Needy Families Get Dried Eggs

Eleven carloads of dried white egg solids have been obtained from the Commodore Credit Corporation for distribution among the approximately 290,000 welfare recipients in the state, according to Agriculture Commissioner Ben Butler.

Thomas A. Lewis, director of the commodity distribution program in this State, said this will be sufficient for the welfare needs during June and July. Lewis revealed that accompanying the June distribution is a sheet of suggested recipes for preparing menus that utilize dried eggs. Distribution is being made by the counties in the program on the basis of six and one-half ounces a month a person. Five ounces of dried egg solids are the equivalent of one dozen shell eggs. The commodity director said

he had no idea as to whether Kentucky could expect further allocations of eggs. Such allocations are dependent upon future purchases of eggs by CCC. Also, initial allocations must be made to all states before Kentucky can expect reallocation. Prior to this current allotment for welfare cases, Kentucky had received 14 carloads for school lunches and one carload for charitable institutions.

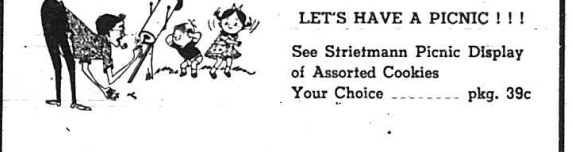

Vernon School said, "I think it is the best thing that has happened to Rockcastle County schools, as a whole, and I was much impressed by the cooperation of the Boards and their willingness to unite in a solid front for the betterment of schools in Rockcastle County. I want to express my thanks to the State Department, Mr. Ted Gilbert and Mr. Marshall Swain for their help in consummation of the merger."

### Mrs. Miracle Addresses Boards Agree Boards In Joint Session After 5 Hour Deliberation

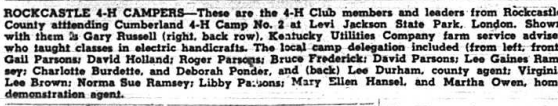
**Ed. Note**—Excerpts from the address of Rockcastle County School Superintendent Neureul Miracle to the Mt. Vernon and Rockcastle County Boards of Education in joint session for the purpose of effecting merger follow:

"Today we are faced with a situation which will determine the future of Rockcastle County Schools. We have TWO ROADS TO TAKE. We can take the road to harmony, cooperation and agreement which will build a school system second to none. Or, we can take the road to disagreement, selfishness and sectionalism which will end up in chaos. Just what do our schools exist for? Not for profit! Not for gambling! Not for personal gain! But for preparing our boys and girls for facing adulthood. I want to make it clear that I have had no part in urging this merger. Each year I have recommended to our board to give us an ADA contract for pupils who were conveniently located to come to Mt. Vernon and wanted to come to Mt. Vernon, sufficient to keep the minimum number of high school pupils to keep an A rating. Now as to the State Department of Education I think they have been very patient with you people at Mt. Vernon. According to law they had the right to force merger the first time you went into the red. They have waited even more to continue with you. They can not go on and on and on, sufficient to keep the laws of the Foundation Program and the program of education of Kentucky. They

have said it is expensive to operate a small system and if you want to pay the price you shall have that liberty. What else would they say? It is not their fault that you are a small district. The Foundation Program is not their program but a program made by all of the people of Kentucky who voted to amend Section 186 of our Constitution. If every one will lay down all personal feelings and think only of what is best for our children. We cannot have one section pulling against another but we must shake hands with real faith and be your brothers without emergency reasons. Each Board member is liable for a fine of \$10,000 and possible imprisonment if we do not fully exceed our budget. I am always conscious of this fact and each day I guard the expenditures. Sometimes it hurts that I cannot say to a good prospective teacher, "Yes, we will give you a 5 hundred above the salary schedule," in order to attract her, but I must. It hurts to lose a good teacher but it would hurt even more to be faced with illegal practices. Then again what would happen to our teachers if you paid one teacher more than another with the same

Terms of merger were completed Monday night between the Mt. Vernon Independent District and the Rockcastle County Board of Education at the County School Administration Building. Six conditions of merger were presented by Mt. Vernon and agreed to by the County Board. They are:

1. All teachers and school employees contracts of the Mt. Vernon Independent District will be honored by the Rockcastle County Board of Education.
2. Clyde Linville will be given an administrative position in the Rockcastle County School District for the balance of his contract expiring on June 30, 1960 at a salary of not less than \$4,000 per year.
3. So far as possible the training level of the teaching staff at Mt. Vernon will be maintained at least at its present level.
4. Every effort will be made to bring all high schools of the county to a Standard High School rating in 1959-60.
5. The State Department of Education will be requested to re-survey the school facilities of the County and make long-range recommendations for future school facilities.
6. That Preston R. Nunneley and L. D. Bryant of the Mt. ### Magistrates Vote \$60 Salary; Slash Co. Budget

The five Magistrates of Rockcastle County voted themselves a salary of \$60 per month at their called meeting, Tuesday. This is in addition to their per diem expenses of \$15 for each meeting they attend, whether regular or called. Funds were set up in the new budget for 14 meetings in the coming year. This should allow the regular monthly meetings and two called meetings for any emergency. In order to provide funds for their salaries it was decided by the Magistrates to reduce Purgation Board funds \$300; Dog Warden \$150 a year; Pauper Funds \$500; Commodities Clerk Salary \$500 eliminate the position of County Attorney Clark, who is paid \$600.

Other funds were made up by reducing per diem expenses \$800 (meetings have been held twice monthly in the past year) and by using \$650 from the surplus or emergency fund. In this manner \$3600 was raised to pay Magistrate salaries. The motion to lower the above expenses was made by Matt Jones and seconded by G. H. Griffin. Magistrates F. F. Robbins, Griffin, Jones, and G. Swinford voted in favor of the motion. Magistrate J. R. Poynter abstained. The motion was made by G. H. Griffin to pay Magistrates \$60 per month for trying criminal cases. It was seconded by G. Swinford and Robbins. This was the only Magistrate who voted against this. He had been in favor of \$50 per month, he said.

County Attorney James W. Lambert told the Court what had been done to solve the situation in these trials was sufficient to defray expense of one Magistrate in this case. Atty. Lambert refused to sign the budget as changed because he said "About March or April the court will be out of money and time goes on." Judge Money Ed Cummins then refused to sign. He said if Atty. Lambert, who advises the court, felt he couldn't sign then he couldn't. Atty. Lambert told the Court that the budget did not necessarily have to be signed according to his interpretation of Kentucky Statutes relating to the matter. He advised the Court to send the budget to Frankfort, unsigned. This was done.

County Treasurer Ernest Bullock stated, "The only way the budget can be reduced without injury to the County is to cut out the County and Home Agents." Magistrate Robbings agreed. Magistrate Swinford favored cutting the pauper fund and hospital allowance.

### Co. Officials Short, Auditor Foust Declared

A State audit released Wednesday indicates that Rockcastle County Attorney James W. Lambert owes the County \$2,200 in fees collected in excess of his \$5,000 annual salary. Lambert disputed the audit, however, saying he has been authorized by Fiscal Court to draw a yearly salary of \$7,200, which would eliminate any excess fees due the County.

The audit showed Lambert had a gross income of \$9,048 in 1957 and paid the County \$1,848 in excess fees in February, 1958, leaving \$2,200 still due on the basis of a \$5,000-a-year salary. State Auditor Mary Louise Foust said only the sheriff has been authorized to collect \$7,200 annual salary and therefor Lambert owes \$2,200.

Contacted at Mt. Vernon, Lambert said he collected and allowed \$7,200 since taking office in 1956. He said Fiscal Court conceded that he is entitled to draw \$7,200 a year.

The only other County official shown to owe money in the audit was Clerk Clarence Carter, listed as owing \$498 for 1958 and \$832 for 1957. Interviewed At Mt. Vernon, County Clerk Clarence Carter said he contacted Felix Bowman who was County Attorney at the time the order was put on the Order Book and Magistrates who were then in office, J. R. Poynter, Matt Jones and Urban Hamm and asked them what they thought. County Officials were to draw by order on the Order Book in May of 1956. They replied "the statutory limit of \$7200, will be McKimley's concern" provided they make that as Carter and Lambert both as (Continued on Page 4)

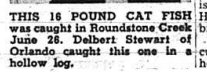

## Hunting Season News 3 New Counties Opened

A three-day gun deer hunting season for 1959, during which both bucks and does may be taken, has been set for Kentucky by the Fish and Wildlife Resources Commission. The season will open Dec. 4 and end Dec. 6. The Commission meeting at Camp Earl Wallace on Lake Cumberland, also opened three new counties to deer hunting this year. They are Floyd, Harlan and Crittenden. Close to hunters were that section of Meade County west of Highlands 64 and 448 and the entire posted areas of the Beaver Creek Refuge in Pulaski and McCreary counties. Only a two day season was decreed for three counties, Pulaski, McCreary and Laurel, upon recommendation of biologists stationed in those areas.

Also set was an archery season to open Oct. 21 and continue through Nov. 19 in all counties where gun hunting is permitted. The Commission also voted in favor of seasons on Kentucky Woodlands and military reservations, but those dates must be approved by federal authorities. Pertaining to the deer hunt these regulations were approved: When a hunter bags a deer he must cease hunting for the remainder of the season; weapons to be used are the same as for last season and a \$10.50 permit for both residents and non-residents was set and the holder may either hunt by gun or by bow and arrow, but must take not more than one deer during the year. The hunter, in addition to the permit, must also have a valid hunting license. Resident landowners and resident tenants will not be required to have a hunting permit to hunt on the land on which they live during the open season, the Commission ruled.

The Commission also went on record as favoring an archery turkey season on Kentucky Woodlands but final action on this proposal must be taken by federal authorities.

The squirrel season will open on Aug. 29 and continue through Nov. 26 (90 days). This year there will be no split season. The bag and possession limit will remain the same as for last season, six per day or a possession limit of 12 after two or more days of hunting. Squirrel hunting will be permitted on the Ballard County Refuge from Aug. 29 through Oct. 15. A dove season will be permitted on this area, but the dates will be set by federal authorities. The Jones-Keeley Refuge, in Caldwell County, will be open to squirrel hunters throughout the season and the first ten days of the season, beginning Aug. 29, squirrels may be killed on the Robertson Forestry in Knott and Perry Counties and the Ford Tract in Clay and Leslie Counties.

The open season on rabbits, quail and grouse will open Nov. 29 and continue through Jan. 18 and the bag limit for all species remain unchanged. The bag limit for rabbits is eight per day; for quail 10 per day and for grouse two per day. Possession limits after two or more days of hunting will be double the bag limits for these three species.

W. A. Rock, teacher of vocational agriculture at Brodhead High School, is enrolled in a graduate course in agricultural education at the University of Kentucky. This course, Selecting Teaching Materials, carries three semester hours of credit and is offered from June 29 to July 17. A part of his work will be revising and bringing up-to-date the four-year course of study for boys studying vocational agriculture at Brodhead.
