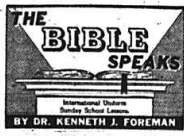

**The Great Refusal**  
Lesson for March 1, 1959

A DOUBLE meaning can be found in some of Jesus' parables. A triple meaning, if you include the simple literal words of the stories. For instance, take the parable which in old-fashioned English is called the parable of the Wicked Husbandmen. In more modern English it would be the story of the Wicked Tenant Farmers. The first and simple meaning is just the story. Like so many that Jesus told, this one both sounds as if it is Dr. Foreman might have actually happened, and as if it were too fantastic ever to happen. It is the story of a farm owner who tried to collect from his tenants but they beat up all his agents, one after another. Finally the owner sent his son. But this only stirred the tenants to murder. If we kill the man's only son, they said to each other, then the vineyard will be ours. So they killed him.

**The Tragic Pattern**  
With this last word of Jesus a third depth of meaning in this parable comes to light. Jesus was not only predicting his own death at the hands of those who should have made him most welcome; and not only predicting the passing of the Kingdom of God out into the world. He was suggesting a tragic pattern which has been repeated over and over again in history. Those wicked tenants are not merely certain priests in long ago Jerusalem; they are the Refusers of God everywhere and at all times. God gives to man so much, and demands (comparatively) so little: like the owner in the parable. But man, confronted by God, makes over and over again the Great Refusal. Man wants the earth for himself; he does not want to share it even with the Creator. But men who refuse God are in reality not destroying him; they are destroying themselves.

**Shadow of Calvary**  
Jesus ended his blunt, ugly tale with a question: "What will the owner do next?" His hearers knew. The least the tenants could expect would be to lose their places. But more likely the owner would destroy them. Their "murder" would come back on their own heads.

So much for the story itself. But it was more than a story; that is, there was a meaning under its surface. It is on record that the leading citizen to whom Jesus told this tale of brutality and madness, immediately made plans to arrest him. They saw that Jesus was speaking about them. This was no simple rural Who-done-it! It was a sword-thrust, a stern prophecy, and they did not like it, one way or another. These men, you might say, were parole-experts, parabolists (sic) themselves. They saw in a flash what the Man from Galilee was

driving at. The owner of the vineyard was God; the tenant farmers were themselves. The vineyard was the Kingdom of God, with all its powers and privileges. God had entrusted the Jewish people, and especially their leaders and teachers, these chief priests and scribes among them, with his truth, his laws, the knowledge of his will. But instead of blessing the earth with these his gifts, they had tried selfishly to keep them for their very own. They had mistreated God's messengers the prophets. Now God's son was in their presence... but murder was in their minds.

One of the most chilling things Jesus ever said was his last word to these men who were plotting his death. "The Kingdom of God will be taken away from you," he said. That was a shocker. Every Jew grew up believing that his people had the exclusive right to the Kingdom of God. But Jesus said, "The Kingdom of God will be taken away from you, but it will be taken away." By rejecting him they proved themselves unworthy. But then what? Who would be the bearers of the Kingdom? It will be given, Jesus said, "to a nation producing the fruits of it." What nation? Rome, the British Empire, the United States? One thing is clear: No race and no nation have any exclusive right to the Kingdom; no exclusive right to be the Headquarters of God?

## Local Clubs May Abandon Annual Variety Show In Favor of Alternate Production

### Plan May Be Designed To Revive Renfro Valley

Members of two local organizations met at Renfro Valley Tuesday night for the purpose of returning Renfro Valley to prominence among the tourist trade, and for outlining new projects to make the Valley more attractive to outsiders.

The two clubs represented, the Rockcastle Jaycees and the Meridian Woman's Club, met primarily to consider a substitute production for the County Capers variety show, a four-year-old joint project of the two organizations.

In its place, a suggestion was made to produce the play that was being given in Washington's Ford Theatre the night Lincoln was assassinated. Instead of a short run, the play would be given every Friday night of the summer tourist season.

The play, "Arabella's Cousin," is a light production similar to those given on showboats during Lincoln's lifetime. Its production would be royalty-free since it is now part of the public domain, meaning that no copyrights exist on the play.

Its production is dependent, among other things, on the number of passes to be cast. In the event that too many actors are required, each part would have three understudies, freeing all participants from complete summer's commitment. The group will also request use of costumes from Berca Colliers, which has now discontinued Wildness Road.

A pageant type of entertainment on Friday night might draw enough tourists to the County to give local merchants, restaurant, motel and hotel operators a boost in business. An added incentive is the Saturday night Renfro Valley show, which might also be improved, could induce many to stay overnight in Mt. Vernon and at Renfro.

Several factors indicate that the production could be a success. Among these are the aforementioned closing of Wildness Road. In addition to the regular amount of tourists traveling through the park will be opened at Cumberland Gap this year and will have the benefit of statewide publicity to draw visitors. Many of these visitors will pass through Mt. Vernon en route to and from the park.

The production itself could gain much publicity from feature articles in view of the fact that it is connected with Abraham Lincoln. Birthdays is being observed all over the nation this year. A good season now could possibly carry over into next year.

## Farm Bureau Backs House

Farm Bureau legislative workers are throwing the full support of the nation-wide organization behind H. R. 10, which would give long overdue income tax relief to farmers and other self-employed taxpayers who still have a desire to save for their own old-age security.

In the Senate, a similar bill has been introduced by Kentucky Senator Thurston B. Morton (R-141) who has advised officials of the Kentucky Farm Bureau that "chances look good for passage of this bill in the House."

It will lose the Federal Government income tax revenues, it is time that we took some constructive action to give encouragement to those in our country who believe in the virtues of saving and planning for their own retirement security. A similar bill passed during last session, but failed in the Senate.

Under provisions of the bill, self-employed persons would be allowed to place a limited amount of savings each year in retirement or trust programs, and to deduct these savings as a deduction on the federal income tax form.

In official testimony favor of the legislation, Farm Bureau spokesmen in Washington have said that the bill would help to bring some degree of equality among employed and self-employed people. Under provisions of many modern-day labor-management contracts, retirement security are provided by employers at no cost to the employee. This means that such retirement plans each year.

Kentucky Farm Bureau officials have written to all Kentucky members of Congress, urging them to support this measure. Said Executive Secretary John W. Koon: "We consider this bill of utmost importance to Kentucky farmers. It will be of material help to thousands of our farmers who are conscientiously trying to plan for their own security in old age."

## Co-op Volume Is Record High

Overall volume for Southern States Cooperative and its affiliates hit an all-time high during the first six-months of the 1938-39 fiscal year, according to a mid-year report presented by L. O. Brumback of Richmond, Va., to members at their regional board meeting held in Berea, on Feb. 17.

Total volume was reported at \$94,312,000 for the same six-months of the previous year, an increase of 22 per cent.

Feed tonnage, up 6 per cent, also hit a new high. Total tonnage for the period was 501,382 tons.

Fertilizer tonnage was also up over last year. Total tonnage for the six-months was 96,931 tons, an increase of 10,025 tons.

Seed volume—down one per cent—amounted to \$2,152,000. Miscellaneous farm supply volume showed an increase of 25 per cent. Total volume for the six-month period was \$7,712,000.

The report also pointed out that volume in petroleum products was up over 6,300,000 gallons as compared to last year—an increase of 21 per cent.

# Farm And Home News

### Garden Planning

The season for gardening is fast approaching and careful consideration must be given to the plans for the home garden. Perhaps you have had the experience of having an over supply of one or two vegetables and an inadequate amount of others. In order to have a variety of vegetables for home use and for preservation, it is necessary to know the amount of each vegetable to plant for each person that is to be fed from the garden.

To help you to be able to plan an adequate garden for your family, several bulletins and guides have been developed by the Agricultural Extension Service. This material is available for you at no cost at the County Extension Office or it may be secured by writing to the County or Home Agent, Mt. Vernon, Kentucky, requesting such material.

**Crop Tips For 1959:** Varieties of crops are important to every farmer in this county. Extensive test over all areas for a period of years is the basis for recommending certain varieties of crops. These recommended varieties are the best performing varieties under Kentucky conditions that are available today.

Since the identity of most crop varieties cannot be determined from the appearance of seed, the use of certified seed is recommended wherever possible. Germination, weed and disease standards must meet rigid requirements in order to bear the blue tag denoting certification.

The varieties of crops recommended for 1959 are as follows. Only crops with superior named varieties are listed.

**CORN:** Yellow—US 13; Ind. 844D; Ky. 102—Silage and grain; Ky. 106A; Ky. 103; Ky. 105—Silage and grain. White—US 523W; Ky. 204.

**GRASSES:** Fescue—Ky. 31; Sudan—Piper, Smooth, Bruns, Southland, Achenbach; Orchard Grass—Kentucky Select (Short Seed Supply); Red Top, "Bluegrass" (name) varieties not available.

**LEGUMES:** Alfalfa—Atlantic; Ranger; Buffalo; Narragansett.
