Carry-over Power of Fertilizer Aids All Rotation Crops

FERTILIZER'S "carry-over" power helps boost the yields of all crops in the rotation, when plant food is added to any one of them, reports the Middle West Soil Improvement Committee, in summarizing a recent report by H. J. Mederski, Ohio State University agronomist.

Corn yields were increased 15 bushels per acre, oats eight bushels, wheat 10 bushels, and hay 780 pounds per acre in Ohio tests, said Mederski, when 500 pounds of a nitrogen-phosphate-potash fertilizer was broadcast for corn in the rotation.

When the same amount of fertilizer was added to a new legume-grass seeding after wheat, the yields of hay were increased 1,800 pounds per acre, corn 12 bushels per acre, oats seven bushels, and wheat six bushels. Applying the fertilizer to wheat boosted yields of wheat by 19 bushels, hay by 1,300 pounds per acre, corn seven bushels and oats six bushels per acre.

When corn is in the rotation, said Mederski, the soil's fertility level can be increased or maintained by adding the bulk of the fertilizer at a convenient place in the rotation, such as the meadow crop, and using smaller amounts of plant food in the row at corn planting time.

Preparing A Tobacco Bed:

Russell Hunt, Extension specialist in tobacco, UK, was in Rockcastle County Wednesday, preparing a meeting with tobacco growers.

growers. Here are some of the recommendations Mr. Hunt made.

Select fertile, well-drained land which is high in organic matter for the bed, preferably with a slight southern or eastern slope, free from shade, especially in the forenoon.

It is desirable to prepare enough plant bed area to have a surplus of strong vigorous plants. Provide 100 feet of bed, 9 ft. wide, or 75 ft. of bed, 12 ft. wide, for each acre of barley to be set. Don't attempt to destroy weed seed in plant beds when the soil is wet, regardless of the method used in preparation.

Before treating soil to kill weed seed, plow the area 4 weeks in advance. Plowing the land brings the weed seed to the surface and exposes them to light, air, and higher temperatures - conditions favorable for germination.

Weed seed, thus exposed, are more easily killed than if the plowing is done at the time of setting. Work the soil thoroughly before treating so that a light raking after treating will put the soil in proper condition for seeding.

Beds may be prepared by steaming, burning, Methyl Bromide, Calcium Cyanamid, or by drenching with Mylone, Vapam or Allyl Alcohol. Except for Calcium Cyanamid, any of these soil treatments may be used either in the fall or the spring.

When using Methyl Bromide, have the soil thoroughly pulverized and just about as moist as it can safely be worked. The

soil temperature should be 50 degrees or warmer, cover the bed with gasproof covering and seal the edges with soil, then release 1 pound of Methyl Bromide gas for 100 square ft. into shallow pans or troughs, using a specially designed applicator. Beds treated in the spring may be seeded as soon as the cover is removed.

A new method of treating with Methyl Bromide is called Hot Methyl Bromide. When using Hot Methyl Bromide, proceed the same as with the old method until ready to release the gas. Have a bucket or other container with 5 gallons or more of pot water at a temperature of 150 degrees to 160 degrees (as hot as the hand can stand). The can is punctured with the applicator in the upper position instead of

in the lower position used in the conventional method. Then gas through the tubes placed at the corners of the bed and one-third through tubes placed at the side of the bed.

Water is the cheapest livestock feed. Give animals plenty of it.

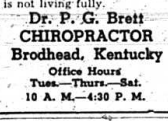

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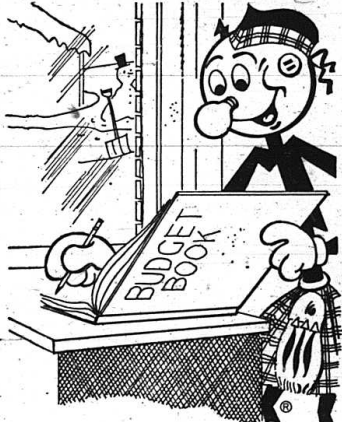

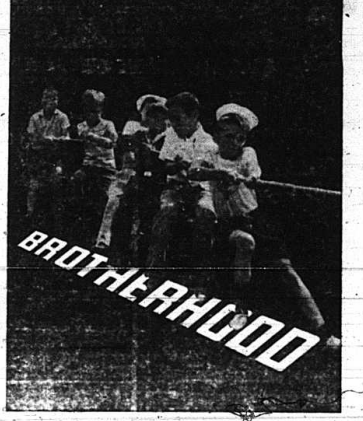
Renew Drivers License A Through K, This Year

The Kentucky Department of Public Safety reminds motorists that persons in the A-through K portion of the alphabet must renew their drivers' licenses during their birth months in 1960. License renewal application is made at the circuit clerk's office of the county in which the motorist resides. A through K licenses become invalid on midnight of the last day of the person's birth month in 1960.

If the driver will not be in his home county during his birth month, he can apply for a license at any time within 90 days prior to his birth month by filing an affidavit at the circuit clerk's office, stating that he will not be in his home county during his birth month. Temporary drivers' licenses are issued upon application, and the permanent licenses are mailed to motorists from Department of Public Safety headquarters in Frankfort after a thorough record check.

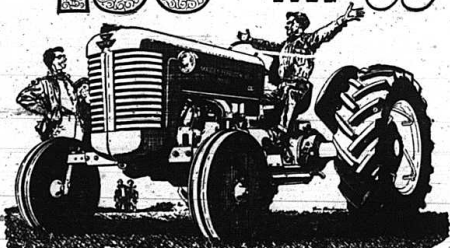

 I am enclosing a clipping from the Hamilton Journal Daily News dated Feb. 13, 1960. It is about the Veterans Bonus for

Kentucky Veterans. I suppose you have heard about the recent Bill which the Governor of Kentucky has made about the situation:

He states that for a veteran to receive this bonus he had to be called or drafted or enlist in the State of Kentucky and must be a resident of Kentucky. That is not the Bill that the voters of Kentucky voted in the November 1959 election.

He states in his new Bill that non-residents cannot receive this bonus even though they were drafted or enlisted in the military service from Kentucky.

As you can see from this clipping more than 1,000 veterans are here in the Hamilton, Ohio, area and thousands more in other states and in this state.

I never have been in service but I have three brothers who have. One lives in Hamilton, one in Alabama and one in Ren-

no Valley, Ky. I, myself, was forced to leave Kentucky at the age of 16 years to seek employment. I don't think this is right for the veterans who have risked their lives in the military service to not get the bonus. After all the people of that state have voted for it and will have to pay for it at the rate of 3% sales tax.

I am proud to be from Kentucky and I am not ashamed for anyone to call me a "Briar-hopper". If they had been any way for me to make a halfway decent living I would have never left Kentucky. I am a former Rockcastle Boy.

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## High Cost Of Prejudice

(Ed. Note—This is published in the interest of Brotherhood week, Feb. 21-28, sponsored by the National Conference of Christians and Jews. It was written by Lee Hills, Executive Director of the Detroit Free Press.)

Perhaps no other problem facing humanity is so in need of solution as the bigotry, latent and active, which besets men and nations. It has existed ever since ancient times.

The Man of Galilee recognized this when he admonished "That Ye Love One Another." The progress toward realizing the ideals of the commandment over the centuries has been slow but perceptible.

Ever since 1934 a mighty force in Brotherhood Week sponsored by the National Conference of Christians and Jews has been added to other efforts to promote real Brotherhood.

The NCCJ has as one of its stated purposes... "the establishment of a social order in which the religious ideals of brotherhood and justice shall become standards of human relationships."

In simplified form the creed of NCCJ may be summed up in "giving to others the same dignity and rights one claims for himself."

No person, except perhaps those who pride themselves upon their prejudices, can for one moment doubt the high cost to the human race in the lack of Brotherhood.

That bigotry and intolerance do exist is one of the saddest commentaries on man and the social order, particularly in a Nation which prides itself in its high standards of economic and political progress.

We spend billions for material and physical means with which to wage defense and even as we do this there is a cancerous ill of hate and prejudice dividing us in some degree.

A nation girting its loins against an aggressor must first have completely cohesive forces in the realm of the spirit and in the brotherhood of its people.

quired additional property, must this be reported to the VA?

A Yes, it must be reported to the VA promptly. Any increase in annual income must be reported to the VA under the present law. Under the new law any material increase in the size of the pensioner's estate must also be reported.

Q What about a change in the number of dependents?

A A change in the number of dependents must also be reported promptly to the VA.

Q Is there anything beside the amount of income, the size of estate, and the number of dependents that will affect the amount of pension paid to a veteran under the new system?

A Yes. Under the new system the pension of a veteran hospitalized or maintained by the VA will be reduced to \$30 month after two full calendar months of care. If the veteran has a wife or child, the amount of his pension in excess of \$30 may be paid to his dependents.

Q Will the veteran who receives an additional \$70 for regular aid and attendance also be reduced to a pension of \$30 a month if he is hospitalized or domiciled by the VA?

A Yes, unless he is receiving care or treatment for leprosy.

Q If I am receiving a pension at present but I think it will be to my advantage to transfer to the new system on July 1, what should I do?

A Nothing right now. After

the VA has sent you all the information necessary for you to determine which system will be best for you, the VA will send you a form to fill out indicating your decision to transfer from the old system to the new. You will receive this form about March 1, well in advance of the deadline, July 1. You may delay exercising your option to change systems, and you may make the change at any time in the future. But once you change to the new system, you cannot return to the old system again.

Q If I am not now on the pension rolls because I am not eligible under the present pension law, but I will become eligible under the new system, what should I do?

A You may get the necessary assistance and application from any VA office and apply for a pension. A VA Contact Representative will be glad to help you.

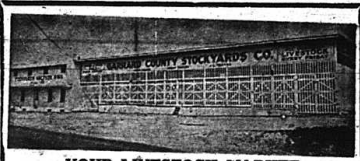
