John McHargue, 50, was killed in an auto accident Saturday night about 3 p. m. He was alone and evidently ran off the road and turned over. The accident happened 1 1/2 miles north of Livingston.

Homer Quillen, 41, of Middleboro is in the Rockcastle County Baptist Hospital suffering from a broken knee and chest injuries received Saturday at 10:40 p. m. when the car he was driving was hit in the rear by an auto driven by William Thomas Kendrick, 21.

Mrs. Cleo Quillen, 40, wife of Homer Quillen is also in the Rockcastle Hospital. She suffered cuts, bruises and abrasions. Kendrick has been charged with operating a motor vehicle while under the influence of intoxicants and speeding. The other occupants of the car Kendrick was driving were: Jesse Baker, Sherman Norton, David Talbot, Billy Floyd Livezey, all of Mt. Vernon. They have been charged with public drunkenness. All these boys received lacerations on various parts of the body, mostly on the head.

State Trooper Raymond Hall and Kendrick apparently started to pass Quillen, hit his car in the rear and knocked it off the road. The vehicle Kendrick was driving turned over two or three times. The accident happened 2.4 miles south of Mt. Vernon on U. S. 25.

Other occupants of the Quillen car were: Lizzie Harrison, 69, Joan Quillen, 9, Billy Quillen, 14, Marvin Quillen, 16. Marvin was seemingly not injured. The others had cuts and bruises.

Patrick Car Hit Billy George Howell, 23, of Brodhead was involved in an unusual accident, Saturday.

State Trooper Willie Martin said the car driven by Howell came into a curve, apparently being driven too fast. The driver lost control of the car, travelled 130 feet down the road, ran off in the ditch, travelled 127 more feet, came back on the road, travelled 60 feet across the road and hit an auto belonging to Bobby Adams in the front end. The Adams car was parked in front of his house. The impact knocked the Adams car around into a tree. Both cars were severely damaged. Wreckless driving charges have been placed against Howell.

USING fertilizers on acid soils without first adding needed lime, is like trying to run a race with lead weights in your shoes, reports Dr. Orlo Musgrave, Ohio State University.

“It helps release nitrogen and other plant nutrient elements from the soil in a form matter. It helps maintain applied soluble phosphate in a more readily available state. In addition, lime provides calcium and magnesium which are essential for plant growth.”

“High crop yields require large amounts of readily available nutrients. Musgrave emphasizes.

“The selection of the proper fertilizer depends on a knowledge of the crop's nutrient requirements and the soil's nutrient-supplying power,” he says.

“The fertilization program should supply nutrients to balance the soil nutrient supply, in order to get maximum or near-maximum net returns.”

Bumper wheat yields remove large amounts of plant food from the soil.
