## my husband wants to be Governor of Kentucky

Naturally, I am proud of my husband, as you are of yours. I wish it were possible for me to bring him to his every home in Kentucky and have you meet him personally and talk with him. But since that is not possible, let me tell you a few things about Harry Lee as I know him through the eyes and heart of a wife and a companion.

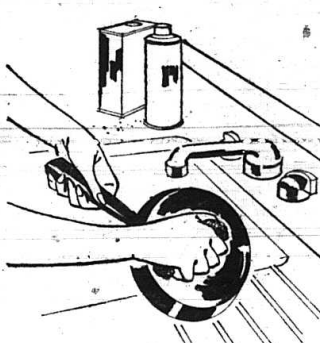

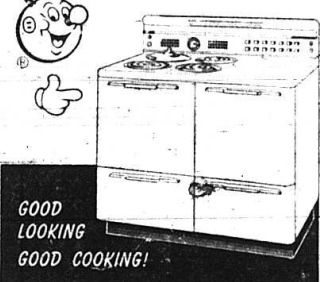

many as innocent man in his place would have done. Jesus' mind was filled with the thoughts of others rather than himself. The reader will find it revealing to read these stories of Christ's death carefully.

### Through the Cross

If you did not already know otherwise, you might think that as time went on, people who adored Jesus would prefer to forget that bitter ending of his life on the cross. Quite the contrary; Christians have always gone to some trouble to remember it. Every time we observe Communion we are proclaiming the Lord's death. The communion table in many a church has carved around it the words "In Remembrance of Me." That which holds the church's mind and heart is not merely the historical fact, that a certain teacher named Jesus was unjustly executed on criminal charges. The church believes that through the cross we have God's forgiveness. We believe that this was not a merely human tragedy. We believe that this was actually the suffering of God on our behalf, and in our place; that the self-sacrificing, dedicated, forgiving spirit of Christ is a revelation of God's own heart. Knowing that it is very simply: "Thou must love Me, who have died for thee."

At the Cross  
But there are two ways of believing this. One is the belief of admiration. What wonderful love this is, that the God should die for the unworthy, the innocent for the guilty; that God should offer up his own Son for us all! We can stand at a distance and admire this sacrifice, and get no good from it at all. We have to stand at the Cross, we have to believe in a more personal way than the way of admiration. The same Saint Paul who wrote that God gave up his own Son for us all, put it much more personally when he wrote, "I live by faith in the Son of God, who loved me and gave himself for me." (Gal. 2:20) Standing at the Cross, as no one can do for another but each one for himself, and you for yourself—standing there we see ourselves in a new way, we are forced to see that we are the same kind of people as put Jesus on that cross, we are sinners. We see God in a new way—we see him dealing with sin in a new way, taking the effects of it upon himself. And looking from the Cross, we see other men too, as brothers for whom Christ died.

### The Cross

Lesson for March 22, 1959

IN A POPULAR novel of some years ago, dealing with the time of Jesus and afterwards, the Roman officer who had to crucify Jesus is presented as being shocked by the whole idea, having seldom if ever seen a crucifixion. This is a historical slip on the author's part; for in the Roman world a far more brutal one than ours, fatal floggings and crucifixions were pretty common affairs. They were so common, in fact, that although we have four gospels each telling about the crucifixion of Jesus, not one gives any details at all about the actual crucifixion itself. Such details were not necessary; most readers of the gospels in those days had seen such things and did not need to be reminded.

### On the Cross

That was extraordinary there on Calvary was not the cross itself. There were three in use that one morning; the one on which Jesus died had very likely been used before and would be used again. They do not nowadays make the electric chair over for every new criminal.

No, the extraordinary thing was not the cross, as ugly an instrument of torture as ever seared the eyes of man. What the gospels take more pains in describing was what happened on the cross. Not two of the gospels tell precisely the same story, though they do not contradict one another. Luke's story has been selected for this week's study.

Consider a few facts that Luke's story highlights. First is that an innocent man hung on that central cross. That he died between two heads only brings out more strongly his own innocence.

Furthermore, it is extraordinary that this Jesus made no complaints about having been "framed" as

Rockcastle County has become one of twelve counties in Kentucky to be declared Modified Certified Brucellosis Free, it was announced this week.

Roy Brown, secretary of the Rockcastle Livestock Improvement Association, received the notification in a letter from State Veterinarian Robert H. Singer.

Brown, speaking for the Livestock group, said that the Association extends thanks to everyone who gave of time and effort to achieve the classification, emphasizing special praise for those who attended meetings, carried petitions to get the signatures of all livestock owners, and then return to get the cattle lined up for testing.

Brown said that Rockcastle farmers should be proud of the fact that Rockcastle has become one of a select group in the Brucellosis program. 21 counties are now in the testing phase of the program, 24 have completed petitioning and await declaration, and 29 are in the petitioning phase of the program.

Kentucky's goal is to have 20 counties Modified Certified Brucellosis Free by June 30.

Are you losing your social security monthly payments because you have insufficient knowledge of the Old-Age and Survivors Insurance provisions of the law?

R. A. Tweedy, District Manager of the Lexington social security office, says that some farmers in Rockcastle County are losing benefits either because they have not made application for payments or because they do not know enough about the law.

Farm people who have reached retirement age (women 62, men 65) and who have been engaged in farming for the past two or three years and have cleared at least \$400 in each of these years may now be able to qualify for monthly social security payments, Tweedy said.

## Highway Department Will Surface Roads

The Kentucky Department of Highways called today for bids April 3 on 415 miles of road improvements with almost 10 million of improvements slated for Rockcastle County. The bid call lists projects in 58 counties.

Blacktopping is proposed under the state's "initial treatment" program for approximately 320 miles of the total involved in the call for bids. All projects within the county concern bituminous surfacing under a program for placing the first time on roads having rock or gravel surfaces.

The Mt. Vernon-Broadhead (Old Mt. Vernon - Broadhead Road) from the junction of Ky. 1505, 0.1 mile east of the corporate city limits of Broadhead, and extending southeasterly to a junction with a county road (east of Rocktop), a distance of 2.6 miles.

The Broadhead-Spiro Road from US 150, one-half mile east of Ky 1505, to the intersection of Wabed Road at Spiro, a distance of 2.961 miles.

The West Jones Creek-Quail Road from Ky 70 at Quail to the Wabed-Mareburg Road, approximately 1.3 miles north of Wabed, a distance of 3.257 miles.

## Judge Tartar Blasts Drunken Driving, Juvenile Delinquency And Liquor Violations

With a blast at driving offenses, juvenile delinquency and liquor violators, Judge Roscoe C. Tartar of Somerset opened the March term of Rockcastle Circuit Court in Mt. Vernon Monday.

Judge Tartar, taking note of the number of traffic deaths in Rockcastle last year, stated that few counties, outside of Jefferson, had a larger rate of fatalities. Citing drinking and drunkenness as the primary cause of these accidents, the Judge said that anyone involved in an accident as a result of drinking should be held liable and ruled off the highways.

"Too often a check from the insurance company smooths out the protests," he added. "Deliberating on juvenile delinquency, Judge Tartar told the court that he thinks the problem here is not so severe as it is in Somerset, where, he felt, the money game are going to do with them."

Tartar said he frowns on the practice of treating juveniles in a separate set of laws. "If they are going to be tried and break the law to prove that they are men," he stated, "then they should be punished like men. Think of the money that is sent to prison just like an adult."

Tartar lauded local county officials for their "excellent" liquor law enforcement program. "They bring the violators to attend before the court," he added.

In instructing the Grand Jury Judge Tartar told them that their purpose is to "show violators that crime and violence do not pay, to show them that sooner or later every violator will stand before a court of law and answer for his crimes."

Fourteen cases have been placed on the docket to be heard during the present term of court.
