Cummins Brothers

Back From Antarctica

William K. Cummins, chief quartermaster, USN, husband of the former Miss Mary Price of Mt. Vernon, and Earl D. Cummins, signalman third class, USN, sons of Mr. and Mrs. Joe Cummins of Route 1, Mt. Vernon, are serving aboard the escort vessel, USS Peterson, operating as a unit of this year's "Operation Deepfreeze 60" in the Antarctica area.

The Peterson has assumed the role as the Task Force ocean station ship between New Zealand and Antarctica, maintaining communications and weather reports for aircraft flights to and from bases located on the ice continent.

When not on station, she will conduct oceanographic tests, and provide transportation for New Zealand scientists and medical supplies.

During the Peterson's Deepfreeze participation, which began with her departure from Key West, Fla., Aug. 24, and arrival on station Sept. 29, she is now operating out of Dunedin, N. Z.

Soil Care Helps Each Acre Yield Top Dollar Returns

"Make each acre yield the greatest dollar return possible from the crops you grow," is the advice of Dr. Lauren H. Brown, Michigan State University agricultural economist.

"In general, the rule should be to produce as high an acreage of high valued crops as is consistent with good land use," says Dr. Brown in a statement summarized here by the Midwest division of the National Plant Food Institute.

"For example, in one Michigan area we have studied, the high value crops are corn, wheat and a good stand of alfalfa hay. In other areas, sugar beets, beans, soybeans, canning crops and others would be included."

Brown lists these production practices which can help farmers get top income from their crop yields:

- 1—Use recommended amounts and analyses of commercial fertilizers. Also, apply all available barnyard manure and return crop residues to the soil. This calls for a

planned program of soil testing and crop production recorded for each field.

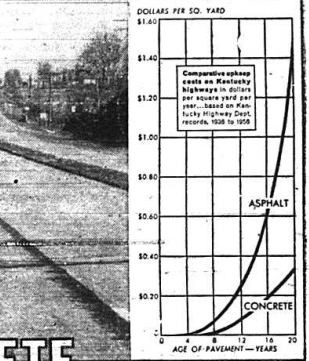
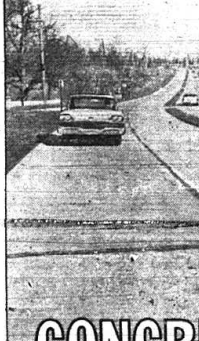
2—Check the soil's need for lime, to provide the most favorable conditions for the



3—Maintain good soil structure through recommended rotation and tillage practices.

4—Use adapted varieties of high quality seed at correct planting rates to attain the recommended stand for each crop.

The truck got off on the shoulder of the road, was unable to return to the pavement and ran off a concrete embankment which is between four and six feet high. The truck and a light rain had started just before the mishap.

The truck took down telephone lines, landed on the railroad track blocking a freight train and a passenger train.

The truck is owned by a firm in Louisville.

It has been almost three weeks since another chicken truck wrecked on U. S. 25 at Mt. Vernon and scattered chickens around.

Mt. Vernon Lion's Club Purchased Machine For Testing Eyes

A machine for testing the eyes was first used in Rockcastle County at Roundstone School last week. It was purchased by the Mt. Vernon Lion's Club and loaned to the Rockcastle County Health Department. The name of the machine is Massachusetts Vision Testing Machine.

Mrs. Anna J. Crawford, Rockcastle County Health Nurse, was the first to use the machine at the Lions Club last week. She said the main advantage of this machine is that it tests seven different phases of vision as compared to the one tested by the chart used previously. It is also faster than the former test.

Several PTA members or other members of civic organizations from the various schools have volunteered to assist the Health Nurse in testing the eyes of school children. These volunteer workers test the eyes of all children in the school with the new machine. The Health Nurse then visits the school and tests the eyes of each child who has been found deficient in any portion of the vision test. If children are rated low by the machine on the second test by the nurse they are referred to an optometrist for a final test to determine actual need for glasses.

Dr. Marion S. Roberts, optometrist of London, who has office hours here on Wednesdays and Saturdays has volunteered to assist the Health Nurse in testing the eyes of school children. He performed the first screening tests at all schools.

Mrs. Crawford said this was the second community planning program between the Lions and the Health Department which has been here.

RECIPES

CHEESE FONDUE
9 slices white bread
1 stick butter
1/2 lb. Old English Cheese
4 eggs
2 cups milk
1/2 tsp. salt
Cut crusts from bread, spread generously with butter, cut up bread in 8's. Place layers of

bread in casserole or bread tin. Cut into small pieces the 1/2 lb. of Old English Cheese and spread over the layer of bread. Beat well the 4 eggs, add two cups milk and 1/2 teaspoon of salt, mix well and pour over bread mixture. Let stand overnight.
Bake in 325 degree F oven 1 hour and 15 minutes. Serve with mushroom sauce.

1 can mushroom soup
1/2 can milk
1 package freshly cooked mushrooms, cut up
(A can of buttered mushy-ums may be substituted for fresh).
