**Community School-For-A-Day**  
 The annual Community School-For-A-Day, a three-day institute for community leaders and civic workers, will be held at the University of Kentucky, Monday, October 26. The program will be held in the Student Union Building beginning at 8:30 a. m. (CST) and will be over at 3:30 p. m.  
 This year's theme will be "Area Program Development for Better Communities." Three hour courses will be offered on the following subjects: (1) Planning and Zoning; (2) Health and Medical Service; (3) Education and Vocational Training; (4) Civic Groups; (5) The Role of the Church; (6) Local Government.

**Federal Gas Tax Refund Claim Deadline Is Sep. 30**  
 Farmers have through Sept. 30, 1959 to claim a refund for Federal excise taxes paid by them on gasoline used on their farms, the University of Kentucky Cooperative Extension Service economics department said this week.  
 The refund is three cents a gallon. It applies to gasoline bought for on-farm use from July 7, 1958 through June 30, 1959.

**Farmers who claimed a refund in 1958 will get a form (No. 2240) under the mail, new claimants should get one from the nearest Internal Revenue Service Bureau or sub-office.**  
 Records that will prove the accuracy of the refund claims should have been kept, the economists said. These records should show purchase date, gallons bought and gallons used in the 12-month period. Gasoline used by commercial operators for the claimant's own

farm work also should be recorded, as a claim can be made for that too.  
**Revenue Form No. 2240** "Claim for Refund of Federal Tax on Gasoline Used on the Farm" along with instructions for filling them out are available at the county agent's office.

**"Wonder Foods" and "Cure-Alls" Can Be Expensive, Dangerous:**  
 False ideas about food and quack "cure-all" products were discussed at a nutrition workshop held recently at the University of Kentucky and sponsored jointly by the UK Extension Service, the Kentucky Department of Health and the Kentucky Medical Association.  
 Many false ideas about foods are used by food faddists to sell so-called health products. "Wonder foods" and "diet supplements" are advertised to cure "hidden illnesses." Many food faddists say that the food we grow on our farms or buy in the stores cannot fill out nutritional needs—"diet supplements" are needed, they say, and, of course, they have them to sell. These are usually false claims circulated by manufacturers to sell their products.  
 Most of these "cure-all" products are harmless, but they will not cure you of anything—all they relieve you of is your money. Yet these so-called health products can be very dangerous to someone who is really sick. A person may use an advertised "home-cure" for his disease and wait too late to call a doctor. By relying on a fake "cure-all," he may wait until even a reliable doctor cannot help him.  
 Beware of "medical experts" who use secret formulas, guarantee quick cures, use case histories or testimonials to prove their products, or warn you against surgery, x-rays and medical science.  
 Remember that the best way the foods provided by nature. With the many foods we have available, almost anyone can be well-nourished without using

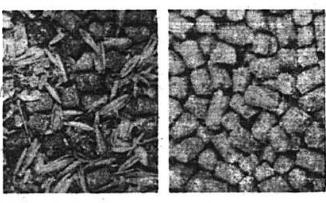

A brief synopsis, made by Mrs. Jones, of the discussion of the teachers in the guidance group follows:

Effective guidance is most likely to be accomplished through the efforts of the classroom teacher since she has the best relationship with the child. Counselors could function most effectively by assisting teachers rather than working directly with the child.

However, at times direct counseling may be necessary when the child's needs cannot be met by ordinary classroom work.

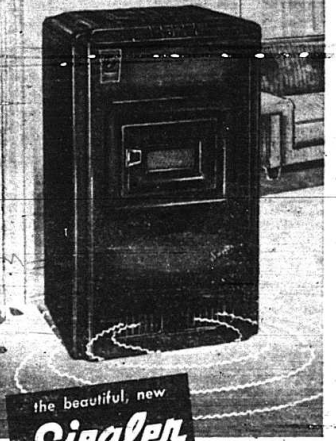

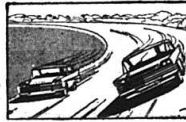

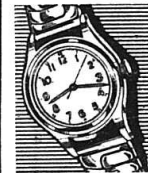

## Steel Strike Creates Corn Storage Shortage

A record 90 million bushel corn crop that is expected to be harvested this fall and the current steel strike will create a serious corn storage problem, according to Mr. William O. Gilreath, Chairman of the Kentucky State ASC Committee.

The Chairman said many farmers who had planned to buy new metal storage bins have been unable to do so because bins are not available in some areas due to the steel strike. Mr. Gilreath said in order to cope with this problem, the ASC State Committee has made corn stored in emergency temporary facilities eligible for loan this year. Facilities which are now eligible will include any type of bin or crib which will keep the corn dry and protect the corn for the life of the loan, provided a representative sample of the corn can be drawn for for inspection purposes. Mr. Gilreath said farmers should contact their local ASC County office for further details.

The 1959 Crop Corn Loan Rate is based on the county in which the corn is raised, and varies in Kentucky from \$1.16 per bushel to \$1.21 per bushel.

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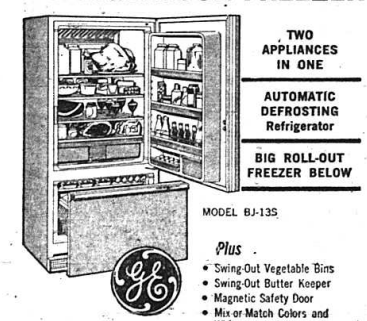
