**FROGUEY—THE MOST COMMON TOBACCO LEAF SPOT IN 1959:**  
Wildlife has been a common and serious disease of Burley tobacco in the past few years. Growers have seen the value of a wildlife resistant variety such as Burley 21, Ky. 61 or Ky. 90. In 1959 there was a big shift to Burley 21 in Kentucky. The results have been satisfactory as far as wildlife is concerned, although some damage from wildliffe and much damage from angular leaf spot has been seen in Burley 21. However, many growers have questioned whether Burley 21 is actually resistant to wildliffe because by cutting time the lower leaves were heavily damaged by a leaf spot. Sometimes the spotting extended well up the plant, and many leaves died on the lower part of the stalk. This disease is not wildliffe but froguey, a spot caused by a fungus common on many wild plants. The spots look something like wildliffe, but the yellow halo is more narrow, the dead center of the spot is parchment white, and the center of the white area usually has a greyish area where spores of the fungus are produced. Froguey is not usually destructive but the outbreak this year, similar to the outbreak of 1950, is general and severe. There is reason to believe that the wildliffe resistant varieties are no more susceptible to froguey than other varieties. A considerable part of the damage is probably caused by the close planting resorted to by many growers in an attempt to increase yields by increasing the number of plants per acre. Close planting results in a continuous damp chamber which makes ideal conditions for froguey and does not add to yield.

**FLAT TIRES AND FLAT SOILS:**  
The careful automobile owner checks his tires before starting on a long journey just as the careful farmer has his soil fertility checked before the crop year. Attempting to make a profitable journey on a flat tire is no more logical than attempting to produce good yields on flat soil fertility. At frequent intervals we should have our soils tested so that the proper nutrients may be added. Low fertility may be very expensive because of low production, and too much fertilizer may be expensive because of no added returns. Calcium Metaphosphate As A Source Of Phosphorus: Since 1937 the Kentucky Agricultural Experiment Station has compared calcium metaphosphate with 20% superphosphate and triple superphosphate as a source of phosphorus in field plot and greenhouse experiments. The results of these experiments are summarized in a paragraph in Leaflet 114-A which reads: "The Tennessee Valley Authority makes a high analysis phosphate called calcium metaphosphate, by passing phosphorus through a rock phosphate heated in a furnace. It contains 60 to 65 percent phosphorus. This fertilizer has been tested in Kentucky, and the phosphorus in it appears to be about as available as that in superphosphate."

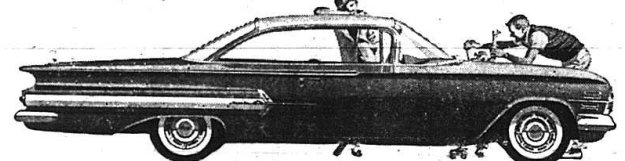

# Farm And Home News

BY H. Lee Durham and Martha Owen County Extension Agents

### Many Soil Areas Too Dry For Burley Bed Treatment

Soil moisture is too low in many areas of the state for satisfactory fall tobacco-bed preparation and treatment, the UK Cooperative Extension Service said today. Ira Massie, tobacco specialist, said the dry condition of the soil means that weed seed-ordinarily killed this time of year when certain bed treatments are made—are too dry now to be properly affected. For best results tobacco bed soils should be much more moist than they are now, he said.

Preparing and treating under such-dry conditions means that a large proportion of weed seed would survive and germinate in the spring.

Massie said that many of the weed treatments involve chemicals mixed with water. This applied water, for the treatment to be effective, must "moisten" soil moisture in the beds; if bed sites are dry and the moisture level too deep, this moistening never occurs and much of the anti-weed material is wasted.

Massie advised waiting for a good soaking rain before preparation-treatment demonstrations because of the dry soils.

### Marketing "Newswires"

Beef Cattle Prices: The outlook reports from some of our neighboring states in the Corn Belt indicate that 1960 will be the starting year for a decrease in price for slaughtering cattle. L. H. Simerl, of the University of Illinois, predicts an average price from \$1.00 to \$2.00 lower than the average for 1959. His analysis was that consumer incomes will not increase materially, therefore, increased demand due to increased income will not have much effect on the market. On the other hand, large increases in numbers of feeder-cattle this year will exert a depressing effect on prices of slaughter cattle next spring, the cause of increased numbers being offered on the market.

Corn Quotes: The abundance of feed at lower support prices will almost certainly result in

a big livestock production that will hold all most animal prices below recent favorable levels. This statement was made in reference to all feed grains. There is a bumper crop of feed grain, which will result in lower prices of feed and, therefore, increased feeding of livestock and decreased prices of all livestock.

### Hogs: The latest Outlook Digest has this to say about hog prices:

1. "This fall's seasonal decline is expected to be less and shorter than usual. Prices will continue below those of the last three years but above the 1955 low."

2. "The latest pig crop report indicates reduced production in the early part of 1960. Producers in 10 Corn Belt states reported to AMS this month that they plan 4 per cent fewer sows to farrow in December-February than a year earlier." Let's watch the October and November news reports on marketing sows. If they show an increase in sales of sows over level of 1959, the farrowings in Kentucky will likely be reduced.

Recent predictions have been that the seasonal variations may be changed for the next few years. One statement reads thus: "The \$14 hog price in July, normally a high price month, was an over-correction. Prices recovered somewhat in August. Nevertheless, the July break signals the beginning of a period when prices of hogs will be lower than during most of the year. We will not see \$20 hogs again for quite a while."

"The second thing that \$14 hog prices in July means is that the very high summer peak during a feature of trading hogs, is probably gone forever."

"Hog producers have broken away from their old habit of concentrating farrowings in a few months. Now, they are distributing them more evenly throughout the year."

The evidence given in this analysis does not refer to Hog Cycles, but it does pertain to seasonal variation. Seasonal

variations will stay with us, but they will be less extreme.

### Bulbs:

Generally speaking, October is the month when tulip, jonquil, crocus, hyacinth, and lily bulbs will be planted. All of these except the crocus should be planted where the soil can be prepared at least 10 inches deep. Good, deep soil preparation is highly important to the future growth and development of the bulb.

If the soil is a stiff clay, sand should be added. As much as 25 per cent sand will loosen the clay so the bulb will be able to grow naturally. A good-sized, flat, jonquil bulb will in a few years become a slender, pointed one when grown in stiff, heavy clay, unless the soil is loosened by the use of sand or ashes.

Animal manure, regardless of how well rotted it may be, had best not be worked into the soil where bulbs are to be planted, but should be used on top of the soil after the bulbs have been set.

Depth of planting is highly important for the best growth of bulbs. Lily bulbs should be set so the top will be six inches below ground level and 12 or more inches apart. Tulips should be planted so that the top of the bulb is 4 inches below ground level and five or more inches apart. Jonquils, 5 inches below ground level and 6 to 12 inches apart, hyacinths 5 inches below ground level and 8 to 10 inches apart, and crocus 3 inches below ground level and 3 to 5 inches apart.

A general rule has been that bulbs are supposed to be fertilized with phosphate and bone meal as the principal means of supplying the elements needed, but recent work by some of the experiment stations indicates that the bulbs, especially the tulips, need potash in addition to the phosphorus. If available, a fertilizer having an analysis of 0-20-30 would be the best to use. Two pounds to each 100 square feet of area would be a heavy dressing. This would be one heaping teaspoonful mixed with the soil for each bulb. The crocus would require about one-fourth that amount due to its

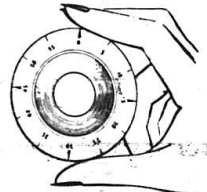
