied at Bera.

Other new teachers at Brodhead will be Robert Lay, who will teach science, and William Cash, who will teach mathematics. Both studied at the University of Kentucky.

At Livingston High School, new teachers will be Sylvia Corey teaching home economics, and Willard Whitaker.

Since work on the Roundstone School—which was originally planned to be completed Aug. 22—is not yet finished, there will be 49 rural and two consolidated schools in the county system this year.

Sign-Up Day Is Monday For Soil Bank Program

The sign-up in Rockcastle County for the 1959 Conservation Reserve of the Soil Bank will open Monday at the county Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation office in Mt. Vernon, Chairman Shellie Mullins has announced.

The first step in the sign-up is for the farmer who is interested in the program to come to the county office and request that annual rental payment rates be established for his farm.

At the same time, the farmer should bring with him information to be used by the County ASC Committee in establishing rates for his farm.

The chief factors needed, Mullins said, are acreages and yields of the three principal crops on the farm for the past two years and acreages for other land use on the farm.

The Government makes an annual rental payment for the cost of establishing the conservation practices.

Other counties in the district are Pulaski, Whitley and Bell.

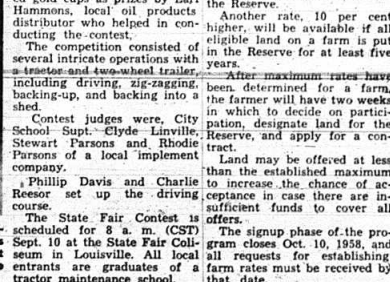
The Rockcastle County Fiscal Court, the City of Mt. Vernon, the county school system and the city school all lend support to the local library system.

The bookmobile operates 11 days a month during the nine regular months of school, and five days a month during the summer. It also visits Brodhead and Livingston once a week.

The library is housed in the council room of the Mt. Vernon City Hall, and is open to the public every Saturday from 8 a. m. to 3 p. m.

Books which the library does not have on the particular subject can be borrowed from the library extension division.

County-wide service through the bookmobile is emphasized rather than strictly local service at the library headquarters.

If no one gives us the information, it is doubtful we will build the lines when we begin construction.

To clear up misconceptions on some telephone rates, Bruner said that rural line mileage charges are made only to persons receiving telephone service.

Graded service is one, two or four persons on a line. There are no line mileage charges on multi-party rural service. The customer is charged only the base multi-party rural rate and for toll calls.

Bruner also said party line service will be considerably different under a dial system. Only the number dialed will ring. Under the present party line system, all phones on a line ring.

Bruner stressed the importance of notifying the company of a desire for a telephone. Persons wanting telephone service under the dial system should contact personnel at the exchanges at Mt. Vernon or Brodhead, by letter or in person, he said.

Bruner also asked property owners to cooperate with the company in getting easements for rights-of-way for lines.
