ASC Cautions Farmers On Non-quota Tobacco

Kentucky tobacco growers have been cautioned about growing what they consider to be "non-quota" tobacco.

Boy C. Gray, chairman of the State Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Committee, said the question has arisen as a result of recent referendums in which growers disapproved marketing quotas for 1959 crops of Maryland and Pennsylvania cigar-filler tobacco.

Gray explained that marketing quota regulations issued by the Secretary of Agriculture provide that any tobacco that has the same characteristics and corresponding qualities, colors, and lengths as Burley, fire-cured or Dark Air-cured tobacco shall be considered as such regardless of historical or geographical nature which cannot be determined by examination of the tobacco.

The regulations provide that all tobacco grown in an area where quotas are in effect for the kind of tobacco normally produced in that area will be considered as such unless the grower furnishes the county ASC committee with satisfactory proof that a part of the tobacco he produced should not be counted as "quota" tobacco.

Under the marketing quota program the acreage of Burley, Fire-cured or Dark Air-cured tobacco on the basis of seeding, cultivation, curing and marketing practices commonly known in the area.

In order for any tobacco grown in Kentucky to be considered as Maryland or Pennsylvania cigar-filler tobacco.

Rockcastle Farm Bureau and farm families in solving their various individual problems. The Rockcastle County Extension Council have voted to take action in an attempt next Tuesday to block a rumored Fiscal Court attempt to curtail or discontinue county support of the County Extension Service here.

The County has had Extension Agents for more than 47 years, and annually allocates \$3,000 to defray travel and office expenses and to pay \$60 a month to County Agent Lee Durham and Home Demonstration Agent Martha Owen.

At an April 29 meeting of the directors voting, the Bureau won on record as favoring the retention of the agents. The Bureau "feels that the county has been greatly benefited by these agents."

Local agents would mean that Rockcastle farmers no longer could qualify for the programs, nor could a self-taught lab course. The Bureau originally gave \$300 for the establishment of the laboratory, which requires that an agent supervise the testing.

Letters were mailed this week to the members of Farm Bureau, asking that they be kept in touch personally with the magistrates from his district, and that as many members as possible attend the Fiscal Court meeting Tuesday.

The County Extension Council, which works with the agents, also will send representatives to the Fiscal Court meeting.

A release from Farm Bureau read, in part, "Farm Bureau realizes that farming is a changing occupation. We are confronted with new conditions on our livestock and crops. Within the County Agent and Home Demonstration agents, we have available information that comes from the University's Experiment stations would be (lost) by the county. We should not discontinue these agents would be a step backward."

The County Extension Program is a joint project of the State, Federal and County governments. The bulk of the agents' salaries are provided by the county. They are sent by the University of Kentucky and have at their disposal all of the results of University testing programs. Marketing records and other useful information are kept on file in their office here.

A new time boundary that would put most of the Eastern Zone of Kentucky, including Rockcastle County) into the Eastern Time Zone has been recommended by Thomas E. Pyne, Interstate Commerce Commission hearing examiner, who filed a report Tuesday with the ICC.

The time change would affect 33 counties and would leave cities like Danville, Frankfort, Lexington and Carrollton on the fast time schedule. Pyne's recommendation would be included in a 40-page report based on hearings in Lexington last July.

Many of the cities covered by Pyne's recommendations already have switched to Daylight Saving Time on an annual basis. Many persons polled in Mt. Vernon also were in favor of the fast time standard.

Those polled said that they were in favor of fast time in the summer, not only because they have an extra hour of daylight after work, but also because most of the surrounding towns are an hour ahead of Rockcastle County.

A large portion of those interviewed said a vote to go to Daylight Saving Time would be virtually useless unless the entire country agreed. It was believed that the Mt. Vernon City Council would be in favor of such a policy, but that Fiscal Court would vote against it, as in the past.

Generally, the ICC follows the recommendations of its examiners. Pyne's recommendations cover the majority of the area included in the petition of Central and Eastern Kentucky communities. Exceptions are Lawrenceburg and Harrodsburg, who petitioned for such a change, but were excluded from the recommendation.

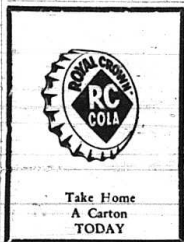

Livestock Group Will Sponsor Pig Sale

A feeder pig sale, sponsored by the Rockcastle County Livestock Improvement Association, will be conducted May 13 at the Richmond Stockyards. Receiving of pigs will begin at 5 a. m., white sales will start at 1 p. m.

Sanitation and health requirements hold that all animals for consignment must be free of evidence of infectious and contagious diseases and external and internal parasites. Vaccinations will not be required, but pigs that are deformed, ruptured, off-type or in poor condition (the unwhitney, many or so-called "southern type" pig) cannot be sold.

Pigs eligible for the sale must be produced by the consignor. Weight limits will be determined by the sales committee and stockyard manager after consideration of the size of facilities available. In general, weight limits should be between 30 and 100 pounds, with 50 to 60 pounds ideal.

All bear pigs must be properly castrated and healed by sale day. Their type must be meat-type breeding.

Th stockyards will collect 25 cents for each day of the sale for the Livestock Improvement Association to cover advertisement and promotion costs of the sale.

All pigs will be inspected when delivered for general health by a sales committee. Each farmer's pigs shall be sorted into groups of uniform weight, size, color and marking, and quality and pooled with like lots of pigs of other owners. Weights of pigs in a pen shall not vary more than 5 to 10 pounds except possibly in the heavier groups.

Buyers may inspect the pigs before the sale, at which time they will be sold in pooled lots at auction by the pound on a

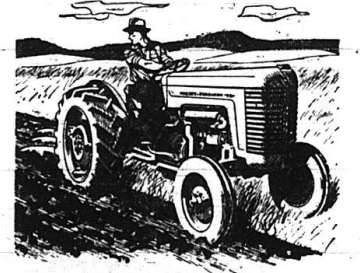

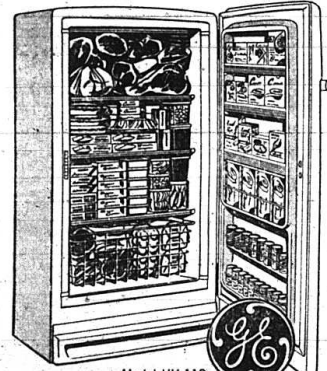
