## Brock Charged With Negligent Homicide

Clarence E. Brock, 35, of Wildie, was held to the Madison County February Grand Jury in a charge of negligent homicide with a motor vehicle.

The charge stemmed from a Dec. 10 accident which took the life of a Richmond resident, Darwin Lee Garrett, 21. Brock's tractor-truck struck Garrett's car on U. S. 25 about four miles south of Richmond. Garrett died at the scene.

Madison County Coroner Jack Turpin said Garrett died of a skull fracture. The accident victim also suffered fractures of both legs and a chest injury. State Police Trooper Bobby Ham was assisted in his investigation by Trooper Homer Baker. Brock appeared before Trial Commissioner Tom Fox Jr., Dec. 11 and posted a \$1,000 bond.

Brock suffered a head wound and was treated at Fattie A. Clay Infirmary at Richmond.

According to Trooper Ham, Darwin was traveling south when the mishap occurred. The truck was heading north and went into a skid when it came up behind a truck which was making a turn. Ham said the truck skidded 102 feet and went into the south-bound traffic lane. Garrett attempted to avoid the collision but his car went into a sideways skid, the trooper said. It was hit broadside by the truck. The car went over a small embankment but did not overturn.

# Farm And Home News

### Christmas Safety

The Christmas Tree. According to the U. S. Department of Agriculture, it is best to buy your Christmas tree early. The best way to have a fresh, moist, and fire-resistant tree is to buy it early, then give it water to keep it fresh.

Buy when trees are first offered on the sale lots. Then you can select the size, shape and kind of tree you want and bring it home before it dries out from exposure to sun and air. Run your hand over the boughs to see if the needles feel moist, then shake the tree. If the needles fall the tree is dry and its shedding needles will be a nuisance. So look further before buying.

Christmas is a happy time. Let's keep it that way by taking some special safety precautions. The Christmas tree is an important part of our Christmas celebrations, however, it could spell destruction should a fire result through negligence. Following are some pointers that will make a safer Christmas.

As soon as the tree is brought home throw cold water all over it, then cut off the butt end about an inch slant-wise to open the pores for drawing up water. Set the tree in water and keep it cool and shaded until it is brought indoors for trimming.

It is important that the Christmas tree holder be made so that the tree can be in a container of water. A pound coffee can—sometimes fits under the standard of the tree and will

hold enough water if it is replenished every day. A tree may use as much as a cup of water a day as every needle gives off moisture. The more moisture the more fragrant and the less a fire hazard the tree is.

Put the tree where it will not be near a radiator, fireplace, television set, powerful electric lights and other sources of heat and where someone can't brush against it and knock it over.

Dispose of trees when the needles start to fall.

**Christmas Lights**  
Use only Underwriters' Laboratories approved wiring and lighting. Check them carefully each season before stringing on the tree for frayed cords, broken sockets, loose connections, etc. Do not overload your circuits. Never use candles.

Turn off lights before you leave the house and when no one is going to be within sight of the tree for a length of time. If you decorate out-of-doors use lights that are designed for outdoor use (UL approved). Hang sockets downward so that

they will not catch water or collect snow.

**Trimming The Trees**  
Do not use flammable decorations around the base of the tree or on it. If you use metal foil icicles or tinsel see that no piece of foil is touching a light, socket, or cord.

When you trim or dismantle the tree use a step stool or ladder to reach the upper branches. If children are to help trim it reserve the lower branches for them. Do not smoke while trimming the tree or taking it down.

**Gifts and Guests**  
While you are unwrapping gifts have a waste basket or carton handy for the discarded wrappings and dispose of them as soon as unwrapping is over. When entertaining at home, be sure to provide plenty of ash trays for your guests.

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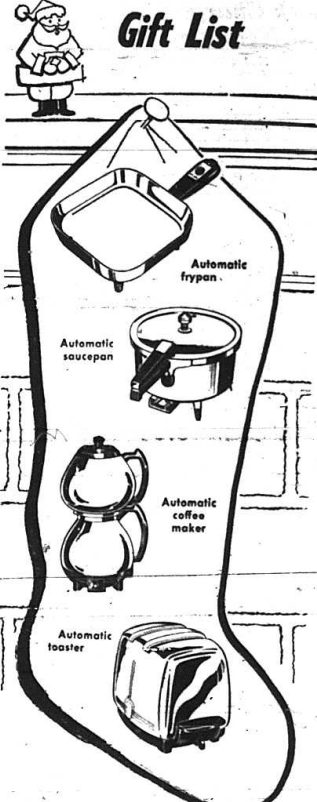

**Fire Protected Forests Would Aid Economy**

If Kentuckians learn to protect their woodlands from fire, forestry could make big contributions to the Commonwealth's economy.

This message was given to some 200 delegates at Kentucky's first Forest Fire Prevention Conference at Lexington recently.

Kenneth B. Pomeroy, chief forester of the American Forestry Association, said Kentucky can reap from forests returns equal to those reaped in Georgia where timberlands "add 1 million dollars annually" to the economy.

Dr. Richard E. McArdie, chief of the U. S. Forest Service, said principal needs are to keep people from starting fires and to control fires when they are small. He said 99 per cent of forest fires in Kentucky are man-made.

He praised Kentucky's efforts in fire-protection work, legislation providing for full protection of all timberlands and increased appropriations for state forestry organization.

Gene L. Butcher, director of the Kentucky Division of Forestry, explained the operation of his agency and its role in preventing fires.

McArdie said Kentucky's "70

million dollar a year wood-using industry" could become a quarter of a billion dollar industry "if management of the forests were improved."

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#### WHO'LL TELL THE FAMILY

Editor's Note: The following editorial was a national award for Editor Jerry Ring of the Menifee County Journal. It is reprinted by special permission in the hope that its message may save someone the heartache of "telling the family."

Who'll tell the family?  
How would you go about telling a mother and father their son had just been killed in a wreck? At this point it matters little who caused it.

The above presents a problem faced daily across our country. It is a commonplace one and not difficult to handle. It gets to be almost boring to ignore the silence at the other end of the phone—a silence not nearly as dead as the one you have just experienced at the scene of the accident. This is the simple part.  
The tough part is to get across to the parents of children living today that the odds are pretty good someone in their family will be injured and maybe killed by an automobile. Have you been passing the word along? The driver, not the car, is responsible for the killing. Maybe a quick little trip to the morgue will serve as a teaching aid.

How about your own driving habits? Slipped through a stop sign lately? How about that yellow light—it means caution, remember? Getting pretty good at squeezing in that extra five miles over the posted limit? Just a thought, but every time you break a law you are not only proving yourself to be immature, irresponsible and impolite, but you have first priority as a potential killer. The odds are pretty good you'll be the one to be responsible for a death or deaths?

You're reading this with about as much attention as you pay to the distance between you and the car ahead. In both cases you won't get the full meaning until you literally feel the impact of the accident. Let's hope the first one is minor—that will increase your chances of its being the last one. Maybe it will give you some idea of what it is like to be responsible for a loaded two-ton weapon traveling down the highway at fifty miles an hour.

You are being watched. Have you noticed? Not the police, your children. They have been watching you all their lives. They will imitate, more than you or they realize, what you do. When you crawl about spotting the cop up the road in time to slow down and avoid a ticket you are being watched. Congratulations! You may have just signed the death warrant of your children—if they live through your driving!

Some among you have never had an accident and don't feel you fit any of the above patterns, there are many others but we'll give you the benefit of the doubt and say you're near perfect. That's not good enough. Perfect people get killed too. There is more than one tombstone with the inscription of the innocent. "Here lies the guy who had the right of way."

We tell ourselves that it is the "other guy." Who do we think we are kidding? You and I are the other guy. You are the other guy for me and I am the other guy for you.

Safety starts at home. When road safety has been taught at home then we have a right to work on the "other guy." When there are no more other guys running around loose we can rest. For a split second! One doesn't get any rest in this sort of thing. We write letters. Talk to anyone who will listen. We have our children memorize, and realize, the fact that 40,000 people are killed and more than a million injured by automobiles in this country each and every year.

What are you going to do about it? As things are going the odds will catch up with you sooner or later. I'm not worried. It's always the other guy, 40,000 other guys.

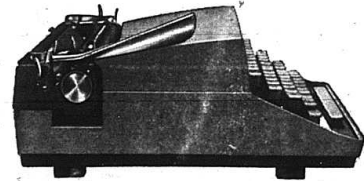

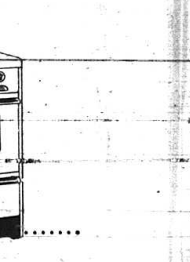

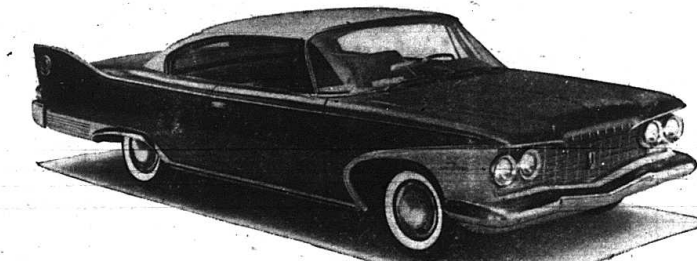
