## Your New Phone Service -- How To Dial Your Phone After Cut-Over

SECOND IN SERIES --

How to use the new dial telephone instrument in Rockcastle is obviously the most important feature in automatic telephone service.

It follows that correct use of the instrument means a completed call and faster service. All Northeastern Telephone Corporation officials and subscribers agree.

The face of the dial telephone has both letters and numerals. When dialed together, they become numbers which rings phones all over the county.

The first thing a subscriber should do when he wants to make a call is to consult the telephone directory which will be mailed each subscriber before the November 21 cut-over.

The subscriber will find the name of the person in the alphabetical section. As an example, let's take one of the numbers in the Mt. Vernon exchange—ALpine 6-2121.

In the directory it will appear as AL 6-2121, since it is necessary to dial only the first two letters of the name. (A more complete discussion of the directory and numbers will appear in the next issue of the Signal.)

When Number Found  
When you have found the number you wish to call, remove the receiver and wait for a steady hum. The hum is the dial tone. If you try to dial before you hear the dial tone, your call will not be completed.

As soon as you hear the dial tone, dial the first two letters of the exchange followed by the figures in the order they appear in the directory. For example, select an Alpine number and make a call:

(1)—Listen for the dial tone.

(2)—Place your forefinger in the round opening indicating A.

(3)—Turn the dial to the right to the finger stop and release to allow it to return to the normal position.

(4)—Repeat with the letter L. In the same manner, dial the figures.

(5)—If you have dialed the number correctly you will hear the alternating hum as they hear the alternating buzz. If you hear a buzz, buzz, buzz, the number is busy. Hang up and try again later. If you feel you have made a mistake in dialing, try again.

Company officials suggest the subscriber sit down and practice. If a subscriber is in doubt, he should stop at the commercial office at Mt. Vernon and get instructions.

Some of the greatest mistakes in dialing is mistaking the letter "o" with the number "0". The letter "o" is opposite the number "0".

## ASC Fall Farm Practices Must Be Reported Soon

### 4 Recent Fires Caused By Careless Hunters

Four forest fires have been caused in Rockcastle County this fall by hunters according to C. G. Stewart, Rockcastle County Forest Guard. All four of these fires, twist sticks, for removing game from hiding places, were found.

Two of these fires were on federal land and two were on private land.

Estil McBee, president of Rockcastle County Fish and Game Club, says the club asks hunters to be extremely cautious with fire while in fields or woods.

Mr. McBee urges hunters to remember: one tree can make millions of matches—one match can destroy millions of trees.

Respect the property of farmers, he added.

In Rockcastle State Mobley's 2,888 votes almost doubled the 1,523 children's given lieutenant governor, Wilcox Wyatt.

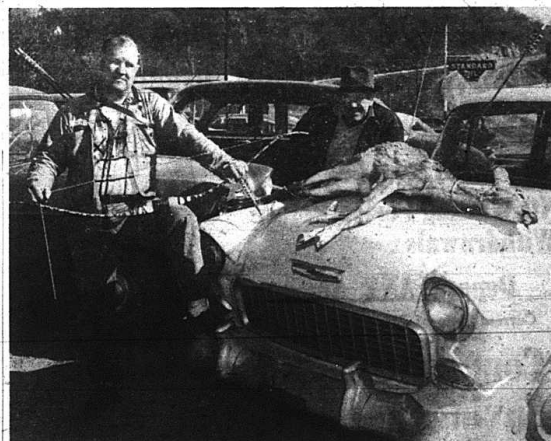
Charles C. Carter rolled in a 2,638 count over Democrat Urban Hamm's 1,658 to win the seat in the house of Representatives from District 79.

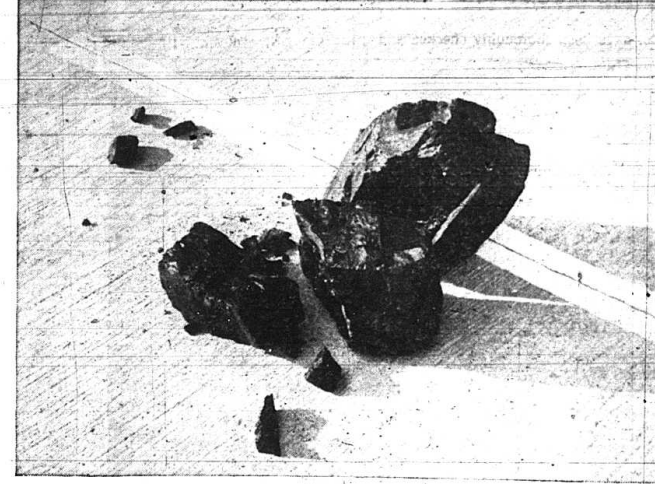



**New All-Electric Home To Be Open Week-ends UNTIL CHRISTMAS**

The Jackson County Rural Electric Cooperative Announced today that the demonstration All-Electric Home, recently completed on highway 192, 2 miles south of London, Kentucky, will be open each Saturday 1:00 to 9:00 P. M. and Sundays 1:00 to 5:00 P. M. each weekend until Christmas, starting October 31.

This brick home is All-Electric and equipped with electric range, refrigerator, freezer, dish washer, disposal, mixing center, range ventilator, washer, dryer, water heating, exhaust fan, hot water heater, remote control switching and electric heat.

There are out side lights on all sides of the house and the post light by the driveway comes on automatically when it gets dark.

In this house you don't have to turn a faucet to get water, just push a button.

The electric heat is provided through base board heaters with each room individually controlled by a thermostat. The kitchen is heated by heating cables installed in the ceiling plaster.

(Continued From Page 1) ber 6. The number "0" is at the right of the dial and is recognized by the word "Operator". (See Picture). Since the three Rockcastle exchanges are AL (Alpine), GL (Gladstone) and PL (Plymouth) the subscriber in Rockcastle will need only to dial the number "0" (Operator). If you are a party line subscriber and you wish to call someone on YOUR party line, the company shortly will mail special instructions, along with a list of persons on the line. Only party line subscribers in the Mt. Vernon exchange will have a special number. Other party line subscribers in the Brodhead and Livingston exchanges will dial others on their party line according to the directory listing. Three kinds of long distance calls are of interest to the telephone user - station-to-station calls, person-to-person calls, and collect calls.

Station-To-Station

A station-to-station call is one which you agree to talk to anyone at the called telephone. In this case you should give a number to the operator or a number for a residence if you do not know the number.

A person-to-person call is one which you desire to talk to a certain person.

Toll costs on out-of-county calls may be charged to the operator at the time the call is placed.

When making either of these calls, always specify to the operator at the time the call is placed.

Most of these directions should be learned before cut-over. Any particular problems Mt. Vernon should be directed to the commercial office at Mt. Vernon.

Company officials hope subscribers will bear in mind there could be some "bugs" in the new system immediately after cut-over, but the company will make every effort to clear them as soon as possible.

Wood Products, Major Kentucky Industry

More than one-third of all the manufacturing establishments in Kentucky make wood products.

Forest based industries in Kentucky number 1,100 and employ about 18,100 workers, which is slightly more than 11 percent of the State's industrial employment.

Gene Butcher, director, State Division of Forestry, says these figures give a good indication of what forestry means to the economy of Kentucky.

The top forestry problem in Kentucky is forest fire. Lightning started only one of the 1,346 fires reported in 1958. The remainder were man-caused and urban or rural area, has an interest in the Kentucky forest lands," he said.

Prevention of forest fires is of paramount importance to every

Kentuckian, Butcher reasoned. This is the primary reason behind the Kentucky Forest Fire Prevention Conference which will meet Dec. 1 and 2 in Lexington, he added.

Persons from all phases of life are being invited and urged to attend the conference meeting, T. O. Helm, Louisville, chairman of the conference said.

"Our intention is to make every one of our fellow citizens aware of his personal loss through forest fires.

"That loss may not directly be a dollar and cents one but indirectly it will be. For example, a forest fire which burns any woodland area in Kentucky will more than destroy trees. It also kills fish and wildlife, reduces soil fertility, destroys the watershed and mars the scenic water holding ability of the beauty of the land for approximately five years," he said.

Check Your Home For Fire Hazards

Each year, more than 11,000 people in the U. S. die and more than twice that number are severely burned in fires, National Fire Protection Association records show.

Give your home a complete fire check-up, remove fire hazards, and put in safety equipment before it's too late, recommends Frances Stallard, USA Extension specialist in

home management. Heating equipment in bad repair is a major fire hazard, check your furnace, chimneys and flues, Miss Stallard suggests. Home fires increase during heating season, so make sure all kinds of heating apparatus are cleaned, inspected and adjusted this fall.

Defective and overloaded electric wiring systems are dangerous. A blown fuse is a sign of trouble—find out what's wrong. Repairs and installations should be made only by a qualified electrician.

Be careful with matches and cigarettes, she warns. Clean up trash, piles of litter or old rags. These are good places for fire to start.

Lightning rods are worthwhile protection, according to USA. Recommendations: Replace those that are worn or damaged. Make sure ground connections are secure. Lightning arresters on the line side of the meter (outside) protect the home and electrical ap-

pliances from surges of electricity during thunderstorms. Have easy-to-reach fire extinguishers and be sure all members of the family know how to use them. A dry chemical powder extinguisher for fighting electrical or flammable oil fires and a 5-gallon pump water extinguisher for trash fires are recommended.

Check your water system to see if enough water is available for firefighting. Cisterns, kept exclusively for use in case of fire, are good safety investments, she says. A sturdy ladder and 50 feet of hose are also necessary for fire protection.

Keep your home free of fire hazards by regular inspections. A family fire drill now also is a precaution that can save lives in an emergency, Miss Stallard points out.
