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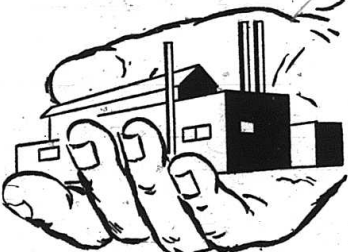

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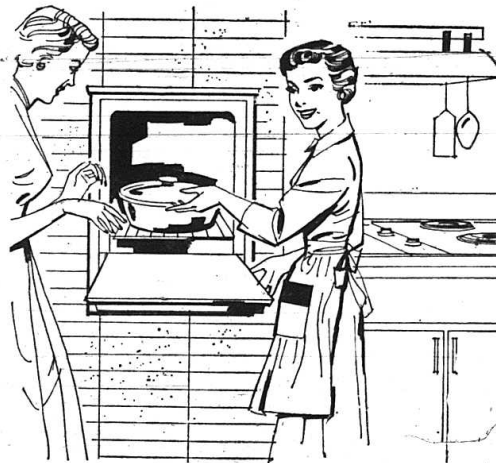

Boswell, 28, of Harrodsburg. The collision spun Ward's auto around in the road and it struck the back of the truck.

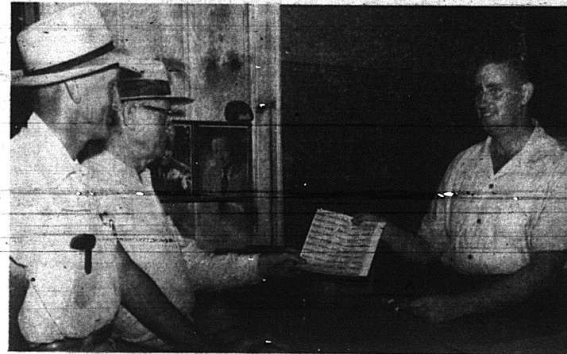
The first step is for each farmer who wishes to offer cropland under the program to ask the County ASC Committee to set a basic annual rate per acre for the land offered.

## Norton Defends Vo-Ag

My intentions were to resign as Vocational Agriculture teacher without comment, but after hearing several thoughtless remarks made concerning my resignation and learning of previous developments and because I have a host of farmer friends that I would like to have understand the situation, I decided to make some observations and comments.

In the first place I would like to explain to you why I resigned. I was forced to resign by an unreasonable salary cut from the local school administration. When I presented my resignation your superintendent informed me she was glad to get it so soon because she had already made application for the job and she needed to let them know something. Yes, I resigned, just as the administration expected I would.

Sure I can live and work for less than \$4800 a year. If there were an economic base for it I would have worked for the people of Rockcastle County for less.

I chose teaching Vocational Agriculture as a profession. I have been following that profession in Rockcastle County for over past 18 years. I have had a goal and ambition to advance in professional status, knowledge of technical agriculture and become proficient in teaching Future Farmers and young and adult farmers and at the same time adequately advance in pay for that service. That I have done to my satisfaction, up to now, and I am sure to the satisfaction of many others in this county with whom I have worked.

To have my salary slashed by almost \$1,000 (without reason) does not make sense and does not fulfill my profession and services rendered heretofore. I could not continue at that reduced salary and do the kind of job "myself" would expect of me.

One of the pet gripes of other teachers that agriculture teachers should not be paid more than any other teacher. Vocational Agriculture teachers spend more time on the job than do other teachers. If you figure hours spent on the job they make less than other teachers. Besides, the Vocational Agriculture teacher pulls other teachers salary up, which is definitely needed.

It has been rumored that federal aid is no longer received for Vocational Agriculture units. There is just as much federal aid available as there ever was for Vocational Agriculture. It is true that this county will not get any Federal aid for the kind of agriculture that is now being offered.

Since unqualified teachers have been hired to teach agriculture at Mt. Vernon and Brodhead High Schools, vocational agriculture has been discontinued. These teachers have been hired on a nine months basis as are other teachers of regular class room units. Any boy can take the agriculture that is now being offered. He is not required to carry out a supervised farming program.

If vocational agriculture had been continued at the two high schools there would have been a minimum of \$14,599.98 added to the present school budget. This figure is based on the superintendents reports for the 1958-59 school year. The same amount of money would have been allocated for the three vocational agricultural units that we could have had for the school year 1959.

The sad part of this whole thing is that Bill Norton's salary was cut and he is no longer teaching in Rockcastle but this action of the school administration has done away with vocational agriculture in the county. This means that the farm youth are to be denied the type of vocational training they should be getting and are entitled to. We could have kept this program without any cost to the local school district. Why take a good vocational agriculture program as we have had and replace it with a poor substitute.

Do you realize what you have lost in losing vocational agriculture?

There will be approximately 125 farm youth who will be denied the opportunity to continue as members of Future Farmers of America. They will be denied the privilege of carrying out supervised farming programs and cannot participate in District FFA Field Days, Achievement Contests, soil judging, livestock judging, leadership training and many other activities of FFA which are so important in training the leaders of tomorrow. There can be no state farmer in this County. There will be no adult or young farmer classes.

The Mt. Vernon Community Cannery will lose the free supervision and maintenance work that has been provided by the Vo-ag teachers. The cannery will lose the reimbursement paid directly out of vo-ag funds in Frankfort for payment of 1/2 the salary of extra help used in the cannery during the summer.

This is a slap in the face to the agriculture of the county. After all, this is an agricultural county. We need agriculture and industries but we all depend upon farming for a living in this county. The banker, doctor, church and school system, hospital, town and county governments, merchants, lawyers, businessmen, recreation and entertainment are all directly affected by the success of the industry of farming. Could we have any of these if we did not have farmers in the county?

Agricultural industry is the basis of our whole economy. The land is the source of all our wealth.

Hats off to you farmers for the excellent achievements I have witnessed you accomplish in the development of the agricultural industry of Rockcastle County.

I appreciate the opportunity of being working with you and take great pride in the contribution I have made toward the progress and improvement of agriculture in the county.

Are schools to be operated for the benefit of politicians or

for the sole purpose of educating our youth of today? Even though I am not a native of Rockcastle Co. I have lived here and worked here long enough to consider this my home. I have children that are being educated in this county. As long as I live here I intend to continue to support vo-ag and the farmers and to work always in the interest of continued progress and improvement of our county school system.

Heat Distribution: Overheated stoves in the curing operation are costly. Use enough stoves—about three per bent—to give uniform heat levels throughout the barn. Avoid intensely high temperatures.

Fuel: Coke, or prepane or natural gas all are widely used now. The latter two are very popular because of ease of handling, a higher safety factor and cleanliness.

Cost, Labor Convenience: Check all aspects for the best one for your farm, pocketbook or work efficiency.

Good Diets and Good Looks: Good diets and good looks are a go-together for many teenagers. Although teenagers seem to eat all the time, this does not mean that he or she is eating the right foods for good health.

In a recent study it was found that six of every ten girls and four of every ten boys need some improvement in their diet.

Poor diets can show up in several ways: poor complexion, lack of energy, and poor teeth are most often noted.

To improve diets most teenagers should eat more milk products for calcium and riboflavin; meats for riboflavin; liver, heart and kidneys, especially, for iron; lean pork for thiamine. Whole grain and enriched breads and cereals for

iron, thiamine and riboflavin. Dried vegetables and fruits for iron and thiamine. Dark green and deep yellow fruits and vegetables for Vitamin A. Citrus fruits, melons, strawberries and tomatoes for Vitamin C.

### Burley House: Tips Given By Specialist:

Here are a few tips to follow in housing tobacco, to get the best returns from the burley crop, from Ira Massie, UK Co-operative Extension Service tobacco specialist, put on stalks and in the sun to dry with butts of the sticks facing the sun to avoid sunburning the leaves.

Leave the plants in the field a few hours for wilting. It is not now considered a good practice to leave the cut plants in the field three or four days, as heavy rains or heavy dew will deposit soil on the leaves, lowering their quality.

Take tobacco directly to the barn after wilting; check size of the plants to determine spacing of the crop in the barn. Another factor in spacing, too, is whether artificial heat will be used for curing in wet, humid weather. Many crops are damaged seriously in the barn because of improper attention to the size of tobacco and whether or not artificial heat is used. Massie points out. Improperly spaced crops have less chance of maintaining quality, etc.

Fill each bent in the barn completely from top to bottom with a properly spaced crop; the lower tier's tobacco should hang at least six to eight feet above the ground; if move to the next bent until the preceding one is full.

Farmers should remodel or re-tilt their barns now to properly house the current year's crop, he points out.

Burley Curing Involves Three Principal Factors:

Proper curing of the burley crop is tied up with proper understanding of three factors—ventilation of the barn, distribution of artificial heat when used, and types of fuel used.

A fourth possible factor is cost and labor convenience of artificial heat.

Here are some main points:

Ventilation: From a third to one half, the side top of the barn should have hinged ventilator doors for best use of sun and air. If artificial heat is used, doors can be closed for best use of this. If tobacco is in high case (state of moistness)
