# Farm And Home News

## 4-H Camp:

Cumberland District 4-H Camp is scheduled for June 15-19 at Levi Jackson State Park, London, Ky. All 4-H members may attend this camp. Also, there is a Weekend Teenage Camp scheduled for June 19, 20 and 21 (Friday afternoon, Saturday, and Sunday Morning).

Senior 4-H members may attend both the regular camp and also the Teenage Camp. An excellent program has been planned for camp this year and we feel sure that 4-H members will learn a great deal from their camping experiences. 4-H members from Bell and Clay Counties will camp with us this year; this is a new group for us.

The expenses for the regular camp will be \$3.25. This includes meals, lodging, swimming, and a craft. The fee for the Teenage Camp will be \$4.00. This includes meals and lodging.

Transportation will be furnished to and from camp.

## Control Tobacco Insects At Trans-Planting Time:

Wireworms, flea beetles and cutworms are three very troublesome insect pests at tobacco transplanting time.

Here's how to control them says Richard Thurston, Kentucky Experiment Station entomologist.

**WIREWORMS:** Use a spray, dust or granules of Aldrin (three pounds an acre actual mixture), Dieldrin (one and one-half pounds), Chlordane (six pounds) or Heptachlor (three pounds). Apply after the field has been plowed; disk in thoroughly after application. This treatment will also give some control of cutworms.

**FLEA BEETLES:** Apply a 10 per cent strength DDT dust to the plant beds a day or two

BEFORE plants are pulled from the bed. Use one pound per 100 square yards of bed. If a spray is desired, use 12 tablespoons of a 50 per cent DDT wettable powder (mixed with water), in three to five gallon of water per 100 square yards of bed. If flea beetles are found in the field after setting-out, use a DDT spray or dust—one pound actual material per acre. This DDT spray should be the wettable powder form, as the emulsion concentrate type from burn young plants. Endrin may be used, too, at two-tenths of one pound actual an acre (spray or dust) and Dieldrin, at one and one-half ounces actual per acre, also in spray or dust. All these materials will control cutworms, too.

## Corn Planting Tips May Help 1959 Crop:

Here are a few things to keep in mind before the 1959 corn crop's planting day gets here, says S. H. Phillips, Kentucky Extension Service Agronomist. Use an adopted, hybrid, or get the Experiment Station's

Progress Report No. 74 at the county agent's office, or from the agronomy department at Lexington, and study it for reports on varieties in 1958, standability, yield, maturity, etc.

Plant corn early. In a test last year, corn planted before May 16 gave about 10 bushels an acre higher yield than later-planted corn (early June) and 20 bushels more than late June and early July-planted corn.

Make a soil test and fertilize accordingly. Corn is a heavy feeder on all three food elements (nitrogen, potash, phosphorus) and needs proper fertilization. If the field has been in continuous corn, 600 to 800 pounds of a 10-10-10 analysis will maintain the fertility level; and remember that a large supply of fertilizer is in the corn stalk itself. If you are going to grow silage corn, fertilizer mixtures containing phosphorus, as stalks is removed also.

If you are going to put the fertilizer in contact with the seed at planting, use not more than 200 pounds of 10-10-10 fertilizer per acre at planting; more than this may kill seed germination. Plant thickly: research shows it is best to have at least 12,000 stalks an acre "plant population"; less than that will not be profitable. To get 12,000 plants per acre, drop kernels every 12 inches in rows 40 inches apart; this will allow 15 per cent seed loss for various reasons. If you

want 100-bushels an acre production, go to a 14,000- to 16,000-stalks-per-acre rate. Plant kernels every nine to 12 inches in 40-inch rows.

Side-dressing of corn later in the growing stage will give only a three-to-four bushels an acre increase over broadcasting fertilizer at planting time, Phillips said; thus, the small increase may not justify the split application of nitrogen fertilizer.

## Wash Wool Blankets By "Soak" Method

Now that cold weather has ended for a while, it's time to launder those blankets that kept the family warm all winter.

If handled carefully, blankets can be washed successfully in any machine on which the washing action can be controlled. When using an automatic washer, follow the instructions with the washer.

The "soak" method is an excellent way to reduce shrinkage of wool blankets. To wash by this method, first brush any soiled spots with warm water and detergent. A vegetable brush is handy for this treatment.

Spin to extract the water, or if using a wringer-type machine, use the wringer with the least amount of pressure possible. Fill the washer for deep rinses with water the same temperature as the wash water and soak

the same amount as for a load of white clothes. Then stop the washer and put the blanket in to soak for 15 to 20 minutes, turning it several times or by hand.

Spin to extract the water, or if using a wringer-type machine, use the wringer with the least amount of pressure possible. Fill the washer for deep rinses with water the same temperature as the wash water and soak

the blanket for five minutes. Extract the water and repeat the deep rinse process. Dryer or line-dry the blanket; remove it and brush the nap while the blanket is still slightly damp. If using a dryer, it's best to follow the manufacturer's instructions.

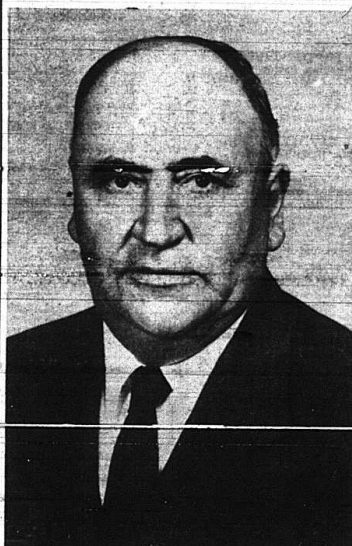

## Livingston Adopts New Time Standard Monday

### Expect Health Dept. Approval Of Plans

The City Council of Livingston voted 4-1 Monday night in favor of adopting Daylight Saving Time for the City and to continue it indefinitely. The vote was set for reverting to Standard Time. City Councilmen believe that the Interstate Commerce Commission will legislate Rockcastle County into the Eastern Time Zone before summer's end.

The new time will be effective as of 12:01 a. m. Monday. The Council also gave definite approval to the plans that call for construction of a water works at a cost of \$98,000. The plans will be taken Monday to Louisville, where they were submitted for approval to the State Department of Health.

The plans call for a reservoir of 65,000 gallons capacity, with a pumping capacity of 55 gallons per day per person for an estimated 154 subscribers to the service. Only 122 subscribers will use it at first, but more are expected to be added later. The pumping volume can be increased.

City Clerk Bob Waddle said that tentative plans call for the bids to be advertised by June 1, and for construction to begin by July. The plans have been rewritten.

The Council also authorized twice-a-month garbage collection for Livingston, replacing the once-a-month collection practice.

The question of Daylight Saving Time for Mt. Vernon is expected to be posed when the City Council holds its regular monthly meeting on 10 p. m. (Thursday).

### New Faces Appear Along Main Street

Two Main Street business places in Mt. Vernon are now operating under new ownership.

Floyd Owens has bought the stock and inventory of Kelsey's Sundry on Main Street from Louis Kelsey. Owens said he will continue to operate along the same lines for awhile, but may have additional plans for the future.

The store name will be Owens' Sundry.

Kelsey's Restaurant, next door to the Sundry, was not included in the transaction.

Mr. and Mrs. Rollie Pillion of Dayton, Ohio, have bought the stock and inventory of the Cincinnati-Bargain Store from Mrs. Monroe Miller, an aunt of Mrs. Pillion. Mrs. Miller was in business at the location for approximately two and one-half years.

The name of the store and the general line of merchandise will be unchanged.

### Mt. Vernon First Stop On Louisville Men's Tour

Mt. Vernon is to be the first stop on a Get-Acquainted Tour to be taken later this month by 75 Louisville-area businessmen and civic leaders.

Including 20 citizens of the 73-mile circuit of Eastern Kentucky will take place May 19-May 22. Three Scenicruser buses will transport the businessmen, with Louisville Mayor Bruce Hobbitt, honorary tour chairman, leading the lead bus.

Others on the first bus will be Charles W. Allen, Jr., first vice president of the Louisville Chamber of Commerce; executive vice president Kenneth P. Vinset and tour chairman, Joseph A. Shearer.

During stops, local mayors, chamber of commerce representatives and other business and civic leaders will be guests of the touring party. Many of the businessmen will be seeing new developments in Eastern Kentucky for the first time. The 1959 Tour is the 12th annual goodwill trip sponsored by the Louisville Chamber of Commerce and the second tour into the eastern area.

## 'Gentlemen of the Jury' Postpone Decision On County Agent Appropriations, Payment of Bills

The "Gentlemen of the Jury," five magistrates of the Rockcastle Fiscal Court, held a closed-door caucus Tuesday morning and came out with a hung jury, postponing a ruling until next Tuesday.

The nickname was given the members of the court when County Agent Lee Durham appeared before them at their regular monthly meeting, at which time it was believed that they would take action to withdraw County sponsorship of the extension program.

Magistrate J. S. Swinford who said that he is in favor of keeping Durham and Miss Owen, said that he had never felt "more ashamed" than he is of the Court's performance. He said he "felt sure" that the County Agents would have lost the appropriation if a vote had been taken at this meeting.

The issue, though nothing was proposed, apparently is concerned, not with censure of the program itself, but with relieving Durham of his duties, chiefly because of his political beliefs.

In appealing to the court, Durham explained that he addressed them as a jury because "I feel an aim as much on trial as anyone who ever stood in this courtroom."

Durham said that he would like to know the extent of the truth in certain rumors which he said he had heard, one of which was that he was "not doing his job," another charge being that his political party is the wrong one.

In answer to the former charge, Durham said that he could not help everyone, be-

cause everyone did not need help. But he said that he has never refused to aid anyone who requested his help, and that he certainly is not concerned with their political beliefs when he works with them.

"People have said I am wrong, politically," he told the 40 persons who had gathered for the trial, "but in the six years I have been here no question has been raised about whether I was a Democrat, Republican, Communist, or anything else."

President John Houston of the Rockcastle Farm Bureau, backed up by nine of the 21 directors of the Bureau, cited the good work of Farm Bureau over the years, and said that the County Agents have lost the appropriation if a vote had been taken at this meeting.

Houston said the county agents are "very important people in the county." He strengthened his claim by pointing out that County always provides for many itinerant families in the County, while the County Agents help train those who will stay and be a burden to taxpayers in the future. He was referring to the 4-H program, supervised by

"Regardless of politics," Houston stressed, "these children need good training. We old folks can't do it, but these children are the citizens of tomorrow. The 4-H and Home Economics are doing some in this county, and County Agent supervision is a

valuable thing".

Mt. Vernon School Superintendent Clyde Linnville, a representative of the County Extension Council, which annually sets up a work program for the agents; Circuit Court Clerk George Murphy, bank president N. M. Smock, and the Rev. Lee Hopkins each spoke in turn, favoring the Agents.

Smock said that abandonment of the program would be "a definite step backwards." Linnville said that in working with Durham all these years, he had never known the man's political beliefs until the present situation came up.

Keith Kelley, Lexington, supervisor of County Agents in this area, said that County Agents are expressly forbidden by the administrators of the program "to engage in politics." The federal and state governments provide 80 per cent of the funds for operation of the program, he explained.

He Kelley told the group that "You are making appropriations for the program and not for individuals. Treat the consideration as you would a health or school's service."

He said that if the County appropriation went only toward sponsorship of the 600-4 Club members in Rockcastle, it would cost about 40 cents a year for each resident of the County.

"When we withdraw Agents from the County, it is a simple matter to find a place for them elsewhere, so these people would not actually lose their jobs. The County would be required to pay the cost. Once discontinued, however, it is difficult to restore the program, sometimes for years before a County applying for re-admission can be included in our long-term budget."

Kenneth Stewart, one of the county's larger farmers, said that "farming is the most important thing we have, our greatest industry, and it becomes more important all the time. I am a taxpayer—and I feel the cost toward sending my child to school where they can learn from the 4-H program."

## ACTION OF COURT DISDAINFUL OF PUBLIC FARM PROGRAM

It hardly seems possible that Dwight D. Eisenhower, President of the United States, would take time out to say something directly applying to conditions in Rockcastle County, but he hit the nail on the head Tuesday, when, in defense of a valued public servant, he emphasized:

"And if we've got to the point where a man, because of some personal antagonisms, cannot be confirmed for office in this government, then I must say we're getting to a pretty bad situation."

And a bad situation is exactly what became apparent Tuesday at the regular meeting of Rockcastle Fiscal Court, when an entire County-wide program, and still remains, jeopardized because of an apparent control by outside influences of a few of the County's officials.

When G. H. (Hobe) Griffin asked a State representative of the County Extension Program if it was necessary for the University of Kentucky, Program administrator, to appoint the agents, he strongly implied that the issue was a personal one and that he would like nothing better than to be one of the persons allowed to screen applicants.

The positions of Lee Durham and Martha Owen absolutely prohibit them from wielding any political influence, yet it is apparent that they are not worthy of their jobs, in the opinion of a few, because of the beliefs. If they do a good job and exercise no political power, what would it benefit the cause of another party to have one of their own installed in the post at the expense of weakening the benefit?

And what earthly qualifications do our local magistrates, Griffin included, have, that would enable them to make a wiser choice than could be made at the nerve center of the State's program? Certainly a possible domination by outside minority influences is not in the interest of the public.

We are sure that this whole issue could be traced back to something besides the question of whether or not a man is a Republican. Possibly, quite probably it enters into the personal life of the County Agents or Durham himself, in their social contacts with other people.

Bear in mind that these magistrates were elected by you, the citizens. Apparently they have forgotten, for not one person among the 40 in that courtroom OPENLY opposed the appropriation of the County Agents. Yet the presence of some 40 voters probably influenced the decision of the court to postpone its decision for another week.

It is a travesty on our political setup that two persons with ability to perform their jobs well have to appear before a body that, as a whole, does not take the responsibility to act on its own initiative, or in the better interests of the people.

The Simsbury, Connecticut, Farmington Valley Herald, has stated that "One of the most serious cancers growing within the American system is the fiscal irresponsibility that is afflicting

the people who run our government". We believe we have a prime example locally of that type of cancer.

What is the foundation of this country, anyway? That a few selfish individuals should dictate to those who are elected by the voting masses? Or is the coveted two-party system a setup which is meant to allow the bosses of the ruling classes to politically assassinate our able public servants?

Some 600 of the youth of this county are engaged in 4-H work, meaning that almost that many families have a direct interest in the Extension program. Many farmers have cattle certified brucellosis free, a condition brought about by Durham's supervision, and which enables farmers to sell their cattle for higher prices. These farmers have a direct interest, too, as do those who periodically have their soil tested under his supervision, or who have specialists come in to help them solve their problems.

The number of persons who have benefited from the aid given by these persons, regardless of what their politics are, belong in that courthouse next Tuesday. You, the ones who have benefited, are the only ones, outside of the five magistrates themselves, who have an earthly chance to favorably influence the decision of Fiscal Court. Without your support, the program likely is doomed.

Walter Lippman has said that "In a free society, the state does not administer the affairs of men. It administers justice among men, who conduct their own affairs".

Who will conduct your affairs next Tuesday, if you're not there to supervise? Conduct them yourself.

She is understanding with a smile in her heart, harsh with a superior sense of justice, demanding with too much, but sympathetic to the point of tears.

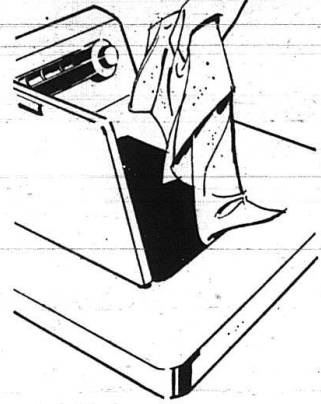

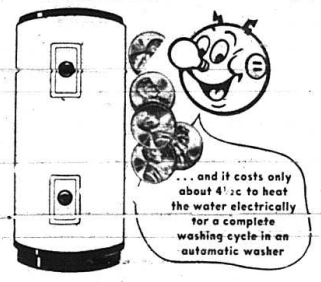
