Farm And Home News

BY H. Lee Durham and Martha Owen County Extension Agents

Prune Evergreens Now:

During June and the first half of July is perhaps the best time of the entire year to prune evergreens in Kentucky. These plants have made their early spring growth and when it gets hot they slow up in their growth, but will soon be setting buds for next spring's growth. By pruning now, the plants will set buds around the end of the small twig where the cut was made and this means a thicker, denser plant which always means better looking evergreens.

The rules for pruning are: 1. Never cut the top of the evergreen until the plant is as tall as you want it to grow. 2. Remove one-half to two-thirds of the new growth. By examining the different kinds of evergreens, it will be found that it is comparatively easy to prune in this way.

Neglected evergreens that have not been pruned for years may often have to be discarded because they cannot be pruned as drastically as other plants. This means that the plant that has grown 3 to 6 feet above the eaves of the house cannot be cut back that much and remain alive. The spreading type of junipers and yew may be headed back to 15 to 18 inches and they will fill in and become dense by a small amount of pruning on the ends of the outside branches. The bottom branches should never be cut off evergreens because the best looking ones are those that have branches clear to the ground.

Sudan Grass Useful As Emergency Pasture: Sudan grass, a very useful emergency or supplementary pasture when regular pastures are short, should be planted as

soon as possible. It is a fast growing plant and will produce about 20 to 40 pounds of hay per acre in 20 to 30 days.

Best planting time is about two weeks after normal planting time. Best variety for Kentucky is Piper, which is low in prussic acid content and is more resistant to leaf diseases than other varieties.

Plant at about 20 to 40 pounds an acre; a wheat drill set to deliver two pecks of wheat per acre will put in 20 to 30 pounds an acre of Sudan seed.

Sudan does best on highly productive land and will respond well to a complete fertilizer which is high in nitrogen. Good Sudan pastures will handle two to three cows an acre in summer and is a good milk-maker for beef or dairy animals.

Plant separate Sudan areas about two weeks apart to furnish good rotational grazing. Start pasturing when Sudan is 18 to 24 inches high. Kentucky Agricultural Extension Service Leaflet 154 gives full information on Sudan grass handling. It is available at the County Agent's office.

Top-Dress Alfalfa Crop After First 30 Cutting: Top-dress alfalfa stands after the first cutting in 1959.

The fertilizer should contain ample amounts of potash, phosphorus and in some cases, boron. No nitrogen is recommended—except for the original fertilization on the alfalfa seedbed, because legumes (alfalfa is one)

get nitrogen from the air. Test soils for actual element needs. Generally about 120 pounds actual potash per acre (200 pounds of 60 per cent muriate of potash) is sufficient; phosphorus generally is recommended at the annual rate of 60 pounds actual per acre (300 pounds of 20 per cent superphosphate); and boron, about 10 to 15 pounds per acre. These foods could be supplied in 600 pounds of an 0-10-20 fertilizer, or 300 pounds of an 0-20-40 fertilizer.

Maintenance fertilizer is a must for alfalfa fields if yields and quality are to be maintained.

Extension Circular 312 on alfalfa is available at the County Agent's office.

Leaf-Spot Diseases May Strike Tomatoes: Leaf-spot diseases may hit Kentucky tomato plants in the near future; use one of two recommended sprays to check such fungus diseases.

The recommended materials contain zineb or maneb. During rainy weather, spray weekly; in dry weather, spray every 10 days to two weeks. Follow label directions carefully.

When fruit begins to set, start a spray program that will last the remainder of the season.

Leaf-spot diseases will appear on practically any tomato plants, but those shipped in from such areas as Florida should be most carefully watched.

The various diseases—late blight, early blight, etc.—attach stems as well as leaves. For that reason examine field plants closely for first signs of such diseases.

Diseased plant specimens should be mailed to the plant pathology department, Kentucky Experiment Station, Lexington, for positive identification. Specimens should be

mailed to the University in a plastic bag without additional water added to the plants to aid in shipping. Any extra water added might cause the plants to rot in transit. Anyone desiring this service, please bring the plants to the county agent's office enclosed in a plastic bag and we will be glad to send the plants to the University for diagnosis.

Activities For Homemakers: CRAPTS: Each year the women in homemakers clubs have the opportunity to select a craft to do that will add decorative beauty and charm to the home.

This year aluminum serving trays have been selected. These trays will not only be decorative but very practical and very useable.

The craft training school is scheduled for June 8th.

Election Of Officers: Homemakers clubs, like most clubs, have officers elected by the membership. A nominating committee will present a double slate to the club to be voted on by secret ballot. The election of officers will be done during June or July.

Program Planned For 1959-60: Better use of time and energy when doing household tasks, is

the theme of the program planned for homemakers this coming year.

It is a known fact that more women will be working away from the home; therefore, the homemaker will have a very limited amount of time for housekeeping. Time and energy techniques acquired will enable the homemaker to do all or the greater part of the household tasks without additional help.

For the woman who does not work away from home, more time will be available for civic and community projects.
