

Mrs. Miracle Cuts Salary Wm. I. Norton Resigns

Agriculture teacher, W. I. Norton, of Mt. Vernon High School, resigned this week because Rockcastle County Superintendent of Schools Neureul Miracle reduced his yearly salary from \$4,800 to below \$4,000.

Two applications are now in Mrs. Miracle's office for the job as agriculture teacher, she said. She declined, however, to name the applicants, who are former residents of Rockcastle County.

Mrs. Miracle put agriculture teachers on the same salary scale with regular teachers. Agriculture teachers are employed on a full day basis from 8 to 5. In addition to class work, they supervise farm programs of their students, a part of their regular job.

Mrs. Miracle asked the state office to certify that agriculture teachers have extra duties and pay a certain amount for that. E. P. Hilton, head of the Agriculture Department at State, refused because, he said, this was not an extra duty, but a part of the regular duties.

When the Smith Hughes Act was passed in 1917 allotting money for an agricultural program, it was specifically stated that agriculture teachers must carry on a supervised farming program which would, of necessity, be on the farm after school hours.

Under the Minimum Foundation Act, Mrs. Miracle can pay 10 per cent less than present salaries, but why cut salaries, teachers ask?

Marshall E. Swain, Director of Finance, at Frankfort, said that so long as a local board meets the conditions of a single salary schedule they are within their rights to determine the salary of an individual. He declined to comment on any reduction.

MRS. MIRACLE SAYS

Mrs. Miracle says under the new Foundation Program each teacher is paid according to his training and experience. No teacher is to be paid extra unless there is actually extra duty performed. The visitations in the afternoons done by the agriculture teachers are considered by the Vocational Department at Frankfort as their regular duty. The only extra money sent down for the Ag teachers is for the night class which is given to them. The very same amount of money is sent down from Frankfort for an agriculture teacher with the same training as an English, Mathematics or any other regular teacher, except for mileage for which they are reimbursed.

Mr. Norton indicated that he could not work for the regular salary. His salary plus the amount for night reimbursement would be just above \$4,000 on the 12 month basis. We are sorry to lose Mr. Norton. His resignation will be announced after the meeting of the Board of Education.

Deadline For Registration, Sept. 5




