Bible Material: 1 Samuel 2:12-21; 7. Devotional Reading: 1 Samuel 12:1-5.

One Plus God

Lesson for April 5, 1959

"ONE PLUS GOD" is a slogan that might fit many a strong life. It is not only the secret of such men as were the prophets of old, not only for Saint Paul and Saint Augustine and Martin Luther, and other famous persons admired by Christians. The reader should realize that this can be true of every one who puts his trust in God. The price of admission to the goodly company of the saints is in Dr. Foreman's not cheap, but it is a forever man's reach: Faith.



Loyalty This was true of the famous Old Testament hero named Samuel. He was what in football language is called a triple-threat man. He was a priest, prophet, judge, military advisor, and politician even says he was a writer, though of course he did not live long enough to have written the books that bear his name in the Old Testament. (They do not claim to have been written by him.) Before his time there had been no kings, and indeed not very much unity among the tribes of Israel. Under his leadership the tribes were better united, and it would not be much exaggeration to say that Samuel "kicked the tribes into shape" - the shape of a kingdom which he turned over to the first king-by-right, Saul. It is true that King Saul did not pay attention to Samuel's wisdom; but all the same, after the old prophet was dead, Saul thought so much of his advice that he actually tried to conjure him out of his grave just to hear him again. What was the secret of Samuel's power over Israel? First of all it was a contagious loyalty to the true God. It was a time when most men worshipped many gods. Even the Israelites did this. Samuel ran the risk of being looked at as

A crank or a fanatic; but such was his known loyalty to God that when he challenged Israel to throw away their idols, they did. There must have been something in his life that made even those primitive men sure that one-plus-God means greatness.

Prayer Another marked feature of Samuel's life was his prayers. We have on record the story of his very first prayer. It was not a begging request, not a "Gimme" prayer at all. It was "Speak, Lord; for thy servant heareth." Even as a boy he would rather hear what God has to say than to pour out words before God. How seldom it is that people in praying give God any chance to speak! The Lord seldom has much to say to a man who insists on talking every minute. Another feature of Samuel's prayer life was that he prayed for others, even when those others had turned their backs on him. Samuel did his best to persuade the Israelites not to have a king. He knew that "power corrupts" and he predicted accurately the injustice and tyranny which their future kings would show. But they wanted a king! All the same, yet in talking leave of them Samuel was not bitter. "Far be it from me that I should sin against the Lord by ceasing to pray for you," he said.

Wisdom Samuel was an example of what we nowadays call a circuit judge. He held court in three cities, including his home town. (This alone is remarkable.) He was not (on the one hand) the kind of religious person who retires to a cell and there passes his life in prayer. He was a man of affairs, trusted by high and low. He was not (on the other hand) the kind of religious person who keeps his religion with his hymnbook - in church, where he takes it out and gets loud and happy over it once a week - only once. Samuel on the contrary was a man whose religious faith was the foundation of his wisdom. Religion did not lift him "out of this world," it gave him insight into the problems of this world. His one-plus-God life was not for himself alone; God in life helped him to be a help to others. Perhaps one strong reason why there are not more persons who deserve that "One-plus-God" description, is that too many of us want to have God by the hand to serve ourselves rather than others.

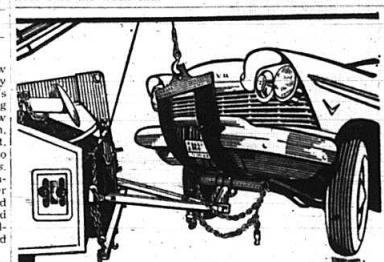

No long-time residents of Mt. Vernon who saw the woman, dressed in a pullover sweater and dark slacks, could identify her. Neither was any answer apparent as to the reason for her strange behavior.

April Is Ideal Month For Spreading Residues On Tobacco Plots

Farm residues, manure, tobacco stalks, cover crops, etc. should be applied NOW to fields selected by farmers, for their 1959 tobacco production, it was stated this week by Russell Hunt and Ira Massee.

The Kentucky Agricultural Extension Service tobacco specialists noted that early April is an ideal time for spreading residues, provided that they have not already been applied. Plowing will start soon, and these materials are most beneficial when plowed under than when spread after breaking has been completed.

Stalks and manure are the main residues. They should be applied to the fields after a soil test has been made to add supplementary fertilizer to the mixed commercial fertilizers that will be added to the fields. Past cropping history also should be taken into account when residues and mixed fertilizers are applied.

This addition of farm residues, the specialists say, is highly important, since tobacco needs nitrogen, phosphorus and phosphate for proper, profitable growth.

Gospel Song He Wrote Sung At Thomas' Rites

The voice of one of Rockcastle County's best known entertainers and businessmen was stifled early last Thursday when gospel singer Ruel O. Thomas died of uremic poisoning at Rockcastle Baptist Hospital.

Thomas, a native of Clinton County, came to Rockcastle in 1929 after meeting John Lair in Chicago. He was a member of the South-western Baptist Church and his wife, Flossie, and daughter, Mary, were also members of the church.

Thomas' first group, known as the Crusaders Quartet, consisted of he, his wife, Flossie, and his daughters, Mary and Mervyn. They were also members of other groups, his last being the Seventy-Six Quartet, in which Clay and Clifford Cotton joined Thomas and his wife.

In addition to his singing, Thomas was also known as a shrewd businessman, owning at the time of his death, the Farmer's Feed and Supply Store, a mill, an apartment house, several lots in Mt. Vernon and an Angus cattle farm in Clinton County.

Thomas' travels carried him throughout the southern states and into many metropolitan areas. He was frequently heard on broadcasts over NBC and CBS radio in places as far distant as South America, where he sang in Spanish. He was also a member of the American Baptist Church in Lexington over station WLAF. He and the Reverend were close friends at the time of his death. A graduate of Western Kentucky State College in Bowling Green, the gospel singer also attended Lincoln College, where he and his wife taught school before coming to Renfro Valley and resumed teaching during World War II. Thomas was much in demand at churches, county fairs, and community gatherings. He was much time to his work. Between business dealings and singing obligations, he said.

KU Will Spend \$16 Millions For Expansion

Kentucky Utilities Company is spending \$16,213,311 in 1959 on new and expanded facilities for supplying the growing electrical service requirements of the state. W. A. Duncan, Lexington vice president, in charge of operations, released the construction budget. He said all the projects included were part of the company's comprehensive program to assure the best possible service to customers and to provide for the growing electrical requirements of the state's rural, commercial, industrial and residential development.

Major items in the budget are: \$5,631,000 for completion of the fourth unit at the Green River Generating Station near Central City during 1959. This 100,000-kilowatt generating unit, costing a total of \$15,440,000, will be completed and operation in July. It will increase Green River's rated capacity to 235,000 kilowatts.

Complete the conversion of transmission lines and substations to higher operating voltages and right of way purchases, as part of a long-range plan to strengthen the Lexington area power supply network; \$152,000 during 1959 of \$376,000 total.

Cattle Grub Affects Much Stock In State

A high percentage of cattle in Kentucky are infected with the common cattle grub, a "larvae count" conducted last season by a Kentucky Experiment Station entomologist is an indication. The cattle grub is a manifestation of the heel fly, also known to scientists as the bot fly. During part of its life, the pest lives inside the animal's body; it emerges in the spring through the back, causing considerable damage to hides and wool. Dale Havis, the entomologist, said he examined 1,077 cattle of all types (beef and dairy) during his survey last season, checking for the larvae. Havis said 1,000 of the 1,077 cattle he checked were present.

Farm Bureau Not Split On Tobacco Supports

Wire service reports out of Washington have been playing out a difference in opinion between the tobacco states Farm Bureaus and the American Farm Bureau Federation over the Jennings Bill now before the House Agriculture Committee. These wire stories have been headlined by some newspapers in Kentucky, giving the impression that a wide rift has occurred within the ranks of the Farm Bureau. Actually, the American Farm Bureau Federation is still supporting the present tobacco program, in line with the official policy adopted at last year's meeting in Boston. The difference has arisen on the question of what is the best way to stabilize tobacco support prices. In other words, the issue is over how to carry out policy and not the policy itself. The Kentucky Farm Bureau must be stabilized in its support of the tobacco program. This problem is especially serious with respect to flue-cured tobacco, which burley producers know is closely tied to burley tobacco. If flue-cured producers lose a big share of their foreign market, cigarette dealers and smokers might shift to using a larger proportion of this lower-priced tobacco in lowered under this plan; but cigarettes.

Large Underground Room Discovered In Rockcastle By Madison Man And Scout

A Madison County minister and his Boy Scout companion, also of Madison County, have reported the discovery of a large "underground" room in northeastern Rockcastle County. The Rev. Bobby Jenkins and Scout Franklin Whitaker, said that they and other spelunkers from the area have made several trips into the cave in an attempt to determine if the discovery is new, whether others have been there before.

Jenkins said that the ceiling was not "as high" as the formations that are down there, but the most beautiful and striking that I have ever seen in a Kentucky cave.

Small openings in the walls of the room made the explorers believe they may lead to other rooms and possibly a series of caves. None of the explorers have found any evidence that the cave has been visited before, they said.

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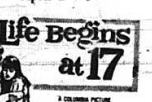

HEARTLESS INCIDENTS BELONG IN THE PAST

A heartless incident in Knox County Tuesday brings to mind the bloody organizing conflicts of the '30s, when the United Mine Workers Union first sought to saddle mine operators in the coal fields of Eastern Kentucky with obligations to their employees. At that time, the coal fields were definitely in need of a means by which to insure the rights of the miner, traditionally a laborer whose health is ruined by his occupation, and one who seldom received rich rewards for his labors.

A mine operator was driven from his pit Tuesday by picketing union men. Taken away by a small group of them, he was not seen alive after that. They found him with six bullet holes, four of which could have themselves caused immediate death, in his body. And some remembered the old days when things of this nature were common.

During the pseudo-wars of 20-odd years ago, mine operators, with an eye to protection of their interests, hired armed guards to oppose union inspired miners who marched in protest. It was a time in which violence was both anticipated and prepared for in the same instant; a time of violent tempers, harsh words, epithets, and brazen acts of ruthlessness. Some were maimed or crippled; some lost loved ones; others lost their lives.

Voicing threats of making that incident seem like a picnic, the U. M. W. rallied its forces recently to take another stand against the operators who refuse to meet union demands for pay increases. Despite these threats, no move was made by the operators to employ gunmen for their protection. In this day and age, they erroneously thought humanity and civility would prevail.

We are not siding with the operators, nor do we support the union in its demands. True, some controls must be exercised to safeguard the interests of miner and operator alike, but we fail to see how brutality can give aid to any argument along these lines.

It is not right for a non-union mine to pay a man \$3 a day for back breaking labor, but then it is hard to demand of a crippled industry that its operators give a man two-thirds of every ton of coal he mines. No other industry could survive with that pay scale as a basis.

Only time itself can provide witness to the success or failure of the U. M. W. to achieve its aims. Time, too, will either bear out or disprove the logic of the operators. Time may well dim the March 31 killing.

The records will show which side was successful in its demands. They will tell how those demands were compromised by both sides of the arbitration.

They will never prove that success was worth the taking of one human life, which in the end will not add that success in the least.

installation of additional protective equipment at Harlan; \$119,000 during 1959 of \$266,000 total.
Complete the construction of 53 miles of 161,000-volt line from the Green River plant to Morganfield and terminal facilities for initial operation at 69,000 volts; \$860,000 during 1959 of \$1,092,000 total.

Construct two and seven-tenths miles of transmission line from the River Queen substation near Greenville to tie into the Earlington-Hillsdale, 34,500 volt line and installation of additional substation equipment at the River Queen station; \$92,000 total cost during 1959.

Complete the relocation of 10.5 miles of transmission line between Frankfort and Versailles for highway construction; \$83,000 during 1959.

In addition to these projects, the budget provides \$40,000 for miscellaneous power generation construction; \$2,793,000 for other transmission system improvements; \$5,325,000 for distribution system improvements, and \$868,000 for other construction projects.

KU furnishes electric service to 509 communities and adjacent rural areas in 77 Kentucky counties and to 10 communities in Tennessee.
