New All-Electric Home To Be Open Week-ends UNTIL CHRISTMAS

The Jackson County Rural Electric Cooperative Announced today that the demonstration All-Electric Home, recently completed on highway 192, 2 miles south of London, Kentucky, will be open each Saturday 1:00 to 9:00 P. M. and Sundays 1:00 to 5:00 P. M. each weekend until Christmas, starting October 31.

This brick home is All-Electric and equipped with electric range, refrigerator, freezer, dish washer, disposal, mixing center, range ventilator, washer, dryer, water heating, exhaust fan, hot water heater, remote control switching and electric heat.

There are out side lights on all sides of the house and the post light by the driveway comes on automatically when it gets dark.

In this house you don't have to turn a faucet to get water, just push a button.

The electric heat is provided through base board heaters with each room individually controlled by a thermostat. The kitchen is heated by heating cables installed in the ceiling plaster.

Heating for this 1661 sq. feet house is expected to cost between \$160 to \$200 per heating season.

The house is completely insulated with 2 inches of mineral wool insulation under the floor, 3 and five eighths inches side walls and 6 inches in the ceiling. Storm doors and windows are also provided.

The house features three large bedrooms, two baths, a 13'x23' living room and a combination kitchen and family room, and a two car carport and storage room.

Hunting Safety Rules Apply To All Hunters: General rules for gun safety, both in and out of hunting season, are always applicable. But they are more pertinent now that hunting seasons are either open or upcoming. Here are the tried-and-tested rules for hunters on firearms, from the UK Cooperative Extension Service safety department. Treat every gun as if it were loaded; that is, always check it immediately after picking it up, never point it at anyone; and never handle it carelessly indoors or outdoors. Carry the piece with the muzzle upward; keep the safety on until you are ready to shoot; unload guns outside buildings when you are finished shooting and check them carefully before carrying them inside. It is always a good safety practice to have another person check the gun after you've checked it. Be sure the barrel is clear of obstruction (snow, mud, trash); be sure your ammunition fits your gun; be sure of the target before you pull the trigger—even though that deer you spotted moves away before you can shoot; it is better to have missed a live deer in such a check than to have shot down a hunter without that last minute target identification. Avoid all horseplay with guns; don't climb or jump fences while carrying guns; don't pull a gun to you (as through a fence) unless you've been told to; never shoot at flat, hard surfaces or water as ricochets from

such surfaces carry a long way and can kill at long distances; and if target practicing, make sure your backstop is high and safe.



People Don't Realize Measles Are Dangerous

MEASLES

Measles is such a common childhood disease that most people do not realize it can be dangerous, says the Kentucky Department of Health.

Yet in Kentucky in 1958, 21 deaths were attributed to measles from 20,043 cases reported, adds the agency.

No deaths were reported from 3,392 reported cases of German measles, but this disease can cause the birth of a defective child if contracted by a mother during early months of pregnancy, according to the department.

These defects, said the agency, include deafness, mental deficiency, cataracts, malformed heart and dental abnormalities.

Rockcastle County Baptist Hospital Written Up In Trade Magazine

Ed. Note: (The following article appeared in the October issue of the Southern Hospital magazine. It was written by Rockcastle County Baptist Hospital Administrator, George Frewitt, and is re-printed here in part.)

The Rockcastle County Baptist Hospital was erected in 1935 from County and Hill-Burton funds and leased from the fiscal court by the Baptist Association of Rockcastle County.

The hospital, since its inception, has been plagued by the problem of being an "unwanted child" in this rural farming county in southeast Kentucky. The people of the region have always gone to hospitals in other areas.

The second disease you might say—the hospital suffering from the lack of a sufficient number of physicians on its staff. Out of some 18 physicians who joined the medical staff, only two live within the county and send patients to the hospital and attend patients in the hospital. Both of these physicians are general practitioners and do no surgery whatsoever.

Because of this many of the prospective surgery cases have sought hospitals outside the county where they might have their operations performed.

Lack of Outside Funds
The third hurdle the hospital has had to cross is the lack of outside funds coming into the front office to cover operating expenses and costs of extra needed equipment.

operation is discussed. Without the whole-hearted "togetherness" shown by every person connected with the hospital all the new plans and ideas would have gone for naught. Employees from the RN to the maintenance man have contributed much to public relations by making patients feel at home. Personnel have adopted the policy, "If you can't say something cheerful to the patient, then be silent." This ideal, in itself, has eliminated the home of the formal atmosphere of the hospital and has caused even the most disgruntled patient to feel at ease.

All of these efforts have slowly but surely begun to pay off and the average census per day is steadily increasing, pulling the hospital out of the danger zone, even in normally slow summer months.

The hospital governing board recently has put together a skeleton plan, to begin in the near future, to inform people that the hospital cannot make its own way without some outside financial aid to replace the money used to care for charity patients. This plan, when carried through, will be another example of cooperation.

The fourth problem of making Rockcastle County an inviting place for industry is mainly a problem for the Chamber of Commerce.

There are a number of unique things about our hospital. Due to the shortage of trained professional nurses, we have struck out a program of training our non-professional personnel to the point where they can be responsible for a number of things that overworked registered nurses normally would have to do.

we were forced early this year to decrease our staff considerably. It is not unusual to find the administrator (who doubles as x-ray and laboratory technician) sweeping the floor or answering a patient's bell or find the nurse in charge pitching in to help clear up the mental task.

The basic policies of the hospital are made available to the public by a booklet presented to each person admitted to this hospital.

Because the hospital is located on U. S. Highway 25, the months from April through October are filled with auto accident victims who are brought there.

The Women's Hospital Auxiliary has spent hours sewing drapes for almost every room in the building. They have patched linen, made patients' gowns and purchased countless articles for the hospital.

Next an appreciative word for the Red Cross Gray Ladies. This organization is active in this area. It might be said that these are problems common to a number of smaller hospitals in similar locations, but the impression I would like to leave it that cooperation and constructive action described is not common to all such situations.

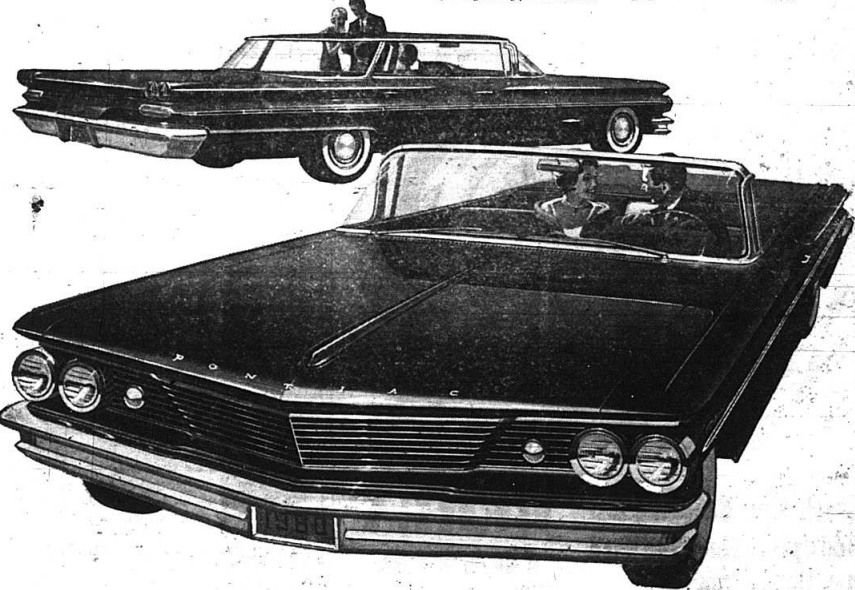

Farmers Tax Guide.

Winter Plant Care:
With the coming of the holiday season, we often get so busy with the season's festivities that plants both inside and outside the house are often neglected. House plants need to be water-

ed, turned so that all sides will have some light, and with heavy leaves need to be dusted with a soft cloth.
Perhaps watering is the most important part of the plant care because modern heating systems remove much of the moisture from the plants, and they must have a constant supply if they are to live, let alone do well. The container should be placed in water and left until the oil in the pot has become moist to the top. The container should then be lifted and excess water allowed to drain off. Do this once every 15 days and in the intervening time pour water around the plants. This should provide enough water for the plants. Ferns are perhaps most often neglected because the foliage does not wilt but simply dries up when it is not watered.
Light is also important to the plants, and they should be watched carefully to be sure

they get enough light, but not too much. Plants by a window will often begin to show signs of wilting, when the light may be too strong. On the other hand, some plants will be doing all right for a while and then one side will begin to fade. This means the plant should be turned so the different sides of the plant will get light.
Fall Care Of Roses:
Roses need attention in the fall. Climbers that have produced long canes or stems should be tied to the trellis or fence where they are growing. Tying prevents these young stems from being damaged by thrashing around in the wind during the winter. If some of these young stems have grown across a walk, or are otherwise in-the-way, they may be cut off at this time. Do not do any major pruning on the climbing roses at this time.
If the hybrid teas, monthly, and floribunda roses have tops 4 to 6 feet tall, they may be cut back until the tops are 30 inches high. These long tops away in the wind during winter and often break off.
Do not try to do an expert job of pruning now. It will need to be done again in the spring because of winter-kill to the tops of the stems.

The hybrid teas and floribunda types need some protection around the base of the stems to keep them from freezing during the winter. This mulch may be soil, straw, old hay, or crushed tobacco stalks. This mulch should provide protection to about 12 inches of the base of the stems. Keep the mulch loosened around the base of the stems. It should be applied just before hard freezing weather begins, usually around Thanksgiving.

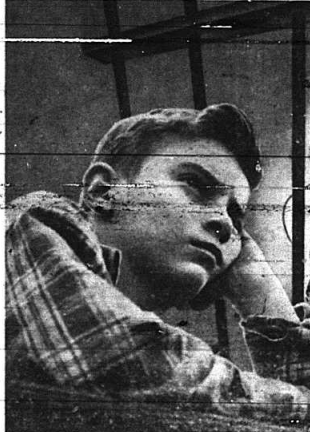
