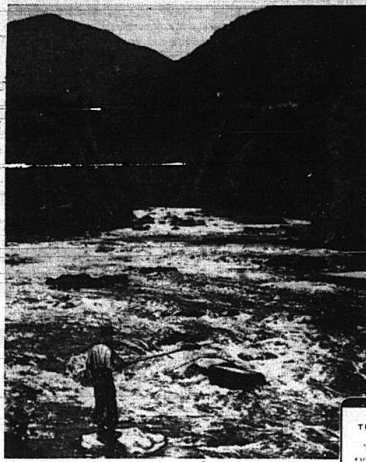


Attend Church Sunday

Louisville Firm Readies Bonds For Livingston

The Louisville branch of Merrill Lynch, Pierce, Fenner and Smith, bonding company, is now preparing for sale the municipal bonds that will provide for financing of Livingston's proposed water works system.

With a top estimate of \$98,000 as the cost of the water works project, City officials have contacted the Louisville branch, authorizing them to prepare the bonds. A city official said that the company was "very optimistic" about their sale.

City Engineer Jack Crawford, working with Leroy Fitch of the Petrex Corporation, submitted the figures for \$12,000 smaller than the previous low estimate, to the City Council.

Crawford has now been given authority to contact the Diesel Pump Company of Lawrenceburg, Ind., to install pumps in the pumping station purchased from the L & N Railroad. The pumps will be the same type that were used by the railroad. Officials now feel confident that the water works project will be put under way during the first part of July, and that service will be offered sometime this year.

Area Tourist Boosters Will Meet Here Friday

A new organization designed for the purpose of attracting tourists to the immediate area was discussed Tuesday when representatives of Mt. Vernon, Berea and Renfro Valley met with members of the Laurel County Development Association in London.

A second meeting has been set for Friday noon at Renfro Valley to formulate ideas for the promotion and formation of an association. Fifteen representatives from Berea, London, Mt. Vernon and Renfro Valley are expected to attend.

Proposed projects of the association would be to develop the Wildcat Mountain area and to establish an information booth at Renfro Valley. The Daniel Boone Trail Association is a tentative name for the group.

Farm And Home News

Pasture and Hay Top-Dressing Time Is Here:

Pasture and hay crops ought to be fertilized each year if more profits are to be gained. Don't use just any fertilizer, but the fertilizer that the crop needs.

A good soil test is the best way to find out what kind and how much to use. If a soil test taken before seeding time called for both phosphate and potash, then use both each year. When alfalfa is in the mixture, the top-dressing should be 60 pounds of P2O5 (phosphate) 120 to 15 pounds of K2O (potash) and 10 to 15 pounds of borax per acre. An example of a mixed fertilizer that will give this is 600 pounds of 0-10-20. For other legumes, the amount should be cut in half and no borax used. These treatments are for a good grass-legume mixture.

Heavy nitrogen seldom pays on good stands of legumes and grasses. Fertilizer top-dressing should be done when the plants are dry.

Control Of Garden Insects And Diseases:

Controlling insects and diseases of vegetable crops depend on the following:

1. Choosing the correct chemicals.
2. Selecting a good sprayer or duster.
3. Keeping the equipment in good operating condition.
4. Starting at the right time.
5. Thoroughness of application, and 6. Frequency of application.

Control of most garden insects are DDT, malathion, methoxychlor, and DTE or DDD. To control diseases one or more of the following should be used: Maneb, Zineb, Captan, or one of the croppers. Materials listed for diseases refer to the "active ingredients" on the package. They are sold under many different, trade names.

2. A good sprayer or duster usually costs a little more, but results in a saving of time and does a more efficient job; the purchase of cheap equipment is usually false economy.

3. Careful cleaning and preparation of equipment immediately following each spraying or dusting operation will do much to lengthen its usefulness.

4. Control of insects and disease should start as soon as the plant breaks through the soil. Some vegetable crops are attacked by flea beetles or aphids. Protect them with DDT, malathion, or methoxychlor.

5. A thorough job of dusting or spraying covers the entire portion of the plant above the ground. Careful attention should be given to placing material on stems and under-side of leaves, since some insects never feed on the top side.

6. Maintaining a cover of chemicals on a plant from the time it emerges to harvest requires an application of chemicals every 7 to 10 days, and during rainy seasons, this might not be often enough.

Homemakers Program Planned:

The final vote on lessons for Homemaker Clubs was counted

The program for the year starting in September, 1959, and continuing through August 31, 1960, will include one-lesson on "New Trends in Furnishings," five lessons on "Saving Time and Energy," one craft, a county-wide picnic in August, an annual meeting in December, and special interest lessons on "Weight Control."

Cleanliness Best System To Control Pantry Insects:

Clean food shelves probably are best for control of pantry insects.

The pantry bugs that plague housewives—flour beetles, bran bugs, weevils, miller worms—usually thrive on shelves where food has been spilled. When they are discovered in such storage places, first step is to clean up the food shelves; without loose food to live on, the pests die out.

Second step, if desired, is to spray the emptied and scrubbed shelves with a five per cent DDT spray. Hit cracks and crevices well. When the spray has dried, replace food on shelves.

These pantry pests generally get in homes by food packages which have been improperly packaged or in broken or torn containers. Throw away such packages, as the container may be a breeding place for more pests.

Food containers should be kept tightly sealed, fastened or wrapped, in storage; most common pantry pests live in spilled crumbs, food fragments, etc. That's why a thorough washing of shelves is recommended.



ZOOLOGICAL PHENOMENI EMERGE

Despite what your personal beliefs are, sir or madam, good weather is right around the corner.

Good weather, you know, signifies the awakening of several creatures who more or less hibernate during the long, hard winter. Among them are the bear, reptiles, and, of course, the adherents of the talk-fast, work-fast and leave faster professions.

We refer to none other than the perennial travelling termite control, roofing and painting "experts" who ravage the homeowner every spring and summer.

This particular breed of animal has no particular markings to identify himself, such as a brown fur coat or a scaly exterior, but he is of a thick-skinned nature and tends to be elusive when approached with caution.

Warning characteristics are unreasonably low prices, wide fluctuations in price, quick spray methods and fantastic guarantees against termites.

If you don't know the person offering the service, check on the firm. At least get a firm you KNOW to be reputable to make an estimate of termite damage, or an offer to paint your house or barn.

If the person offering to do the job is not willing to let the offer stand until you have checked on his or his alleged "firm's" reputations, don't panic. Let him go. Little good it does if you find you have been fleeced and don't know where to contact the man who guaranteed the job.

There are other racketeers that are not quite so notorious as the paint-exterioring operations, so beware of any travelling agent who offers a quick sale on a piece of good merchandise.

A good policy to follow is to deal with your home-town merchants—your neighbors—who have to support their claims to stay in business.

The Kentucky Highway Department has awarded a \$108,025 contract to E'won Paving Co., Elizabethtown, for bituminous surfacing of 8.6 miles of roads in Rockcastle County, as indicated with heavy lines on map. Projects include: The Quail-Lincoln County Line Road from a county road near Quail, approximately 0.35 mile west of Ky. 70 to the Lincoln



County Line, 3.460 miles. The Brodhead-Spiro Road from US 150, 0.500 mile east of Ky. 70 to the Mareburg-Wald Road at Spiro, 2.961 miles. The West Jones Creek-Quail Road from Ky. 70 to Quail to the Wald-Mareburg Road, approximately 1.3 miles north of Wald, 3.257 miles.

F B Labels Advocated Payment Plan 'Harmful'

Kentucky Farm Bureau spokesmen in Louisville have labeled the compensatory payment plan now advocated by certain members of Congress as "harmful to the future of the individual farmer and to agriculture in general."

Called the "production payment plan" by some, the new farm program proposal is patterned after the discredited and controversial "Brannan Plan" of a few years ago. It is aimed at the elimination of all production controls and price supports, and substituting a plan whereby prices of farm commodities would seek their own levels in the market place, and when the Federal Government would send farmers direct checks from Washington to make up the difference between the market price and the "fair price."

"A program of this type," said Kentucky Farm Bureau in a recent letter to all of Kentucky's members of Congress, "would make farmers entirely dependent on government doles and annual congressional appropriations for their very livelihood. The idea of cheap food and fiber for the consumer, with the difference made up out of taxes, is a move toward socialized agriculture, which would certainly place a limit on the opportunities of the individual farmer."

Continues the Farm Bureau letter: "Without controls, such a plan would certainly bring about more production and bigger and bigger surpluses at a time when surpluses is the biggest problem facing farmers. We can easily anticipate what would happen to farmers in a few years after consumers get accustomed to the artificially low prices, and farmers get used to the subsidy checks from Washington, and all of a sudden, the Congress decides the program is too costly. We know that the majority of the Congressmen do not represent agricultural districts. This in itself is sufficient reason for the farmers of Kentucky to oppose this program."

If you doubt about creep-feeding, remember: Creep-fed calves' total weight increase is greater in drought years than non-creep-fed calves; a calf will eat 2 to 6 pounds of feed per day from 2 months of age to weaning; you can get an increase in grade from creep-feeding; cows will be heavier at weaning time if their calves are creep-fed; the shrink at weaning is LESS for creep-fed calves; creep-fed calves may be marketed earlier as fat calves, and they probably will be more uniform in size and

Creep Feeding Calves Sometimes Unprofitable

Creep feeding is supplemental feeding of concentrates to calves during the nursing period—and there are times when this practice is as unprofitable as it is profitable at other times.

Here are things to remember about it, reminds George Penzger, Kentucky Extension Service beef specialist: Creep-feed if you are a purebred breeder—with a good market for calves at weaning age; if your cows are poor milkers or pasture conditions are not good; if calves produced on the Kentucky cow-and-calf plan are short of milk; and also if calves go into the feedlot for full feeding at weaning.

Do NOT creep-feed if you intend to winter calves on roughages, etc.; if you are producing feeder calves; if pastures are good; if cows are exceptionally good milkers; and if calves are carrying good flesh
