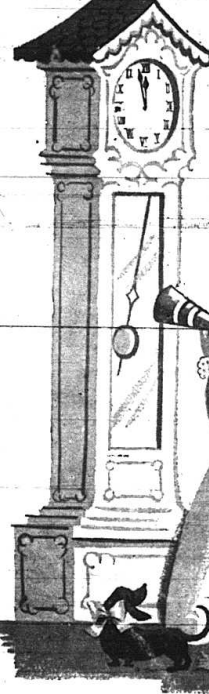

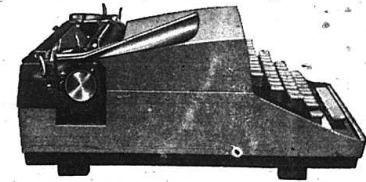

# Farm And Home News

## Leadership Training

**Farm-Home Week Topic:**  
Kentucky's 48th Farm and Home Week, scheduled January 26-29 at the University of Kentucky, will spend one day on leadership training.

E. J. Neius, associate director of the Kentucky Agricultural Extension Service, sponsor of the annual session at which farmers and their families pick up the latest research information and data on other areas of farm life, said that Tuesday, the opening day, would be devoted to such training.

Object is to show county Extension councils, Farm Bureau officers, Homemakers Federation officers and similar groups and organizations, how leadership at local levels can be developed and trained.

The remainder of the program:

**WEDNESDAY, January 27:** Farmstead planning, management, human nutrition, beef production, poultry raising, home management, fruit and vegetable work, food preservation and purchasing, dairying and teenager's nutrition.

**THURSDAY, January 28:** Farm policies, farm chemicals (weed and pest control work), swine raising, modern fabrics and their care, livestock improvement, seed improvement, beekeeping.

**FRIDAY, January 29:** Tobacco production and special events such as the Kentucky Homemakers Federation, the state 4-H Council, etc.

Special events at the Farm-Home Week include: Farm-Home Week luncheon, Master Farm Families luncheon, Home Demonstration Association Meeting, Master Farm Homemakers, and a special recognition session, all on Monday. Agricultural Alumni Feeder Calf Association, a housing exhibit, Stockman's banquet, and Farm Managers and Rural Appraisers dinner, all on Tuesday. The Kentucky Swine Raisers Council, the all-breed Dairy breeders, the Kentucky Livestock Improvement Associations Meeting, the Kentucky Seed Improvement Association, the state 4-H Council, and the Kentucky State Beekeepers Association

meeting all on Thursday, and the Homemakers Federation meeting and luncheon and the state 4-H Council on Friday.

In addition, Dean Frank J. Welch, of the College of Agriculture, will hold a special breakfast on Wednesday, and Thursday for the day's speakers. A Community-Night recreation program will be held on Thursday at Memorial Coliseum.

**Pruning Shade Trees**

Each year we receive inquiries about pruning shade trees, and particularly about the best time to do it. Actually, shade trees seldom, if ever, need drastic pruning. The occasion may arise, however, when some of them will need to have a few branches removed to improve the form, prevent branches becoming crossed, or keep them from interfering with other plants, or the roofs of nearby buildings. The kind of pruning is corrective and is practiced only under these conditions. The idea that shade trees, especially younger ones, need to be pruned every year is not sound. To know this is true, just look at some of the most beautiful trees found growing in pasture fields from which a single branch has never been removed.

The best time for corrective pruning is when the tree is absolutely dormant. January is one of the best months because even maples will not bleed or

lose sap from pruning done then. Also, the leaves are off the trees at this time, and you can readily see how much cutting needs to be done.

The idea that trees must be topped to keep them from growing too tall is false. Trees that are inclined to shoot up two or three very tall branches will not get too tall, because after these branches have made this growth they slow up and wait until the trees fill in below. This is especially true of the sycamore or water maple. If you look at maples that are growing native, you see old trees that have the regular spreading growth that is to be expected of this variety. Yet they have never been pruned.

Young trees should not have the lower branches removed until the tree is from 4 to 6 inches in diameter since these branches cannot be replaced once they have been removed. Allow the tree to attain some size before cutting off the branches to the desired height. For example, if the lawn has sufficient space leave the lower branches on a sugar maple so that they are almost on the ground. This makes for a more beautiful specimen. Of course, where space is limited this cannot be done. Grass and weeds do not grow under these branches when they are left on, and the ground becomes bare; nevertheless, it makes a beautiful, picturesque tree.

**Only Careful Shoppers Find Sale "Bargains"**

After-Christmas sales are beginning and women are rushing to stores to look for "bargains." Wise shoppers may find good dress buys at these sales, but don't buy just on the strength of a reduced price.

Both good and poor garments will be on sale; you must be a careful shopper to choose between them. The most common mistake made when "bargain-hunting" are buying the wrong color, style, size or fabric. Be sure the dress you buy is well-cut, a good style, a good fit, and not damaged.

The color and style of a dress must be beginning to you; otherwise, you're throwing money away on a garment you'll never wear. The color also should fit into your wardrobe.

Make sure the dress is still in style; don't buy a style that's "on the way out." If you intend to wear the garment for several seasons, look for good classic lines free of detail that may limit its use or date it as to the year of purchase. A well-designed dress is neither too fussy, too extreme nor too elaborate. Many cheap dresses are loaded with frills to cover up poor construction, and poor material.

If you expect much wear from your dress, the fabric should be sturdy and good quality and should wash or dry clean according to your expectations. Examine the workmanship, too. No

dress will keep its attractive appearance or hold its shape unless it is correctly cut and well made. Buying a poorly made dress, even at sale price, is a waste of money.

Buy a dress that fits. Don't buy a garment one or two sizes too large because of reduced price with the idea of cutting it down to size. This is seldom successful and could be more costly in the long run than buying at regular price.

No dress is a bargain any price unless you have a need for it. When and where will you be wearing the dress? Are the style and fabric right for this need? The garment should also go with the other dresses in your wardrobe.

When shopping at after-Christmas sales, remember - check for quality, style and fit, and buy only what you need. Don't buy a dress just because of a mark-down on the price tag.
