Water Bills' New Look

Above is what your new water bill will look like starting July 1. They are printed on a post card with a perforated tab. The new bills will continue to be paid at The Bank of Mt. Vernon.

Under the section "Meter Readings" your previous meter reading will be listed and also your present meter readings and the number of hundred gallons of water used.

The next section will list your account number. Each water customer will have an account number, which is listed on your permanent account card kept by the City Clerk. The account number is listed on both the bill and the stub. This number will remain with the service the year around.

The lower section of the card gives the date the meter was read and include with his check. The stub which will be kept by the bank gives the date of bill, the account number and amount due.

The 10 per cent discount will still be allowed if bill is paid if bill is not paid by the 20th of the month.

If the water customer pays his bill by mail he is to tear off the stub and include with his check. The stub which will be kept by the bank gives the date of bill, the account number and amount due.

There has been no raise in rates nor has the discount been removed. Only the method of billing has been changed.

The three per cent state tax has been included in the charges and totaled. Tax has not been charged to tax exempt customers, such as schools and churches.

The next regular meeting of the State school board is tonight (Thursday).



of such bonds and court having jurisdiction of the action may appoint a receiver to administer such public project in the name of and on behalf of the City, with power to collect rates sufficient to provide for the payment of all bonds and obligations outstanding against it and for the payment of the operating expenses and to apply the revenues in conformity with this ordinance and the provisions of the statute laws of Kentucky. The reasonable legal fees and the costs, if any, incurred by any holder of such bonds or coupons in connection with the obtaining of the appointment of such receiver shall be paid from the revenues of such project.

Section 11. The bonds authorized to be issued hereunder and from time to time outstanding shall not be entitled to priority one over the other in the application of the income and revenues, regardless of the time or times of their issuance, it being the intention that there shall be no priority among the bonds authorized to be issued under the provisions of this ordinance, regardless of the fact that they may be actually issued and delivered at different times. Said City hereby reserves the right and privilege of issuing additional bonds from time to time payable from the income and revenues of said system ranking on a parity with the bonds herein authorized in order to pay the costs of further extensions, improvements and betterments to said system; provided, that before any such additional bonds ranking on a parity may be so issued there shall have been procured and filed with the City Clerk a statement by an independent certified public accountant not in the regular employ of the City reciting the opinion based upon necessary investigation that the net income and revenues of said system during the last fiscal year or the twelve consecutive months immediately preceding the issuance of such additional bonds was equal to at least one and one-half times the maximum amount that will become due in any succeeding year ending on August 1 for both principal and interest on the bonds then outstanding and the bonds then proposed to be issued; provided also, that the interest payment dates for any such additional bonds shall be semi-annually on February and August 1 of each year, and the

principal maturities of such additional bonds shall be on August 1 of the year in which any such principal is scheduled to become due. "Net annual revenues" are defined as gross revenues less operating expenses which shall include salaries, wages, cost of maintenance and operation, materials and supplies, pumping costs and insurance, as well as all other items are normally regularly include under recognized accounting practices, exclusive of allowances for depreciation.

The additional bonds (sometimes herein referred to as "permitted" to be issued), the issuance of which is restricted an condition by this section, shall be understood to mean bonds payable from the income and revenues of said system on a parity with the bonds herein specifically authorized and shall not be deemed to include other obligations, the security and source of payment of which is subordinate and subject to the priority of the bonds herein authorized to be issued. No bonds subordinate and subject to the priority of the bonds herein authorized to be issued shall be issued unless it is necessary to issue such bonds in order to make extensions or improvements to such waterworks system. In the case of the issuance of such bonds which are subordinate and subject to the priority of the bonds herein authorized to be issued, the bonds herein authorized to be issued, the bonds herein authorized to be issued, shall continue to be secured by a pledge of the first revenues from such waterworks system in order to make the payments provided for herein into the sinking fund, including the required reserve in such sinking fund, and any sinking fund provided for for such subordinate and inferior bonds shall be provided for subject to the first revenues from such system being pledged to secure the payment of the amounts herein provided to be paid into the sinking fund herein provided for.

Section 12. Whenever this ordinance refers to the duties of the City of Livingston, Kentucky with reference to the maintenance, operation and supervision of such waterworks system or as to other duties which are to be performed, it is agreed that such duties shall be performed by the City, its Water Commission, if one is established, or other proper agency of the City which is authorized by law to perform such duties.

Section 13. The provisions of this ordinance shall constitute a contract between the City of Livingston and the holders of the bonds herein authorized to be issued, and the interest on any of the bonds no change, variation or alteration of any kind of the provisions of this ordinance shall be made in any manner except as herein provided until such time as all of said bonds issued hereunder and the interest thereon have been paid in full.

Section 14. If any section, paragraph, clause or provision of this ordinance shall be held invalid, the invalidity of such provision, paragraph, clause or provision shall not affect any of the remaining provisions of this ordinance.

Section 15. All ordinances, resolutions and orders, or parts thereof in conflict with the provisions of this ordinance are to the extent of such conflict hereby repealed.

Section 16. That the City Clerk be and he is hereby authorized and directed to cause notice to be published in *The Mount Vernon Signal*, the newspaper published in Rockcastle County, Kentucky, which has the largest circulation therein, in accordance with law, and in addition such notice shall be published in *The Courier-Journal*, published in Louisville, Kentucky, and such notice shall be published in the place and time and place of for subject to the first revenues from such system being pledged to secure the payment of the amounts herein provided to be paid into the sinking fund herein provided for.

Section 12. Whenever this
