## Selecting An Economical Dairy Ration

The feed costs in a dairy operation usually constitute about half the total cost, so it is important that the feed cost be kept to a minimum.

When making up a dairy ration three things should be kept in mind:

1. Total digestible nutrients (TDN).
2. Digestible or total protein and
3. Cost of the feeds in relation to milk prices.

Select foods that furnish the most TDN with sufficient amounts of digestible proteins at the least cost.

The amount of protein needed in the form of grains and other concentrates depends on the protein content of the hay and silage fed.

Generally speaking, the nutrients supplied by roughage cost less than those supplied by concentrates.

Liberal amounts of roughage should be fed. A cow should maintain her body and produce some milk on roughage alone. Concentrates should be fed in relation to the amount of milk produced and in relation to milk price.

Choose a concentrate mixture that is needed to complement the roughage that is available. The following suggestions may

be helpful in determining the concentrate mixture to feed:

With first-quality legume hay or legume silage or good quality mixed hay or silage, feed a 14 percent protein mixture.

With average-quality mixed hay or silage, feed a 16 percent protein mixture.

With grass or oat hay and corn silage, feed an 18 percent protein mixture.

When buying ready-mixed concentrates choose a mixture with a protein content that fits the roughage program. Make sure the mixture has a low fiber content and includes ingredients rich in TDN. Feeding more protein than is needed is wasteful.

A few cents saved on each 100 pounds of concentrates can amount to several dollars between now and spring.

### State Extension Service Backing Farm-City Week.

The second annual National Farm - City Week, scheduled November 21-27 inclusive, is receiving the support and assistance of the Kentucky Agricultural Extension Service for two reasons, says E. J. Nesius, Associate Director.

1. "If the people in the cities have a better understanding of the group which is rapidly be-

coming a minority group (farmers), city people then can be better informed when there is a matter of community, state or national interest on which a decision must be made and which will affect rural dwellers.

2. "Problems of production, marketing, distribution, and consumption cannot be attacked singly now; they should be put into one group for consideration. This 'lumping' of factors will help farmers and city dwellers understand each other's problems; and will bring together all segments of the population at a working unit."

Nesius noted that transitions have a material and significant effect upon our total economy.

He added: "The minute we are concerned with total processes—production, marketing, distribution, consumption—we are involving all persons in the community, from producer through ultimate user."

The week-long observance will be keyed by exchange of ideas, problems and ways of life of farm and city dwellers. Civic, religious, educational and professional groups, as well as school, business and industrial agencies, will join the observance.

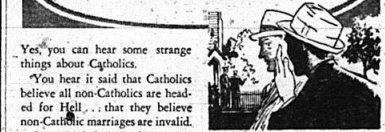

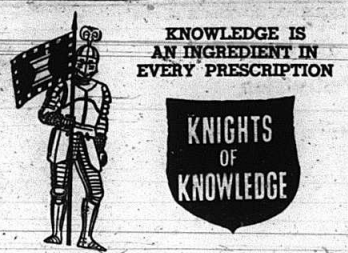

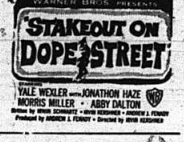
