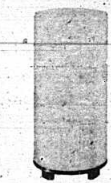

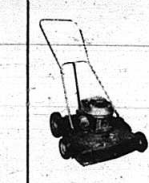

## Farm And Home News

### New Fabrics And Care:

That was the subject of the October lesson in homemakers clubs.

The homemakers may expect to find many new fabrics such as acrilan, Dynel, Arnel, Dacron, Zefrin and Zerol. Also, in the ready-to-wear and piece goods department, you can now see the results of research by the many textile companies. Wool, Cotton and silk now take their place along with the ever increasing number of man-made fibers.

"King Cotton" has really taken on new qualities due to the minimum care finishes that are now being used on fabrics.

### Care Of Fabrics:

No one phase of the fabric picture has changed more in the past few years than the methods used in caring for garments made of present day fabrics. Twenty-five years ago, few of us would have even dreamed that a man's suit could be satisfactorily washed in a washing machine, or that color would be put into the fibers in the process of manufacture as to become a part of them, and thus greatly reduce fading.

Completely washable garments are available today, as are fabrics that are colorfast to light, water, and perspiration. However, we cannot say that clean garments made from these modern fabrics in the same way we did those of 25 years ago. It is evident that if we are to choose clothing to give satisfaction it is of increasing importance to:

1. Buy for the use intended, and the care you wish to give the garment.

Make use of available labels of hang tags on ready-to-wear and labels on bolts of materials. Read these labels for information on performance and care. Save the labels, and follow the instructions in washing, dry cleaning or pressing.

### 4-H Tobacco Show And Sale:

The Somerset 4-H District Tobacco Show and Sale will be held at the Farmers Tobacco Warehouse in Somerset, Ky., Dec. 5 and 6. Tobacco should be brought in Friday, Dec. 5, and arranged on the floor.

Judging and the sale will be Saturday, Dec. 6.

The Richmond 4-H Tobacco Sale will be held Dec. 12. This year the sale will be at Madison Tobacco Warehouse Company on North Third Street in Richmond, Ky.

The tobacco must be unloaded at the warehouse on Thursday, Dec. 11.

Any bonifide 4-H members who have carried a tobacco project this past year are eligible to enter tobacco in either of the above mentioned sales.

### Economics Of Producing Feeder Pigs:

A farmer can, with 252 bushels of corn and 1,100 pounds of 60 per cent supplement, keep one sow on his farm for a year and sell from her approximately 18 market-weight hogs at an average of 18 cents per pound, and figured on the basis of 250-pound hogs, he would gross \$84.

He can take this same 252 bushel of corn and 1,110 pounds of 60 per cent supplement, keep five and one-half sows and sell an average of 88 feeder pigs annually. Using the average price received in Missouri Feed-

ers Pigs Sales over the past three years, these 88 pigs would gross \$1,375.

For a difference of \$791, it is assumed that on this program, ample returns would be provided for the sows.

### Rockcastle County Livestock Improvement Association:

In a recent meeting of the Rockcastle County Livestock Improvement Association, the following program of work was set up for the coming year.

1. Dairy Program—encourage ten more dairy farmers to sell Grade "A" milk; try to get 5 more dairymen to go on Weigh-A-Day-A-Month Record Program for 1958-59; hold a dairy field day sometime during the year.

Clyde Linville was elected chairman of the Dairy Field Day Committee.

2. Livestock Show—get information on suggested show rings for beef and dairy cattle and then call another meeting of the fair and shows commit-

tee to determine the possibilities of holding a livestock show in Rockcastle County in 1959.

3. Cooperate in holding a Feeder Pig Sale and a Feeder Calf Sale.

4. Try to get 5 beef producers in the county to participate in a beef herd evaluation plan.

5. Hold beef-tour sometime in the fall of the year. G. D. Burton was elected as chairman of the Beef Tour Committee.

6. Help complete the Brucellosis Eradication Program for Rockcastle County.

7. Plan membership drive to get more farmers to join the

**Brucellosis Lab Sets Record In Number Of Tests**

Agriculture Commissioner Ben Butler reports 57,854 blood samples were tested for brucellosis in the laboratories of the Division of Livestock Sanitation during October.

Butler said this is a record high for any single month's activity by the Division.

These blood samples were taken from 38,404 head of cattle in the 21 counties now being "area tested" in the brucellosis eradication program and 9,250 cattle that passed through public stockyards and returned to the farm, he said.

In addition to the blood samples handled, the Division's laboratories checked 6,154 milk samples that were obtained for the ring test method of brucellosis detection.

The ring test is used as a supplement to the blood testing for brucellosis identifications. Under the ring test plan a sample of milk is taken from a herd and tested to see if brucellosis is evident within the herd—the disease is isolated by the blood test method.

Butler also reports that the Kentucky Board of Agriculture has decided to waive the rule requiring that Kentucky feeder sheep purchased at public stockyards and going back to the farm must be dipped during the month of November.

Butler emphasized that the dipping rule was waived for the month of November only and that the stockyards handling the sale of each flock must notify the Kentucky Department of Agriculture of the name and address of the purchaser as well as the number sold.

**State Fair Gross Income Went Down**

Audit of Kentucky State Fair Board for the period of June 30, 1957 to June 30, 1958 has been completed. The audit was made by Ernst and Ernst and includes the State Fair and Exposition Center operation.

Annual gross income was down from \$1,152,193 to \$1,067,903 and expense was down \$105,037 for the year. The operation showed an operating profit of \$47,324; however, bond

and interest requirements amounted to \$368,000, which when taken into account, shows a loss of \$318,675 for the year ending June 30, 1958.

Charles F. Atkinson, Secretary and Controller, pointed out that the operation of an entirely new plant the size of the Exposition Center is a complex and difficult job. This operation differs from any other in the nation so that there were few guide posts to follow. From the experience gained, the management is gradually withdrawing from a promotional activities in favor of a rental business.

"Trying to guess what entertainment the public will buy and gambling with the weather is a pretty hazardous business," Atkinson commented.

The audit shows that excellent progress is being made in some areas. For example, Operating Expense for 1958 was reduced \$65,133 from the previous year; and, included in Maintenance Expense was \$8,889 for improvements to grounds, buildings and equipment.
