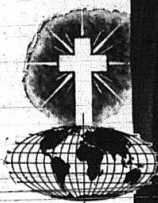

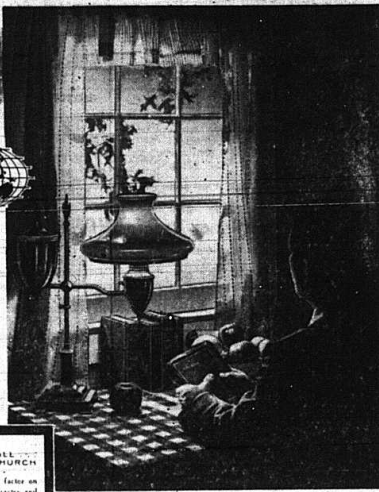

Rash Of Burglaries Takes Place In City And County

Service Station Hardest Hit Of Five Firms

A rash of break-ins took place Monday night, with four local establishments and an out-of-town mill being burglarized.

Hardest-hit of the businesses was the Dinner Bell Service Station on Richmond Street in Mt. Vernon. The burglars forced entry through a back door and took \$60 in silver and currency, a .38 special pistol, two tires, an automobile battery, eight boxes of ignition points, two boxes of cigars, two flashlights, a padlock and a carton of cigarettes. The combined loss was estimated at \$219.

Fretor Lumber Company and Sinclair Oil Company, also were burglarized, with the thieves taking only minor amounts of change. Files in both stores were razed and emptied, and papers were strewn over the floor.

A window was broken in the office of the Kentucky Stone Company office just outside Mt. Vernon city limits, and the door was unlocked. Except for an estimated \$50 damage to a filing cabinet, officials said that nothing was taken.

Farmers Feed and Supply also entered Monday night.

City Wants To Postpone Purchase Of Fire Truck

The City Council of Mt. Vernon voted Thursday night to ask local insurance agencies to confer with the State Inspection Bureau and ask if it would be possible to postpone for a year the purchase of a new fire engine for the local fire department.

In the event that the postponement is not granted, the local agencies will advance 10 per cent of last year's business license to do business this year.

No action will be taken concerning the tax purchase until an answer has been received from the inspection bureau.

County Judge Money E. Cummins, asked the Council to allot certain parking places in front of the courthouse for use by county officials, Johnny Allen, city attorney, suggested that First Street be made a one-way street, with the left side of the street to be used as parking places for county officials.

The Council directed that improvements be made on culverts on Poplar and Williams Streets.

In other action, the Council approved a motion to spray for mosquitoes. In extending water service to John W. Griffin and Buster Gentry, and to paint the city's water trucks.

The Council also postponed a decision on voting a revenue bond for voter extension until the next regular meeting.

The annexation trial will be held before Circuit Judge R. C. Tartar, Friday, April 10.

Entry Into New Cave Is Difficult

A chance exploration of a of past human infringement into drink, and in the basin rests small aperture in the ground the hidden interior. Except for Bobby Jenkins, the cave discoverer, and his companions, no one had entered the cave for two weeks ago.

With the aid of a gas lantern some places is 35 feet high. Located on the farm of Arthur Clark at Climax, the party measured some 300 by 150 feet in dimensions. The ceiling in some places is 35 feet high.

Although the formations are not so large as those found in some other caves, they have a distinctive quality of natural beauty, some of them being extremely fragile when touched. One row of stalactites, (or stalagmites of calcium deposits formed by water dripping from the ceiling) snow-white in appearance, gave the impression of being giant, well-developed shaft, another person halfway up the shaft.

Whereas the cave was originally carved by the waters of a good-sized stream, it now has a smaller stream running through it and emptying into a small, natural basin, where the pool of water is confined by natural ridges atop a rock ledge. The thin ridges resemble water prints, flashbuds, and chewing gum wrappers from the source of their formation. The water is cool and pleasant to drink.

As it is now, interested persons need only the permission of Mr. Clark before they embark on a tour of a breathtaking cave that will leave their muscles aching and tired and their curiosity well satisfied.

2 Accidents Thursday Injure Three Persons

Three persons injured in two separate accidents were admitted to Lexington hospitals last week with injuries, with one victim listed in serious condition.

William Sherman Abrams, 19, of Big Hill, was seriously injured at 2:30 p. m. Thursday when he was driving left the road, struck a concrete abutment and hit a tree.

Abrams, who wrecked two miles from Mt. Vernon on the Chestnut Ridge Road, could give no reason for the accident. State Policeman Bobby L. Hamm said the Browns were riding in a car operated by Ben S. Craig, 67, Mt. Vernon, when it hit the rear of a car driven by Cecil Y. Thacker, 21, Boone. Thacker was making a turn into a drive when the mishap occurred, the policeman said.

WHAT EVERY PARENT SHOULD KNOW ABOUT OUR SCHOOLS

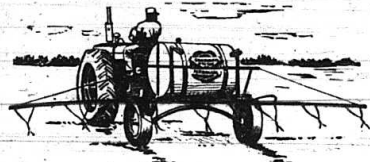

The average annual salary paid teachers in Rockcastle County school districts has increased from \$1,957 to \$2,714 since 1956. Better pay, combined with full-financing three years ago of a statewide teachers' retirement plan, means that we can attract and keep better teachers.

BETTER SCHOOL FACILITIES

Progress also is being made in improving school facilities in Rockcastle County. Some \$260,000 of projects have been undertaken or planned in the past 3 years, including a new building for the Roundstone Elementary School, new classrooms and equipment at the Mt. Vernon High School and improvements and new equipment at other schools. State help has been provided under the new "Foundation Program" with funds specially earmarked for construction and equipment.

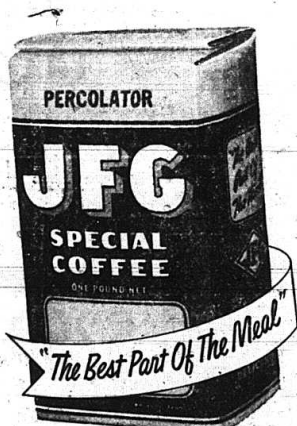

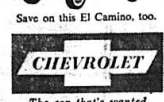
