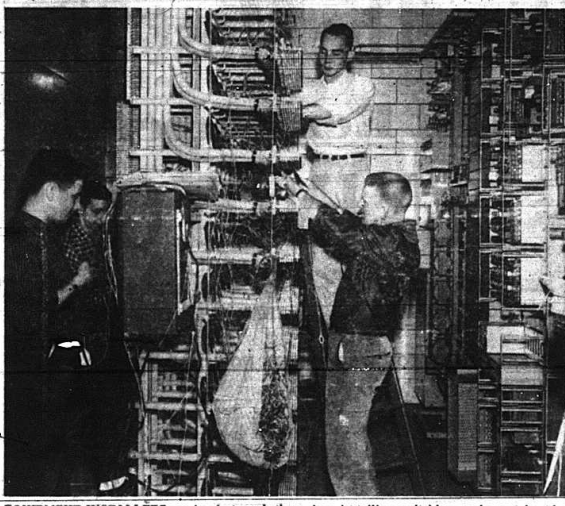

### Armour Plant Contract Set

A contract between Armour and Company and the Mt. Vernon Development Company was signed November 2. Excavation was scheduled to start Nov. 4. The building which will house the Armour and Company milk plant has a completion deadline of Feb. 1, 1960. Crawford and Crawford have been awarded the contract to build the Armour building. The building is to be built according to Armour specifications. It is owned by the Mt. Vernon Development Company (E. E. Bullock, E. E. Bullock, Jr., Hoover Bullock and Jess Bullock). Armour has leased the building and 18 acres of land around it for a ten year period with an option to renew the lease. The 40 x 60 building will be located straight across from Winstead's Camp above Elmwood Cemetery in an 18 acre field. James M. Robinson, an Armour employee, has already moved to Mt. Vernon. ### FIRST IN SERIES -

Conversion to modern dial telephone service in Rockcastle County will take place at midnight November 21, culminating a near half-million dollar program by the Northeast Telephone Corporation. At that time, some 1,000 subscribers in Rockcastle will have the most modern telephone service available. Long distance service to all major cities in the United States will only be a matter of the operator dialing direct at the London exchange when a number is given by the subscriber. In order to acquaint subscribers and other persons with the various aspects of the new system, in the next issues of the Signal there will be stories explaining various phases that are of importance to the telephone user. The remainder of this article explains how the new dial telephone system operates. Dial telephone service implies automatic service. In order to reach a number in Rockcastle, a subscriber must dial the correct number as listed in the telephone directory. In the case of Rockcastle,

there are three exchange listings. They are: Alpine (Mt. Vernon), Plymouth (Brodhead), and Gladstone (Livingston).

### Carried By Impulses

When the subscriber calls a number in one of these exchanges, the dial impulse is carried to the exchange building where the impulses register in the equipment and selects the number. These impulses, then are transferred along the line to the phone which responds to the impulses and rings. In Rockcastle, to make a long distance call, the subscriber will dial "O" (Operator). The impulse is carried to the exchange equipment, transferred to a microwave tower at Mt. Vernon, and carried by radio waves to the London exchange where it is picked up on London exchange equipment and signals the operator. The operator will then dial the number in a distant city, if the city is equipped for direct dialing. If not, the operator will place the call according to her instructions. There are no operators in Rockcastle. All information, re-

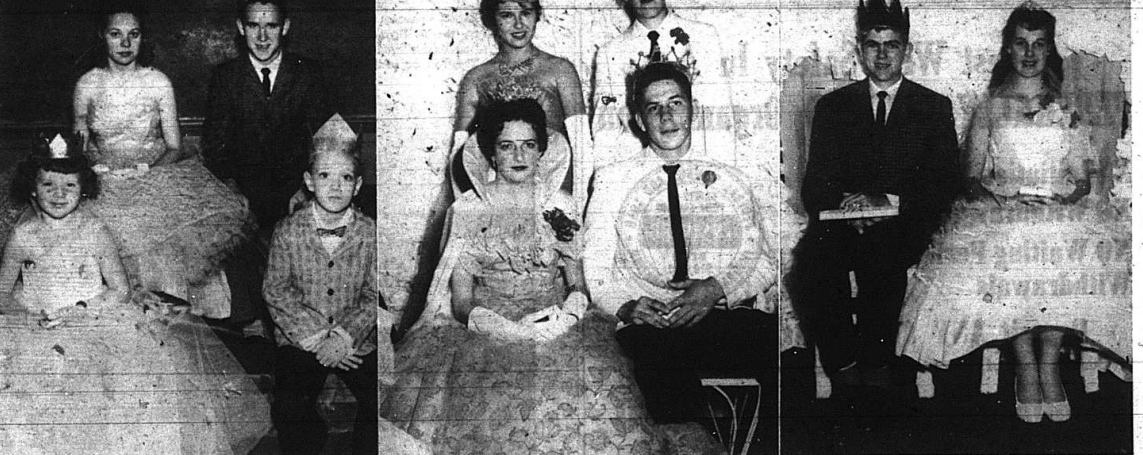
A coalhouse burned down and a storage room was charred, but the store-residence proper was saved.

## New All-Electric Home To Be Open Week-ends UNTIL CHRISTMAS

The Jackson County Rural Electric Cooperative Announced today that the demonstration All-Electric Home, recently completed on highway 193, 2 miles south of London, Kentucky, will be open each Saturday 1:00 to 9:00 P. M. and Sundays 1:00 to 5:00 P. M. each weekend until Christmas, starting October 31.

This brick home is All-Electric and equipped with electric range, refrigerator, freezer, dish washer, disposal, mixing center, range ventilator, washer, dryer, water heating, exhaust fan, hot water heater, remote control switching and electric heat.

There are out side lights on all sides of the house and the post light by the driveway comes on automatically when it gets dark.

In this house you don't have to turn a faucet to get water, just push a button.

The electric heat is provided through base board heaters with each room individually controlled by a thermostat. The kitchen is heated by heating cables installed in the ceiling plaster.

Heating for this 1661 sq. feet house is expected to cost between \$160 to \$200 per heating season.

The house is completely insulated with 2 inches of mineral wool insulation under the floor, 3 and five eighths inches side walls and 6 inches in the ceiling. Storm doors and windows are also provided.

The house features three large bedrooms, two baths, a 13'x23' living room and a combination kitchen and family room, and a two car carport and storage room.
