

**Which of these Babies is J. D.?**



This is the nursery of a large metropolitan hospital. Six times a day these precious bundles that their happy mamas. And every night their proud papas gaze at them through the glass. Nurses watch over them constantly. Doctors examine them daily.

But the statistics in the files of the police department cast a black shadow over this innocent scene. For one of these babies is J. D.

J. D. is short for a juvenile delinquent. And from police records and census figures we can estimate the proportion of new-born infants who will become juvenile delinquents in ten to twenty years. ### Phone Hearing For Special Equipment

An adjustment in rates on miscellaneous equipment for the Northeastern Telephone Corp. was taken under advisement Wednesday at a hearing of the Public Service Commission at Frankfort.

The adjustment does not affect basic telephone rates in any area served by Northeastern. It affects only special ringing equipment, elaborate key systems or other equipment usually found in factories or large business offices. James C. Johnson, manager of Northeastern said. Basic telephone rates for Rockcastle, including a dial telephone rate were established by the Commission in June, 1958. An interim rate was in effect since that time. The dial rate established at the June 1958 hearing, which will be in effect in Rockcastle territory, was set as follows: Inside base rate area of each Rockcastle exchange, 1-3 party, \$7.50; 1-party residence, \$5.50; 2-party residence, \$3.25; 4-party residence, \$4.00.

Beyond the one-mile radius of the exchange, known as the base rate area, 1-party business, \$8.75; 1-party residence, \$6.50; 2-party residence, \$3.25; 4-party residence, \$4.00. A business extension phone per month is \$1.75. A residence extension phone is \$1.25.

Outside the base rate area (one-mile radius of the subscribers particular exchange) a mileage charge is in effect on 1-party, 2-party, and 4-party service. The mileage rate is 20 cents per quarter mile for 1- to 3-party service. For residence phone, 40 cents per quarter mile for 2-party business or multiparty service. Multi-party service is charged on a per-minute basis over 5 subscribers on a line. There are NO mileage charges on all phones inside the base rate area.

(On toll service long distance) There is no charge for calls made at any town in Rockcastle after the dial system is in operation. There is the usual toll charge for calls outside the county figured on a per-minute basis.

Work is progressing in Rockcastle with the exchange equipment being installed at Mt. Vernon. About half the instruments have been installed throughout the county. A few more instruments and ordinary circumstances prevail. The company does not anticipate a delay in conversion to dial in 30 days.

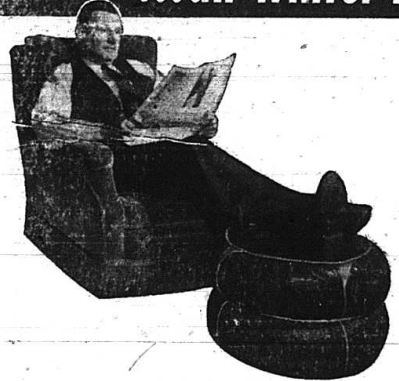

There are out side lights on all sides of the house and the post light by the driveway comes on automatically when it gets dark.

In this house you don't have to turn a faucet to get water, just push a button.

The electric heat is provided through base board heaters with each room individually controlled by a thermostat. The kitchen is heated by heating cables installed in the ceiling plaster.

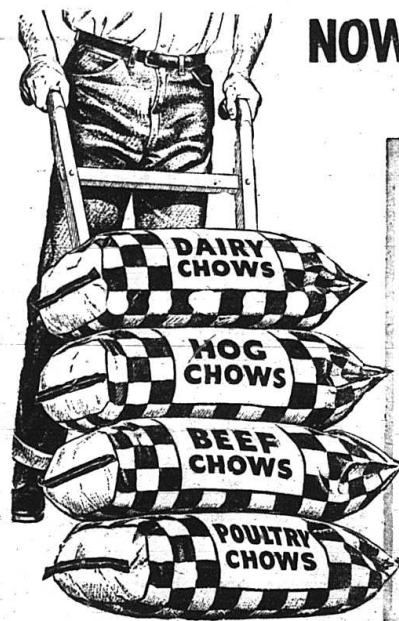
Heating for this 1661 sq. feet house is expected to cost between \$160 to \$200 per heating season.

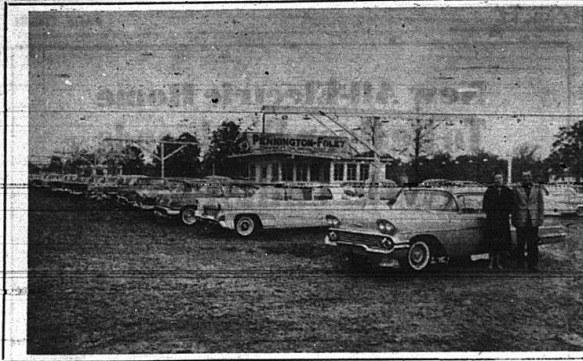
