According to Law the cards were taken out because you have not voted in the past TWO years; you have moved to another precinct and did not have the County Court Clerk change your card to your present precinct; you have gotten married and did not have the Clerk change your card to your new name. Many times the Election Officer does not CHECK your card to show you voted.

You may come in and re-register in the County Clerk's Office any time up until 59 days before the May Primary.



Do Not Stuff Turkeys For The Home Freezer:

Don't stuff your Thanksgiving turkey until time to roast it! Why not? Many homemakers have been asking this question. Since frozen stuffed turkey can be bought at grocery stores, most homemakers wonder why not freeze their own. Here's the reason.

These turkeys on sale at stores have been frozen and stuffed mechanically. The work is done in cold temperatures and the turkey and dressing are handled very little. When turkeys are stuffed at home, the work is usually done in a warm kitchen. No matter how careful the homemaker is, she must handle the turkey and dressing; bacteria can be brought in. In the home freezer, stuffed turkeys freeze slowly. Even in the coldest part of the freezer, the dressing will not be completely frozen for at least 24

hours. Bacteria multiply rapidly unless stopped by freezing. Enough bacteria could develop before the dressing is completely frozen to make it dangerous to eat.

Commercially stuffed turkeys are frozen solid in a very short time. They are frozen in a circulating blast of very cold air (about -20 degrees F.), which gives much faster chilling and freezing than home freezers. For example, in winter you get cold much faster when the wind is blowing than when it is still. The seeds germinate in the autumn and grow into plants that live through the winter. Neburon is the active ingredient in one of the materials sold as "Chickweed Killer". It is a wettable powder and should be applied, as a spray, according

to directions on the label. Newly seeded lawns should not be treated with any herbicide until the grass has become well established. There will be later recommendations on chickweed control for those of us who have neglected to do something about this weed now.

be frozen safely, of course, but do not stuff your turkeys ahead of time and freeze them. Stuffed turkey will not freeze fast enough in the home freezer to be safe.

Let's Keep Ahead of Chickweed

Now is the time to do something about chickweed. Most people do not become concerned about this serious pest until spring.

When does chickweed grow? Chickweed is a winter annual. The seeds germinate in the autumn and grow into plants that live through the winter. Neburon is the active ingredient in one of the materials sold as "Chickweed Killer". It is a wettable powder and should be applied, as a spray, according

to directions on the label. Newly seeded lawns should not be treated with any herbicide until the grass has become well established. There will be later recommendations on chickweed control for those of us who have neglected to do something about this weed now.

Grinding Low-Quality Roughage Not Recommended For Dairymen: Grinding low-quality hay or other poor roughages is not recommended, says the UKC operative Extension Service dairy department, for two reasons: 1. Low quality hay or roughages contain very little net energy per pound; grinding

doesn't increase (actually it decreases) the energy value to the cow, and 2. it is unpalatable; cows don't like low-quality hay or roughages in the ground. Feeding well enough to eat sufficient amounts of it to meet energy requirements for high milk production.


It costs \$5 to \$10 per ton to grind such low quality roughages, the department says, and no increase in energy or nutrient value is obtained. And feeding nearly all the roughage in the ground form may cause fat tests of the milk to drop to half the normal levels.

The persistence of Mrs. Sarah Hale caused President Abraham Lincoln in 1863 to appoint Thursday, Aug. 6, "a day of national thanksgiving, praise and prayer". From 1863 until 1939, the last Thursday in November was proclaimed national Thanksgiving. In 1939-41 President Roosevelt moved the date forward one week to leave more time between Thanksgiving and Christmas. In December 1941 a joint resolution adopted by the United States Senate and House of Representatives and signed by President Roosevelt, the fourth Thursday of November was officially designated as the date for Thanksgiving Day.

During all these years one thing has remained constant—people have been bidding more and more turkeys—adieu!

phone may be back in order shortly.

The company also asked party line subscribers to keep the length of calls at a minimum during the next two weeks in case checks need to be made on phones in their area.

It is also stressed that small children should not be allowed to play with phones, especially on party lines, since one call

can tie up an entire line and several subscribers. Many times subscribers lose important calls because of an over used phone.

Workers will begin within a few days to remove the old existing phones from residences and businesses. The old outside lines and poles will have to wait a considerable time since the company is involved in a conversion to dial program in Pulaski and Estill counties.

According to Oscar Bruner, manager of the Southern Division of Northeastern: "In order to have an efficient working telephone system, as in any other type of public service, persons using the system will have to cooperate, and I am sure they will."

"We will endeavor to give our subscribers the best service possible. Top-notch service is our constant goal," he said.

The Jackson County Rural Electric Cooperative Announced today that the demonstration All-Electric Home, recently completed on highway 192, 2 miles south of London, Kentucky, will be open each Saturday 1:00 to 9:00 P. M. and Sundays 1:00 to 5:00 P. M. each weekend until Christmas, starting October 31.

This brick home is All-Electric and equipped with electric range, refrigerator, freezer, dish washer, disposal, mixing center, range ventilator, washer, dryer, water heating, exhaust fan, hot water heater, remote control switching and electric heat.

There are out side lights on all sides of the house and the post light by the driveway comes on automatically when it gets dark.

In this house you don't have to turn a faucet to get water, just push a button.

The electric heat is provided through base board heaters with each room individually controlled by a thermostat. The kitchen is heated by heating cables installed in the ceiling plaster.

Heating for this 1661 sq. feet house is expected to cost between \$160 to \$200 per heating season.

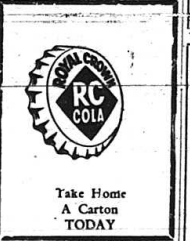

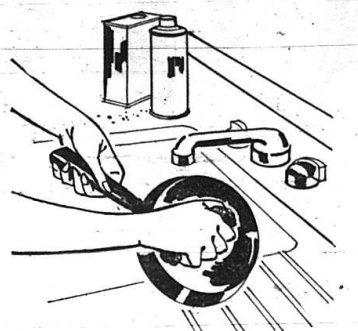

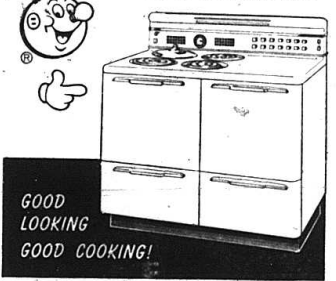
