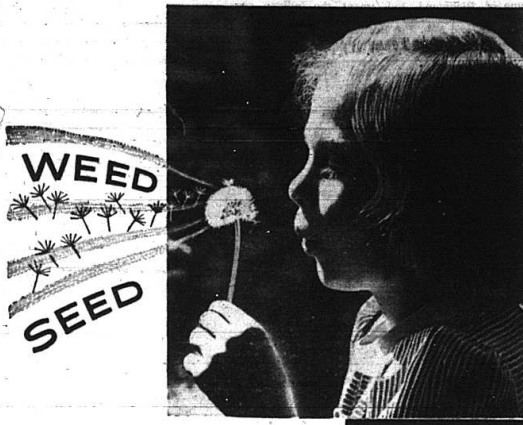

Vets May Add Rider To Insurance Policy

Many veterans with government insurance may protect themselves against income loss during total disability before age 60 by adding a disability rider to their policies, advised the Kentucky Disabled, Ex-Service Men's Board. Board Director R. R. Thomas said: Insurance statistics show that at age 35 about 33 out of 100 men will be totally disabled for three months or more before reaching age 65. The average length of the disability will be 18 months and almost 30 per cent will be permanent.

The benefit payable under the rider is \$10 per month for each \$1,000 of insurance in force after the insured has been totally disabled for six or more consecutive months and continues for the duration of the disability.

Officers confiscated the following articles at the still: one 50 gallon steel drum, ten 50 gallon fermenters, 10 gallons of moonshine whiskey, one 20 gallon pot, one 20 gallon pail, one wash tub, one gas burner, two 5 gallon gas cans, one pressure tank, two funnels, one lantern, four 1 gallon glass jugs, two water pails, one tin, five gallons of gas, and one 6 coil, one inch, worm to fit a 50 gallon drum.

Officers who were on the raid were Deputy Sheriffs, Sam Hoskins and Robert Abney and Norman Curtisinger, Paul Tarr, Douglas McMillan, Captain Reed, Carl Harmon, Claude Williams, Shelby Love.

The still was reported capable of putting out 75 gallons of whiskey per week.

The Mt. Vernon City Council held a called meeting Wednesday evening and adopted a motion to return the City of Mt. Vernon to slow time Sunday, Aug. 30, at 12 midnight.

The Council had a poll taken of those who favored fast and slow time. The result was two to one in favor of slow time because school is operating on slow time. Last spring a poll was taken before fast time was voted in and four out of 80 were opposed to fast time.

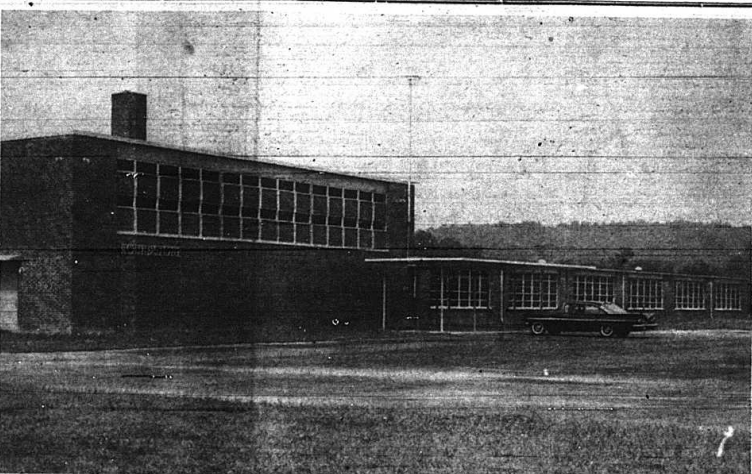

Roundstone School Holds Open House Sunday, School Tuesday

Everyone will be able to examine the newly completed Roundstone Elementary School at the Open House, Sunday, Aug. 30, from 1 to 4 p. m., slow time.

All teachers will be in their rooms to greet visitors. All cooks will be on duty to serve cakes, pies, ice cream and cold drinks which will be furnished by milk distributors and wholesale houses. Roundstone's new principal, Clyde Linville, moved into the home near the school, last Tuesday. Besides his regular school duties, Mr. Linville will be in charge of school property and oversee the gardens.

Brodhead Holt is the Roundstone custodian. He will have charge of the heating, water supply, cleaning of the building and assist and direct laborers in the garden.

A total of 14 teachers have been hired. They are: first grade, Mrs. Beulah Stewart and Mrs. Jewell Parsons; second grade, Mrs. Eva Mullins and Mrs. Juanita Stanley; third grade, Miss Onedia Burdette; fourth grade, Mrs. Ida Abney; fifth grade, Mrs. Dixie Hill; sixth grade, Mrs. Martha Hill and Mrs. Sally Hale. The seventh, eighth and eighth grades will be decentralized on the side of the rec-

partmentalized (each teacher will teach certain subjects and not the whole program of the student) Seventh and eighth teachers are: Luther Hill, Anna Ingles and Mrs. Sue Clontz Hunt.

The lunch room will be supervised by Mrs. Margaret Linville. Other lunch room employees are: Mrs. Isaac Barnett, Mrs. Ruth Huff, Mrs. John French, Mrs. Beulah Burdette and Mrs. Aster VanWinkle.

There are two two-room schools which will be transferred to Roundstone and 12 one-room schools. They are: Conway, Fairview, both two-room schools, Green Hill, Hayes School, Scaffold Cane, Walnut Grove, Davis Branch Hammonds School, Anglin Falls, Disputanta, Boiling Springs, Wildie, Gabbard and Hurricane. The bus schedule appears elsewhere in the paper.

The school is composed of 14 class rooms, the principal's office, teachers lounge, several storage rooms, kitchen and multiple purpose room. The multiple purpose room is an auditorium, gym and cafeteria. Tables and benches are built into the wall. They are opened with a key and pulled down in minutes. When closed they look like built-in panels in the wall. The stage is on the side of the rec-

angular room. It has maroon curtains which are decorated with gold fringe and a gold rod. The kitchen has all stainless steel fixtures. It is equipped with a potato peeler, potato masher, milk cooler, extra large refrigerator, stove with five and two separate room ovens. There are two separate sinks besides the two on the stove.

A large storage room off the kitchen has shelves, large sink and an ice cream box. There is also a walk in freezer. Dishes are of yellow plastic.

In the supply room to the right of the principal's office, the inter-communication system is controlled. At any time, any room may be tuned in on the system and teaching and professional announcements may be given over the system for the whole school or any announcements.

The first and second grade rooms are equipped with private toilets. When the toilet is occupied a red light flashes. A lavatory is in the school room. To the back of the rooms lockers line the wall. Each locker is sectioned off for two children. The lockboards are green and metallic. Magnetic squares a little more than an inch square are on the boards. They may be used to fasten posters on the board.

The furnace room houses the coal storage room, the stoker furnace, the six pumps which pump hot water to the concealed radiators in all rooms and the water storage tank. Water is pumped from two furnaces, one under the furnace room and one some 600 yards in the rear of the building to the storage tank and then purified. The basement of the furnace room is a storage tank for water. Brocade Holt said water was 8 feet deep there.

The front entrance hall bears a plaque which reads: Roundstone Elementary School, erected 1958, Rockcastle County Board of Education, John E. Harris, Chairman, of the board; Nathan Clark, L. B. Elder, Jr., Architects; Crawford Mahaffey-Cornett, Contractors.

The school grounds have 16 to 17 acres. The septic tank is fenced in with woven wire. Some 7 or 8 acres of the grounds are planted in garden vegetables. There are 1/2 acres of corn, 1/2 acres of potatoes, 1/2 acres of tomatoes, one-half acre of mustard and 3/4 acres of turnips. The mustard and turnip have recently been sown.

FOURTH GRADE CLASS ROOM . . . Chair type seats are in all rooms above the second grade. First and second grades have tables and chairs. In the picture above, lockers may be seen in back of the room. Each locker is shared by two students.

MULTIPLE PURPOSE ROOM . . . Benches and tables fold out of panels in the walls in the multiple purpose room at lunch time. Brodhead Holt, Roundstone Custodian, is folding a table down in its backyard. Tables fold out of the wall to allow play activities or assembly programs.

Bus Schedule In Roundstone New Area Told

Students from the Roundstone School area will be riding buses to school this year who have walked or been taken in private autos in the past.

After the merger of Mt. Vernon High School with the County System the Rockcastle County Board of Education set up a new geographical division in the Roundstone area. They declared: all grade students in the Roundstone area must attend the Roundstone School. All high school freshmen and sophomores from the Roundstone School area must attend Mt. Vernon High School. Juniors and Seniors from the Roundstone area are given the privilege of attending either the Brodhead or Mt. Vernon. Ultimately all high school students from the area will go to Mt. Vernon.

Roundstone was the only major geographic division, Assistant Superintendents of County Schools John L. Saylor and . . . All other areas, he said, are unaffected.

Friday, Aug. 29, all buses, scheduled, will be engaged in hauling school children, will be inspected at Mt. Vernon. There are 68 students, four panel trucks, four station wagons, and two cars set to transport school children.

Stewart Parsons will drive bus no. 1, High school students will be picked up on the Scaffold Cane road around to Wildie and taken to the bus stop on the Davis Branch road. Travis Cope will meet this bus at Davis Branch School. A total of 41 students from Scaffold Cane "loop" and 17 grade students are on the Davis Branch road.

Junior Daugherty will pick up all high school students on U. S. 25 from Boone to Mt. Vernon. They must wait at Mt. Vernon for the Parsons bus.

Jack Dailey will drive a bus around upper Clear Creek to Roundstone where he will collect 68 students. Travis Cope will drive a bus on the Clear Anglin Falls Road down to Clear Creek Road where they will catch Dailey's bus. Dailey will make a second run from Wildie to Roundstone and pick up 41 students.

Junior Daugherty will pick up both grade and high school students from Boone to Snider and high school students from Snider to Roundstone where they will meet the Parsons bus.

Sherman Hansel will drive a bus from Brindle Ridge to Roundstone where he will collect 56 students. His second trip will be from Old Berea Road to Snider and on to Roundstone where he will haul 49.

John C. Burdette will pick up 50 children on his first trip from Cap Rock to Macesona. Powell then up Rucker Branch to Glenn-Ponder's and thence to Roundstone. His second trip will be for 40 children from Roundstone to Oscar Isaacs to Roundstone. Grade students from Snider to Conway will go in the first load. Grade students from Conway to Roundstone will take the second trip.

Freddie Dooley will collect 74 students from Macedonia Church to Roundstone. He will collect 53 on the second trip from Roundstone to Curfew Hill to Roundstone. Homer McNew meets this bus. He will haul grade students out of the area. The second section will meet Dooley's bus at Renfro.

Teachers Conference Changed To Brodhead

The opening teachers conference which was scheduled to be held Monday, Aug. 31, at the Mt. Vernon High School, has been changed. Assistant Superintendent of County Schools John L. Saylor said, the meeting will be held at Brodhead High School instead of Mt. Vernon. The meeting area in front of Mt. ed for three years if approved in the September referendum. Producers having two-thirds of the volume of production represented in the referendum must approve if the agreement is to be extended.

Deductions from wool and lamb payments under the new agreement would not exceed 1 cent per pound for shorn wool and 3 cents per hundredweight for unshorn lambs. Deductions at these rates have been made from payments for each marketing year since 1955.

Producers may vote throughout September. The entire month has been designated as the voting period to encourage as large a turnout as possible. Any producer who believes he is eligible to vote and does not receive a ballot within the next few days should get in touch with the county ASC Office. To be counted, ballots must be received by the county ASC Office not later than September 30. Chairman Shellie Mulkins urged producers to mark and return their ballots as soon as they are received.

interest earned at the 1-year point will be increased from 2.28 per cent to 2.33 per cent, at the 2-year point, from 2.34 per cent to 2%, and at the 3-year point from 2 per cent to 3 1/2 per cent.

The H Bond will continue to have approximately the same increase in schedule of interest earning as the E bond by means of increasing interest checks up to two years with a constant amount thereafter. If the proposed legislation starting at the 2-year time period will have an increase in the interest rate of return from 3.38 per cent to 4 per cent which will continue to maturity.

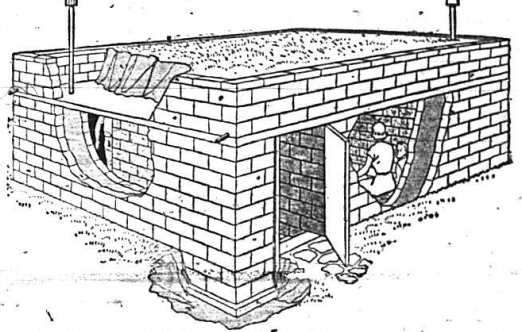

ABOVEGROUND DOUBLE-WALL SHELTER

For Family Protection From Radioactive Fallout



AN OUTDOOR aboveground fallout shelter may be built of concrete blocks. It is recommended for houses without basements or for regions where water or rock is close to the surface, making it impractical to build an underground shelter. Two walls of concrete blocks are constructed at least 20 inches apart. The space between is filled with gravel or earth. The walls are held together with metal ties placed in wet mortar as the walls are built. The roof is a six-inch slab of reinforced concrete, covered with at least 20 inches of gravel or earth. Most people would have to hire a contractor to build this shelter. Plans appear in the OGDM 25-page booklet, "The Family Fallout Shelter."
