## BASKETBALL

The speedy "Devils" of Livingston clash Friday night on their home floor with the tall and talented Hustonville Tigers, in what promises to be a wide open ding-dong offensive battle between two fast breaking ball clubs. Hustonville was last years district champion, and many coaches predict that they will be at the top again this year. The Tigers have most of their starting five back for this season. Their shortest starter this

year is 6' 1", their tallest player 6' 4". The Tigers average 6' 2 1/2".

The Livingston-Blue Devils, who have won 33 out of their last 69 games, lost four of last year's starters plus two top reserves. 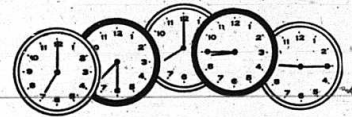

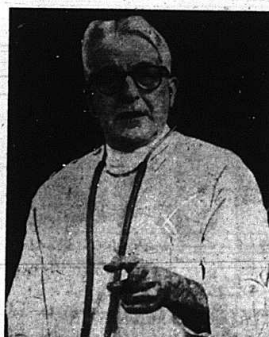

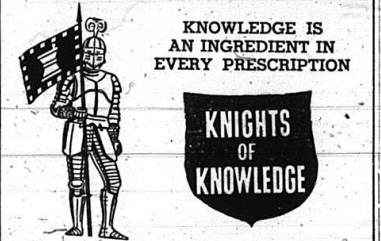
