WHEREAS, The Fire Fighting Equipment of the City of Mt. Vernon is obsolete and inadequate and it has been determined following a survey of

the welfare and safety of the City that new fire fighting equipment is badly needed, and WHEREAS, public necessity for the safety of persons property from the hazards of fire requires the purchase of new fire fighting equipment, and

WHEREAS, the Kentucky Inspection Bureau, the official organization establishing fire insurance rates, have advised the City Council that unless the present inadequate fire fighting equipment is replaced, the fire insurance rate on property of the City would be substantially raised at a greater cost to the insured property owner than a tax levy as herein provided, and

## Fire Laws To Be Enforced This Fall, Guard Reports

A 57 foot state forestry tower has been constructed on one of the highest points in the county. It is located 3/4 miles west of R. E. Bullock's store off U. S. 150.

The cabin on top of the tower is seven feet tall, the tower itself is 60 feet. The hill on which the tower is situated has an elevation of 1485 feet.

C. G. Stewart, Rockcastle County Fire Guard, said one of the factors in locating the tower was to have it in a triangular position to Federal towers already at New Hope and Sand Hill. This formation makes fire detection more complete and allows more rapid reports. Readings can be taken on a sextant and the location of the fire will be pinpointed to within a few hundred feet of the actual blaze.

Approximately two weeks were required to build the tower. The fabricated tower was assembled by state personnel, Howard Baker, Williamsburg Range and his assistant Gene Bennett, George Miller, forest guard of Laurel County, his assistant, William Michael, son and C. G. Stewart.

The only paid labor was for the digging of the foundation and pouring of the footing. Structural steel for the tower cost an approximate \$2,500.

Laws of fire burning will be observed and violators prosecuted, this fall, Stewart warned. Damage to future generations what must be avoided, he concluded.

The five months which are called the critical season—from October 1 to mid-December—may be from March 1 to mid-May, require a towerman, James W. Bullen, 35, is the man in the tower. It is equipped with electricity and a two-way short wave radio. Seven landings are in the 60 foot climb to the cabin.

Stewart reported the largest fire which was fought last year was over 100 acres. Eleven men battled the blaze for three hours before it was extinguished. They stayed on duty four more extra hours to insure no breakovers and flareups.

## Surplus Food Giving Aids Farm Prices

Federal surplus food with a total wholesale value of more than 11 1/2 million dollars was distributed by the State last fiscal year, according to Thomas A. Lewis, director of the Division of Commodity Distribution.

The division, a part of the Kentucky Department of Agriculture, distributes the food from the U. S. Agriculture Department, to school lunch programs, institutions, child care centers, summer camps and to fiscal courts for use by the needy.

Lewis said 1,437 Kentucky schools in the National School Lunch Program serving 345,175 children received food valued at \$1,579,808. Other schools, numbering 1,548 and serving 357,899 children received food valued at \$1,829,071, Lewis added.

He said 86 county fiscal courts serving between 262,175 and 318,110 needy persons received \$7,542,253 worth of food. Other recipients are: nursing institutions, \$93,490; child care centers, \$2,388; summer camps, \$20,676.

The distribution program is designed to help farm prices by freeing markets of burdensome surplus foods.

## Soil Reserve Deadline Extended

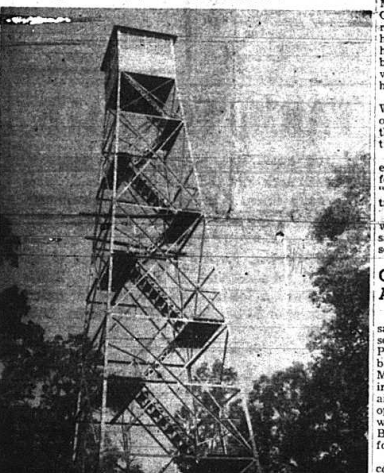

## Lake Completion Scheduled For 1955

Barley Lake, a dream of Kentuckians for several years, is about to become a reality.

The 7,985 foot-long dam on the Cumberland River that will impound the lake should be completed in 1955. This, with Kentucky Lake and Lake Cumberland, will give the state three of the 11 longest artificial lakes in the world.

A two-mile canal will connect Barley Lake and Kentucky Lake. The canal will be four miles apart.

The canal will decrease shipping distances between the Cumberland and Tennessee Rivers by 67 miles. It will enable power makers to borrow water from one reservoir when water is low in the other.

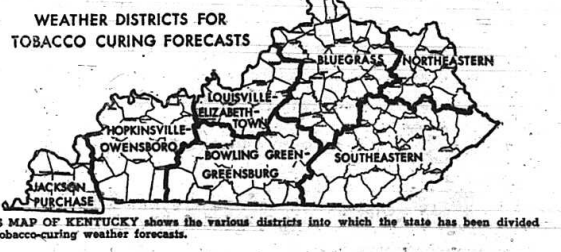
## Weather Data For Curing Burley Tobacco

The U. S. Weather Bureau's office at Louisville noted this week that its tobacco curing season reports already have started for Kentucky farmers. The special weather forecasts, issued by public information systems such as radio, TV, and newspapers, will include the normal forecast on temperature, sky condition and rainfall for that given day and the following day; plus forecasts of the relative humidity (moistness of the air) for each of the state; and a day-after-tomorrow preliminary outlook.

The special announcement also will be "Tobacco Curing Advisory" section based on past and anticipated weather conditions and what agronomists, H. Green, of the U. S. Agriculture and Experiment Station estimate should be done counties.

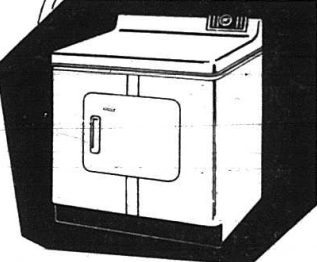

TOBACCO STALK DISEASE

John Ross and Arthur Ross, Route 3, Crab Orchard, brought two or three diseases to tobacco plants to the County Agent's Office a few days ago for diagnosis.

One of these plants was rotten and mushy and there were several bruised-like spots on the plants and several leaves had fallen from the stalks. After a diagnosis by the tobacco laboratory, University of Kentucky, the disease was found to be "Hollow Stalk."

Hollow stalk is a bacterial soft-rot of the pith of tobacco plants that are near maturity.

Infection may occur through wounds suffered before the tobacco is topped or through the wounds left from breaking out the top. The disease is most destructive through continued wet weather.

Following topping, if frequently starts in the exposed pith which turns into a slimy mass. Rot proceeds down the stalk and out into the leaves—causing them to wilt, turn yellow, and sometimes fall off.

It is known that bacterium that causes the disease is the same one that causes Blackleg of tobacco in the plant bed, Carrott Soft Rot, Potato Seed Piece Rot, Blackleg of potatoes, and decay of many other vegetables.

The disease does not develop during dry periods, so growers can reduce losses from hollow stalk by delaying their topping—until a time when weather predictions indicate a couple of days of dry weather. No adequate means of prevention is known, but the disease is rare and not considered a major importance.

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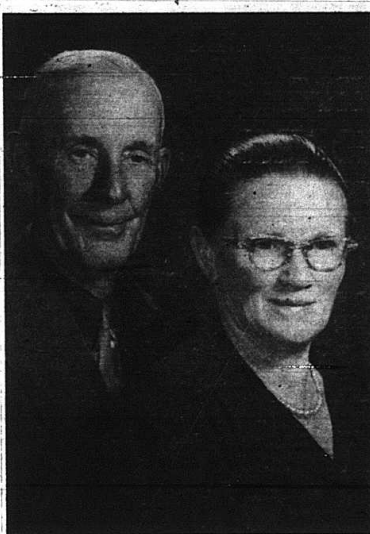
