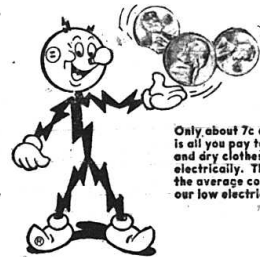

Berea's Mayor John Gay Died

Berea's first mayor, John L. Gay, who served in the office from 1910 until his retirement in 1958, died Sunday night at Central Baptist Hospital at Lexington. He had been in failing health since breaking his hip in a fall at his home at Berea in August.
Mr. Gay, a Jackson County native, attended Berea College, Transylvania College and Lebanon College in Ohio and taught in Berea and Rockcastle County. While holding a teaching position in Berea, he also served as justice of the peace and as police judge.
He was employed by the C&O Railway in Mt. Sterling for four years before he and Sam Welch founded the Berea National Bank in 1906. He served the bank as cashier, then became its president, and office he held until his death.
His holding of the Berea mayoralty post for 48 years set a national record. In 1942 he was awarded a citation from Berea College "in recognition of his contribution to the community." In 1949 the Berea Lions Club named him "Citizen of the Year."
He was a member of the Union Church, Masonic Lodge and Kiwanis Club.
He was survived by three daughters, Minerva Gay, Dorothy Gay, both of Berea, Mrs. Mary Gay, both of Ind., a brother, Frank Gay of Berea, four sisters, Mrs. S. R. Baker of Berea; Mrs. Harry Sharp of C. B. Baker of Fla., and Mrs. Stanley Kitcher of Corbin.
Funeral services were conducted at Union Church, Tuesday, with Rev. T. B. Cowan officiating. Burial was in Berea Cemetery. Funeral Home was in charge of arrangements.

Bond Issue For Purchase Of Fire Truck

On November 3 Mt. Vernon residents will have the opportunity to vote yes or no on the bond issue.
The bond proposal is in the amount of \$15,000 and would be used for the purchase of a fire truck, new equipment such as the latest type of nozzles, new fire chemical extinguishers, and installation of a new dial phone alarm system.
The City Council decided the only fair means of raising money for the purchase of a new fire truck was to float a bond issue. Floyd Owens, councilman said. This bond issue would be paid back in ten years. The money collected from this 15,000 bond issue would be used for retirement of this bond.
If this bond passes each Mt. Vernon resident's taxable city property rate would be raised about 18 cents to each one hundred dollars.
The Kentucky Inspection Bureau has informed the Mt. Vernon City Council that unless they purchase a new fire truck, fire insurance rates within the city limits can rise as much as 40 percent.
The present Mt. Vernon fire truck was purchased in 1937. During these 22 years it has answered 318 alarms. In case the bond issue passes, the old fire truck will be kept on a stand by basis.
Mt. Vernon has a volunteer fire department of 14 regular members and more in case of emergencies. These men are paid nothing for their services. They receive training every year. They have recently completed a 20 hour refresher course.

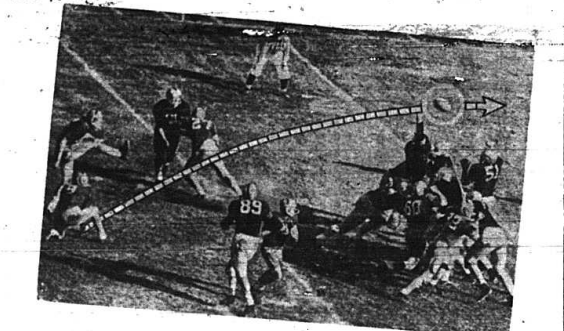

On election day Mt. Vernon property holders will have the opportunity to vote for or against the bond issue which would permit Mt. Vernon to purchase a new fire truck.

The present fire truck has been declared inadequate by the Kentucky Inspection Bureau. They strongly recommended that Mt. Vernon secure a new truck and use the old one only in case of emergencies or when extra help is needed.

It is unfortunate that equipment must be paid for. City equipment must be paid for by city residents. The Mt. Vernon City Council felt this was the only way to raise funds for a new fire truck so they are asking property owners to vote enough revenue to buy equipment which will properly protect their property. The \$15,000 which would be raised would be used only for fire fighting equipment. The bond would be retired in a ten year period and individual property taxes would be increased only 18 percent on the hundred dollars.

Kentucky Inspection Bureau says that in case the city does not purchase new fire fighting equipment fire insurance on property and most likely will, rise 40 percent.

We are fortunate enough to have a volunteer fire department of 14 members. These 14 donate their time and effort to preserve and protect everybody's property. They take refreshers courses in fire fighting each year in an effort to keep abreast of the latest trends and methods.

The least we can do is provide them with necessary equipment with which to carry out their training, maybe on your property!

Money is important but a little money invested in equipment might save you a tremendous sum should your home catch on fire.
