What Shall I Plant?

One of the questions most often asked by new home owners and also by those who have older homes where trees for shade and ornamental effects, is "What kind of a tree shall I plant?" Selection in some of the most serious problems to be solved in connection with the plantings around a home. Nothing can be more discouraging than to plant a tree and in 20 years when it has reached a nice size, to have it fall victim to disease and insect damage. It is impossible to say that any one tree will not become diseased, but certain kinds are known to be subject to disease and the home owner should be warned of this possibility.

Much of the printed information about trees is based on their behavior along the Atlantic Coast which is quite different in climate from that of Kentucky. Fortunately, Kentucky has a wealth of native trees that lend themselves admirably to landscape plantings. Of course, there are new varieties of trees coming on the market all the time, but to do with these is to wait until they have proven themselves and not be carried away by gaudy advertising.

Selecting Trees For Shade

There are three sizes of trees—large, medium and small—and the amount of space available will largely determine the kind of tree to plant. After the

problem of selecting kinds that will grow satisfactorily in the type of soil where they are to be planted. For example, some kinds will endure a soil that is inclined to be damp, or even wet, while others require a drier soil. Others may require a deep, reasonably fertile soil, and still others will do well on a soil that is rather shallow and not so rich.

Trees have definite shapes or forms, and when unpruned will retain their natural shape. Some trees are round, some open and spreading, some others will be cone-shaped, and still others may be vase-shaped. Choose the form of growth best suited to the individual home. The round or open kinds look well around the one-story home, while the two-story house, depending on the agriculture, could accommodate almost any form of growth. Also keep in mind that some trees have very heavy foliage, and grass does not grow under the branches. Other trees will have a more open foliage that allows some light to filter through, thus permitting grass to grow. Some kinds of trees have fruits that in some instances are attractive and even edible, like the pecans. Still others have fruits that are not so attractive and may even become a nuisance. Walnut trees and the Kentucky Coffee tree fit in this category.

One very important thing to keep in mind in selecting trees is the fall color of the foliage. It is possible to have trees that will create many beautiful colors in the fall. Also, some kinds have interesting forms of branching and twig growth and thus become attractive in the winter. It is best to pay no attention to what your neighbor may have for shade, but to select the kinds best suited to your individual needs, using the information given above as a

guide.

Knowing how large a tree will grow helps determine the distance it should be located from the house to provide shade and at the same time leave enough space for it to develop without drastic pruning. Small trees such as flowering crab, dogwood, redbud, hawthorn, hazzorthorn, serviceberry, etc., may be used for framing the house. Again, these trees should be carefully selected for suitability of their soil, moisture and other requirements. Some of them also have showy, hardy fruits that add to their attractiveness, and these things should be considered as well as the bloom. Most of the small trees really prefer to be located where they will have some shade either from other trees or the house.

The following is a partial list of trees, divided according to size, color and subject to disease.

SMALL—Sweet Gum, Tulip Poplar, Red Oak, Hackberry, Chinquapin, Osage, Black Oak, White Ash, Blue Ash, Bald Cypress, Linden, Ginkgo, MEDIUM—Pin Oak, Flowering Yellowwood, Sugar Maple, Norway Maple, Laurel Oak, Willow Oak, Pagoda Tree, Kentucky Coffee Tree, Black or sour gum, Persimmon, Goldenrain tree. **SMALL**—Flowering Crab Apple, Dogwood, Redwood, Red Haw, Shining Thorns, Flowering Cherries, Weeping and Upright), Russian Olive, Golden-chain tree and Washington Thorne.

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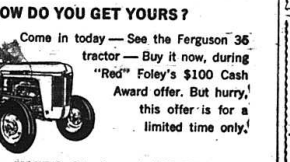

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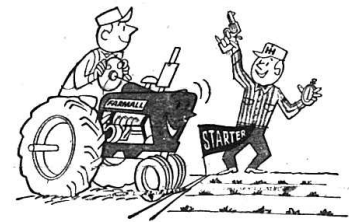
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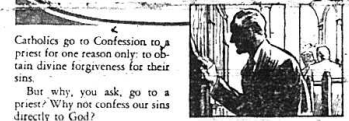
