TREE SEEDLINGS: Now is the nearly \$4,000 in seven years time to place your order for tree seedlings. The Kentucky Division of Forestry is again offering tree seedlings at a low cost to encourage reforestation of approximately 1,500,000 acres of eroded, idle and submarginal land in Kentucky. These seedlings can also be used for planting of farm windbreaks and the improvement of existing woodlands.

The quota for Rockcastle County is as follows: Shortleaf Pine—65,000; Loblolly Pine—30,000; White Pine—5,000. Order blanks and prices of the tree seedlings can be had by contacting the county agent's office or the soil conservation office. Anyone interested in these tree seedlings should place an order immediately.

U. S. SAVINGS BONDS: You don't have to be an expert statistician to read and understand a rather interesting table of figures that came in the mail recently. Somebody had figured out how fast savings grow when you can put aside a certain amount regularly. This particular table is based on the purchase of Savings Bonds, and includes the interest that builds up on E bonds over the years. It reflects, of course, the new 3 1/2 per cent rate of interest that became effective last June 1.

For example, if you put just \$18.75 each month into Savings Bonds, you'd have a little over \$1,200 in five years—or nearly \$2,000 in seven years and nine months, the time it would take the first bond to mature. If you could buy a bond each month (at a cost of \$37.50), you'd have \$1,400 in three years—or

burned; a fertilizer of a 1-3-0 ratio. For beds which have not been burned, a 4-12-8 grade. (A fertilizer analysis of grade of 1-3-0 means one part nitrogen to three parts phosphorus to no parts potash; a 4-12-8 grade is four parts nitrogen, 12 parts phosphorus and 8 parts potash). The committee said it made the change because it was found last year when a 4-12-8 grade was recommended for all bed sites, that the grade was too high in potash for use on beds that are burned.

The UK Experiment Station agronomy department concurred in this recommendation. **PIGS—CROP REPORT:** According to a report from the U. S. Department of Agriculture, Agricultural Marketing Service, the 1959 fall pig crop in Kentucky is estimated at 1,071,000 head. This is the largest fall crop of pigs since 1943, and is 8 per cent above the fall-crop of 1958.

An 8 per cent increase in fall pigs will mean an increase in spring marketing of slaughter hogs, and a consequent lower price. There is a note of optimism for those pig producers who will be able to survive the low swing of the price cycle of hogs and feeder pigs. The predicted spring (1960) production in Kentucky is about 5 per cent less than for the spring of 1959. This would bring the national spring production of pigs down to a little less than that of the spring of 1958.

If the hog-corn price ratio stays around 12:3, as it was in mid-November, we may expect an increase in demand for feeder pigs late in the spring of 1960. The predicted spring pig prices may be starting back up. Also, we will likely see a bigger increase in prices for fall slaughter hogs than was earlier expected. An increase in prices may be expected, even though

NOTICE OF SALE OF FRANCHISE

By virtue of a resolution hereof passed by the city council of the City of Mt. Vernon, Kentucky, directing the undersigned to advise for the sale of a franchise to use the streets, avenues, alleys and public places of the City of Mt. Vernon, Kentucky, for the purpose of owning, operating, equipping and maintaining a system for the distribution of electric energy, the undersigned, as City Clerk of the said City, will on the 2nd day of February, 1960, at or about the hour of 2:00 o'clock P. M. sell at public auction to the highest and best bidder at the City Hall in said City, a franchise for the purposes above set out.

Said franchise is more particularly described and fully defined in a proposed ordinance granting and creating the same and said proposed ordinance defines the terms and conditions upon which said sale will be made, and is in full as follows:

EARL WATKINS City Clerk, Mt. Vernon, Ky. AN ORDINANCE NO. 260

THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF MT. VERNON, ROCKCASTLE COUNTY, KENTUCKY, DOES ORDAIN AS FOLLOWS:

SECTION 1. That, the purchaser and grantee of this franchise, his or its legal representatives, successors, and assigns, hereinafter called the "purchaser", be, and is subject to the conditions hereinafter contained, hereby authorized and empowered to acquire, purchase, construct, maintain and operate in and through this City, a system or works for the generation, distribution and transmission of electrical energy from points either within or without the corporate limits of this City; to install, erect and maintain, and thereafter, and from and through this City to persons, corporations and municipalities beyond the limits thereof, and for the sale of same for light, heat, power and other purposes; to erect and maintain poles, wires and other apparatus necessary or convenient for the operation of said system in, upon, across and along each and all of the streets, avenues, alleys and public places, within the present and future corporate limits of this City; to use and hold, and to use any and all such streets, avenues, alleys and public places, within the present and future corporate limits of this City; to use any and all real estate, easements, water and other rights necessary or convenient for said purpose; to purchase, acquire, construct, extend, reconstruct or modify, or any part thereof, or to purchase, acquire, construct, extend, reconstruct or modify, or any part thereof, any poles, wires and other apparatus as may be necessary or convenient for the proper distribution of electrical energy in and through this City; if, after any pole has once been erected, the Board of Trustees shall order the removal of said pole to another location, the City shall pay the cost of making such relocation, unless due to widening, regrading or reconstruction of any street, avenue or highway, in which case the purchaser will relocate at its expense. In any extension of the present distribution system, additional poles shall be placed under the supervision of the Board of Trustees.

SECTION 2. The purchaser shall indemnify, defend and hold the City from any and all damages, judgments, decrees, costs and expenses, including a reasonable attorney's fee, which the City may legally incur or incur which may be legally obtained against the City for or by reason of the use and occupation of any street, avenue, alley or other public place in the City by the purchaser, pursuant to the terms of this franchise, or legally resulting from the exercise by the purchaser of any of the privileges herein granted; and if any claim shall be made or suit brought against the City for damages alleged to have been sustained by reason of the occupation of any street, avenue, alley or other public place by the purchaser, the City shall immediately notify the purchaser in writing thereof, and the purchaser is hereby given the right and

privilege to defend or assist in defending such suit, in the name of the City.

SECTION 3. The purchaser may furnish electricity for light, heat, power and any other purpose from any power lines or power lines located above or near the streets, avenues, alleys and public places, and may make such lawful contracts for the use thereof as may be agreed upon between the purchaser and the said person or persons.

SECTION 4. The purchaser shall extend its electric light and power lines and install additional equipment whenever therefrom a reasonable return upon the investment required to install such extension.

SECTION 5. The purchaser shall have the right to make and enforce reasonable rules and regulations necessary to the proper conduct of its business and protection of its property.

SECTION 6. The purchaser shall have the right to charge for electrical energy supplied within the City, rates that are reasonable and that are subject to regulation by the Public Service Commission of Kentucky.

SECTION 7. This franchise and all rights and privileges granted hereunder shall be in full force and effect for a period of twenty (20) years, from and after the date when this franchise is granted to the purchaser.

SECTION 8. This franchise may be transferred by the purchaser and the word "purchaser" hereinafter used in this franchise shall include and be taken to mean and apply also to all the successors and assigns of the purchaser.

SECTION 9. As an additional consideration for the grant of this franchise, the purchaser will pay to the City a sum equal to 3% of the gross revenue received from the sale of electrical energy generated, distributed and sold by the purchaser, which ever is later, from electric service rendered within the corporate limits of the City to customers supplied under residential and commercial revenue classifications, as now defined in the Company's system of accounts and reported to the Public Service Commission of Kentucky. The amount payable to the City for each full calendar year during which this franchise is in effect, shall be computed on the basis of revenues received between January 1st and December 31st of such year, and payment shall be made on or prior to March 1st next following such December 31st; the amount which may be payable to the City for a portion of a calendar year at the commencement or termination of the term of this franchise shall be computed on the basis of revenues received during such portion of a calendar year, and shall be payable not more than 60 days after the termination of the period for which payment is made. Should any license, tax, occupational tax or any other tax, charge or fee except ad valorem taxes be now or hereafter imposed, the amount payable under this section shall be payable only to the extent that it exceeds the sum of all such taxes, charges or fees.

SECTION 10. It shall be the duty of the City Clerk, as soon

as practicable after the introduction of this ordinance, to sell at public auction, to the highest and best bidder, the within franchise at the City Hall on some day to be fixed by him after advertising the proposed ordinance and the time and place of sale thereof once a week for three consecutive weeks, in the Mt. Vernon Signal, and in making said sale he shall receive no bid for less amount than the total expense connected with the making of said sale, including the cost of advertising, and he shall report his sales to the Board at a subsequent meeting of this Board of Trustees. This Board of Trustees reserves the right to reject any and all bids.
