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## FOREST FIRES LACK BEAUTY

For sheer relaxation, few things compare with sitting before a raging fire on the coldest night of the winter, with a good book to read, and a well-broken pipe to smoke.

Conversely, few things compare in scope with the horrifying and destructive aspects of a forest fire raging beyond immediate control. The thoughtless acts which usually lead up to these fires certainly have few parallels in human experience.

We were treated to a front row seat at a forest fire Wednesday. As of this writing, it had been burning for approximately 45 minutes to an hour. In that short period of time it had spread to such far-flung dimensions that we were unable to determine just how far it ranged. We couldn't see the fire for the smoke, so to speak. Another observer informed us that the fire had spread from a pile of burning brush to consume, at the time, the young trees and gnarled of several rows of aged oaks.

Its origin, however, is not really important, when we stop to consider that it could have begun with a cigarette tossed into the crisp, dry brush, or with the intended burning-off of a tobacco bed.

What is important is that we annually see thousands of acres of good timber and young trees burnt over, and our wildlife is one of the most immediate casualties of these wasteful infernos.

Eastern Kentucky hasn't been blessed with gold and silver mines, enough industry, or an overactive population, but it has been given a wealth of forests and wildlife. It is little to demand of us that we be careful when burning rubbish, brush, or tobacco beds. Those forest fires also take lives and homes in their ramblings.

It wasn't a pretty sight we saw, if it was only an hour old.

## Farm Leaders In State Cite Education Problem

Kentucky's top farm leaders in 111 counties have listed "education" as the number one off-farm problem facing the rural people of the state.

This is only one of the surprising results of the statewide survey of facts and considered opinions of county Farm Bureau board members completed recently by the Kentucky Farm Bureau as part of a year-long self study of the organization.

When these top farm leaders were asked to list the most serious off-farm problems facing farmers, they listed educational problems first, with roads, taxation, public relations, size and cost of government, and labor problems following in that order.

These same leaders estimate that it now takes a statewide average of \$38,000 investment in land, buildings, equipment and livestock to produce an acre of crops in Kentucky, and say that it will take nearly \$56,000 ten years from now.

Taking a look at the trend toward contract farming, most of Kentucky's farm leaders believe that it is here to stay, and that more commodities will be affected in the near future.

They believe this new trend will step up specialization of production, increase the trend toward larger farm operations, and bring major changes in the marketing system for many farm commodities.

Other trends these leaders foresee for the future include more part-time farmers in Kentucky and fewer full-time farmers; and an accelerated growth of the livestock and dairy enterprises.

These are just some of the trends and factors that are being studied by county and state Farm Bureau leaders as a part of a comprehensive, year-long study of the Farm Bureau organization in Kentucky. State Farm Bureau President Burl S. St. Clair told a recent conference of county Farm Bureau presidents. "Although we are

proud of our past achievements as an organization, we know that we must prepare ourselves to cope with the future needs of our members and of farm people. All of us are determined to meet the challenge of the future."

## TOBACCO BED-BURNING CAN BE DANGEROUS IF CARELESS

A rash of fires in Bourbon County the other day points up the need for exercising particular care in burning off tobacco beds. Farmers in that County kept the fire department busy for almost a full day as engines rushed from one farm to another to extinguish fires that had been caused by live sparks from burning tobacco

beds. In another instance, a house from burning down after it had been ignited by sparks from a burning tobacco bed. Rockcastle farmers are urged to use extreme care when burning any part of your land.

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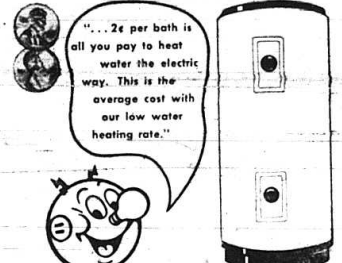

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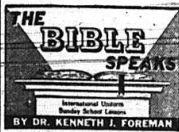

have been brought back to life after being obviously dead, a return to life does not in itself arouse the wonder it once did. Furthermore, emphasis on the physical resurrection of Jesus is in the right place? Visitors to certain hospitals can see things in the shape of human beings which nevertheless never act like human beings; they are more like vegetables. That a body is alive may be a tragedy, if the spirit and mind are not alive too. So the really important thing about Jesus is that he was and is alive, not that his mere body lived again.

**Meaning Without Facts**  
On the other hand, suppose we emphasize the meaning of the Resurrection, that Christ lives—more than that indeed—that because he lives we shall live also. Then we shall be striking the center of the message of Easter. But what happens if we say, at the same time, "We believe in the Easter facts" (meaning some sort of belief in immortality, perhaps)? We are not interested in the Easter facts? Strangely as it may seem, there are people who have just that point of view. When we get rid of all the fancy language they use, what they are saying comes down to this: We don't know what we are not interested in the Easter facts? We believe in the Resurrection? We are concerned with the meaning of what never happened.

To put it more fully in the facts and disregard the meaning of Easter is to build a solid foundation and leave it, a useless curiosity-come-alive again and walked out. Now the evidence for this fact is strong. More than one person who set out to show that the evidence is unconvincing, has wound up by believing it. A few years ago some one wrote a very learned article intending to prove that the body of Jesus could not possibly have been put into a separate tomb, and that the women were quite mistaken when they found an empty tomb—a mistake, because the body had never been there in the first place. But how did that writer arrive at such a conclusion? Only by the skeptical writing-off, as worthless, all the testimony there is in the Gospels that the women did know, very well, where the body was supposed to be, and that a mistake under the circumstances was impossible.

Nevertheless, if we never get our minds off the empty tomb and the physical resurrection, we shall miss too much. Nowadays especially, with all the medical miracles that are reported about people who

## Wool Sales Documents Must Contain All Facts

Chairman Shettle Mullins of the Rockcastle County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation office reminds wool producers to be sure that the sales documents they have received for selling wool during the past year contain all the information required under the wool incentive payment program.

It is particularly important, Mullins says, that the sales documents show the true net sales proceeds including deductions made for freight and other marketing charges. The county ASC office where the program is administered has the authority to adjust sales proceeds when charges are not shown. Where false information is filed, both the producer and the wool buyer are subject to penalties.

Producers will be eligible for payments to be made this year under the 1958 program if wool and unshorn lambs marketed not later than March 31 this year. Later marketings will be eligible for payments under the 1959 program.

Applications for payment under the 1958 program must be filed not later than April 30 of the county office. This cut-off date is necessary to permit a final accurate calculation of the average price received by farmers for wool during the 1958 marketing year. When the average price received for wool this summer, the payment rate will be announced and payments will be made to growers.

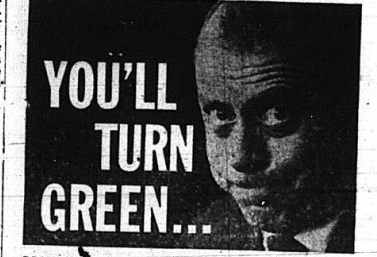
