Farm And Home News

New Publications Available:

Your attention is called to some new publications that are now available in the County Extension Office in Mt. Vernon.

The first one is Misc. 117-A. This publication gives complete instructions on control of forage insects, that is, insects on alfalfa clovers, etc.—and this publication discusses various insecticides such as Aldrin, D. D. T., Heptachlor, Methoxychlor, Toxaphene, Malathion, etc.—and gives concentrated amounts and dosages needed per-acre. Insects covered include aphids, spittlebugs, clover leaf weevils, leaf hoppers, blister beetles, grasshoppers, cutworms, green June beetles, army worms, Hessian fly, Bluegrass plant bug, white grubs, and others. Crops covered include alfalfa, clovers, (grown for forage), soybeans, grain sorghums, small grains, grasses, etc.

The second publication is Misc. 158. This deals with commercial egg flocks and contains information on housing and equipment, replacement pullets, feeding programs, disease control, egg-handling equipment, size of unit, and other topics of interest to commercial egg producers.

Another one available at the Extension Office is Misc. 153 which is a management guide for broiler growers. This bulletin deals with such topics as: floor space, number per cover, central heating system, feeding space, watering space, litter, ventilators, etc.

Another is Misc. 37-A, "Tobacco Insect Control." This publication deals with the treatment of insects in tobacco plant beds, treatment of insects on newly set plants and treatment for insects on field plants.

Another is Misc. 149, "Controlling Insects on Field Corn." This publication deals with seed treatment, soil treatment, and foliage treatment to control such insects as fleabeetles, cutworms, corn earworms, European Corn borer, Northern corn rootworms, etc.

Another is Misc. 151 which deals with control of insects on commercial vegetables and sweet corn.

Another is Misc. 171-A which deals with strawberry insect and disease control.

Another is Misc. 116 which

deals with insects and disease control of the home garden.

Any of the above mentioned publications are free for the asking at the county agent's office.

Come in and ask for your copies right away.

Insect And Disease Control For The Home Garden:
The insecticides, Malathion, and Methoxychlor plus the fungicides, Zineb, Captan or Maneb will control all garden insects and diseases, grasshoppers, cutworms, and slugs. Use Aldrin or Chlorodane for grasshoppers. Toxaphene 20 per cent dust for cutworms, and Metaldehyde bait for slugs.

Use insecticides at the rate of 2 lbs. per 50 gallons of water or 2 level tablespoons per gallon of water. Fungicides are more effective used as a spray. Rate and time of application are given on the labels.

FARM JOURNAL SURVEY SHOWS FARMERS ARE INDEPENDENT

Farm Journal, the leading magazine in its field, has polled its readers to find out just what kind of government farm plan they really want.

The results will come as a big surprise to those who think that farmers as a whole want more and more government aids, controls and supports.

Here's how the vote adds up: Fifty-five per cent want total abandonment of supports and controls and a return to the free market.

Fifteen per cent favor supports on an emergency basis only. Eight per cent want adjustment supports which would permit a gradual return to normal markets over a period of time.

In sum, therefore, seventy-eight per cent favor plans calling either for no support or for less support.

By contrast, only fourteen per cent say they want high price supports, of 90 per cent to 100 per cent of parity, and only eight per cent favor the production payment plan.

The percentages are relatively stable in all sections of the country. Among the different commodities, farmers specializing in poultry, beef, or fruit and vegetables are the most inclined to abolish supports. Wheat and grain producers are least disposed to do this, although almost half of them consider it the proper course of action.

Farm Journal has performed a beneficial service to the country—and the hope is that the lesson learned will find its reflection in future policy. Farmers, like the rest of us, know past programs have been monumental failures, and that billions have gone down the drain with no return.

And farmers, like the rest of us, want to stand on their own feet.

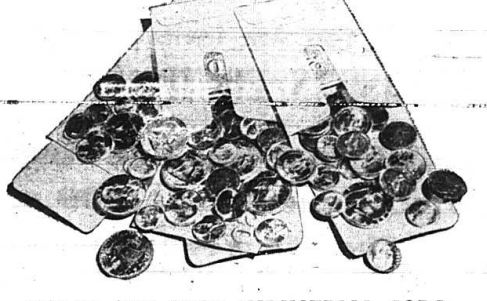
