## Fires Not To Be Set Without Taking Precautions To Prevent Spread

It shall be unlawful for any owner or lessee of land to set fire to or to procure another to set fire to any woods, brush, logs, leaves, grass, debris or other inflammable material on such land unless he has previously taken all reasonable care and precaution, by having cut and piled the same or carefully cleared around the same to prevent the spread of such fire to lands other than those owned or leased by him.

It shall also be unlawful for any employee of any such owner or lessee of land to set fire to or to procure another to set fire to any woods, brush, logs, leaves, grass, debris, or other inflammable material, upon such lands unless he shall have taken similar precautions to prevent the spread of such fire to any other land.

## Court Adjourns Saturday 3 Sentenced, All Appeal

Circuit Court Judge R. C. Tartar said the jury was adjourned until the November term of court, Wednesday.

Court, he said, would be present until Saturday to transact matters that may need attention. During this term, 73 cases were docketed, 17 of which were for child desertion. The docket was light Tuesday. Tartar declared, Child desertion cases are kept on the docket from term to term in order to insure prompt payment to dependent children. Of the total 72 cases 20 were not tried because they were not apprehended by officers.

Tommy Charles Barrett, 17, was found guilty of house-breaking and sentenced to two years in prison. He filed a motion and grounds for a retrial next term of court and is free under bond.

Three cases were continued until Nov. 18, next term of court. Homer Brummett was charged with malicious shooting and wounding (Cecil Hasty). This case was continued because of the absence of Atty. Ed Denney. Atty. Denney left on a vacation for a month. This was the only case scheduled for Aug. 17. Jurors were present and 20 witnesses in the case appeared.

John Rufus Hill was charged with killing Arthur Taylor with his automobile while under the influence of an intoxicant. Atty. Fritz Kreuger stated in open court, "I am too ill to try this case. It was reset for Nov. 24."

The case of Gillis Johnson and Jesse Mobley was continued until Nov. 18. They each filed counter charges for malicious shooting and wounding. Edgar Wagner was found not guilty of child desertion. John Willis and Elmer Willis were found guilty of malicious cutting and wounding and were sentenced two years in the penitentiary. They filed motion and grounds for a new trial and are free under bond. The same charges against Mrs. John Willis was dismissed.

Charles Allen was charged with wild fire. He did not appear and forfeited his \$500 bond. James H. Cummins did not appear to defend himself against false pretense charges. He also forfeited his \$500 bond and a warrant was issued for his arrest.

The case against I. L. Anglin was continued until Nov. 28. Marie Holland, who was charged with maintaining a public nuisance at her place of business at Pine Hill, filed an affidavit, signed by Dr. R. G. West, stating that she was pregnant. The case was set for Nov. 17. Bill Clark was fined \$200 and 30 days in jail for violating a public nuisance. His co-defendant, Bessie Laswell could not be tried because she is ill.

Penalties. (3) Any person violating any provisions of KRS 149,290 or 149,300 shall, upon conviction, be fined not less than ten nor more than one hundred dollars, or imprisoned for not less than ten days nor more than six months, or both, for each separate offense. If any forest fire shall originate as a result of the violation by any person of any provision of KRS 149,290 or 149,300, such fee or within two hundred feet of any woodland or brushland, except between the hours of 4:30 P. M. and twelve o'clock at night, or when the ground is covered with snow, the full amount of all expenses incurred by the state and the county respectively in suppressing such fire, such amounts to be recoverable by action brought by the Director of the Division of Forestry in the name of the Commonwealth and by the county attorney on behalf of the county.

Use of Fire To Smoke Out Game Prohibited. No person shall use fire or smoke to drive game out of a field, or a, or burn a field, for the purpose of driving game. Spark Arrestors and Right-of-Way. ## FARM AND HOME NEWS

**Preparation And Seeding A New Lawn**  
A new lawn should be properly graded, the soil prepared to a depth of four inches and worked until it is in excellent condition. It should be free from clots of trash of any kind. The soil should be tested to see whether lime, phosphate or potash are needed. If any or all of these materials are needed, they should be applied immediately and worked into the top 2 or 3 inches of soil. Use 10 to 15 pounds of a complete fertilizer if needed to 1,000 square feet of surface.  
After the lime and fertilizer have been applied and worked into the soil, the lawn is ready for the first seeding. From June 20th to September 1st use the following seed mixture: Sow 2 1/2 to 3 pounds of annual Italian Rye grass per 1,000 square feet. Scatter Rake and roll this seeding to protect from the birds, then, make a mixture in the proportion of 4 pounds of Red Top and 1 pound of Bluegrass. Sow 1 pound of the Red Top-Bluegrass mixture to 1,000 square feet of lawn.  
If the new lawn is seeded in September, use the following mixture: Sow 2 1/2 to 3 pounds of annual Italian Rye Grass, rye and rye. Make a mixture of 4 pounds of Bluegrass and 1 pound of Red Top. Sow 1 1/2 pounds of the Bluegrass-Red Top mixture to 1,000 square feet of surface and do not cover. Bluegrass-Red Top.  
Sow 3 ounces of White Dutch Clover and the last 10 days of

March as a companion crop with Bluegrass. Mix the White Dutch Clover with 1/2 gallon sand or soil before sowing. Feed the lawn every year. Feed in November or early December and not later than March 15th. If straw is available for mulching the lawn, the mulch should be applied just after the lawn has been seeded. Clipping should begin when the grass is about 1 1/2 inches high, but the mower should be set to cut two inches high and be kept that way all the time.

**1960 Fertilizer Grades Recommended by UK:**  
Recommended Fertilizer grades for 1960 have been sent fertilizer manufacturers by the UK Cooperative Extension Service and Agricultural Experiment Station.  
The ratios of (plant nutrients) and the minimum grade for that particular ratio are as follows: Ratio 0-1-1, minimum grade of 0-20-20; ratio 0-1-2, minimum grade of 0-10-20; ratio 1-1-1, minimum grade of 10-10-10; ratio 1-1-3, minimum grade of 6-8-18; ratio 1-2-2, minimum grade of 5-10-10; ratio 1-2-3, minimum grade of 5-10-15; ratio 1-3-2, minimum grade of 4-12-8; ratio 1-4-4, minimum grade of 4-16-16; and ratio of 1-3-0 minimum grade of 3-24-0.  
All grades with an analysis higher than the minimum in these nine recommended ratios also are recommended.  
Changes in 1959's recommendations are as follows: Ratio 0-2-1, dropped; ratio 1-3-0, minimum grade of 3-24-8 added to list; ratio 1-4-4, minimum recommended grade to be 5-10-15; ratio 1-3-2, minimum grade of 4-12-8; ratio 1-4-4, minimum grade of 4-16-16; and ratio of 1-3-0 minimum grade of 3-24-0.  
3. Heating of the soil—such as by burning plant beds or piles of refuse, increases the amount of manganese in the soil that is available to plants.  
In many cases moderate toxicity symptoms will disappear later in the growing season and will cause little or no damage. It is believed that

nothing can be done to correct severe toxicity symptoms in the particular year that it occurs.  
However, in planning for the future, there are some steps that a grower who has experienced this trouble may take.  
1. Select an area where there is less likelihood of trouble from one of the above causes.  
2. Plan to use some type of rotation plan rather than continue culture which leads to more acid soils and poorer soil structure.  
3. Use lime to correct soil acidity if this appears to be the cause or one of the causes. Even when continuous tobacco must be of benefit provided other fertility factors, especially potash, are maintained at good levels.  
Manganese is one of the plant or elements essential to plant growth but in very small amounts. The uptake of manganese by tobacco in amounts great enough to cause damage is due to one or more of the following factors:  
1. Soil acidity—the more acid the soil the greater the uptake of manganese.  
2. Soil drainage—poor drainage and aeration tend to increase manganese uptake by plants.  
3. Heating of the soil—such as by burning plant beds or piles of refuse, increases the amount of manganese in the soil that is available to plants.  
In many cases moderate toxicity symptoms will disappear later in the growing season and will cause little or no damage. It is believed that
