### Carry-over Power of Fertilizer Aids All Rotation Crops

FERTILIZER'S "carry-over" power helps boost the yields of all crops in the rotation, when plant food is added to any one of them, reports the Middle West Soil Improvement Commission, in summarizing a recent report by H. J. Mederski, Ohio State University agronomist.

Corn yields were increased 15 bushels per acre, oats eight bushels, wheat 10 bushels, and hay 700 pounds per acre in Ohio tests, said Mederski, when 500 pounds of a nitrogen-phosphate potash fertilizer was broadcast for corn in the rotation.

When the same amount of fertilizer was added to a new legume-grass seeding after wheat, the yields of hay were increased 1,800 pounds per acre, corn 12 bushels per acre, oats seven bushels, and wheat six bushels. Applying the fertilizer to wheat, boosted yields of wheat by 19 bushels, hay by 1,300 pounds per acre, corn seven bushels and oats six bushels per acre.

When corn is in the rotation, said Mederski, the soil's fertility level can be increased or maintained by adding the bulk of the fertilizer at a convenient place in the rotation, such as the meadow crop, and using smaller amounts of plant food in the row at corn planting time.

ORDINANCE NO. 259
AN ORDINANCE PROVIDING FOR THE ISSUANCE OF \$15,000.00 VOTED CITY OF MT. VERNON, KENTUCKY BONDS ORDERING AND PROVIDING FOR THE LEVYING OF A TAX SUFFICIENT TO PAY THE INTEREST AND PRINCIPAL THEREOF IN TEN YEARS AND PROVIDING FOR THE PUBLIC SALE OF SAME

WHEREAS it is necessary and deemed advisable for the health, welfare and safety of the City of Mt. Vernon, Kentucky to issue \$15,000.00 of voted bonds, the proceeds of which will be used in the acquisition of fire fighting equipment for the City, and

WHEREAS, at a regular advertised and legal election held on November 3, 1959 in the City of Mt. Vernon the voters of the City approved the issuance of said bonds by more than two-thirds of the qualified voters of Kentucky Revised Statute 66.060.

NOW, THEREFORE, the City Council of the City of Mt. Vernon, Kentucky, pursuant to said election and the vote of the people of said City, do ordain:

SECTION 1: That bonds of the City of Mt. Vernon and in Rockcastle County, and providing for the redemption of same, if possible be given to the owner of each bond, and if the City should redeem all or any of said bonds after March 1, 1963 it may do so after giving the notice above described by paying the face value of said bond with an accrued interest thereon at the rate of 4 1/2% per annum. That if at any time the City desires to redeem less than all of said bonds, the same may do so by paying said bonds only in inverse numerical order, and if all or any part of any one or more said bonds redemption subsequent to March 1, 1963 all interest beyond the redemption date will cease on the date of redemption.

SECTION 3: That said bonds shall be substantially in the following form:

No. \$500.00 UNITED STATES OF AMERICA. COMMONWEALTH OF KENTUCKY. COUNTY OF ROCKCASTLE, CITY OF MT. VERNON 4 1/2% VOTED FIRE EQUIPMENT BOND

The City of Mt. Vernon, Mt. Vernon, Kentucky, for value received, hereby promises to pay to the bearer of this bond five hundred dollars (\$500.00) on the first day of March, 1963, and to pay interest thereon from March 1, 1960, at the rate of 4 1/2% per annum, payable annually on March 1 upon presentation and surrender of the interest coupons attached to this bond as set forth hereon severally mature, both principal and interest being payable at Mt. Vernon, Kentucky.

## Farm Bureau Supports "Operation Family Garden"

Farm Bureau has given its wholehearted support to "Operation Family Garden," a project to be carried out this year in Eastern Kentucky through the cooperation of the Agricultural Extension Service, University of Kentucky, and a number of public and private groups.

To be concentrated in 22 counties in the eastern end of the state, this is a project designed to help people in that area to help themselves. Contrasted with various types of relief programs, Operation Family Garden will provide the know-how and incentives that will help low-income people in that area

improve their own food supply. At the state level, the project is being planned and carried out with the guidance of a committee consisting of representatives of many agencies and organizations. The educational end of the program will be coordinated by Hubert Davis, University of Kentucky Extension gardener. The project could mean \$2-million additional income a year to the 22-county area; and a tremendous improvement in the condition of unemployed or under employed people.

County planning committees are being organized throughout the area to work with the state committee on the project. A long list of awards and other incentives have been worked out by the state committee so that counties and individuals will receive recognition for outstanding jobs done in the program. During the past three or four years, thousands upon thousands of tons of surplus commodities have been shipped in

the Eastern Kentucky area to help feed hungry people. No better use could be found for surplus foods; but Operation Family Gardens will make it possible for these people to produce a lot of their own food for summer and fall; through can-

ning and other preservation methods, have food left over for the winter months. This makes a whole lot more sense than turning to Washington, D.C. for solutions to their problems.

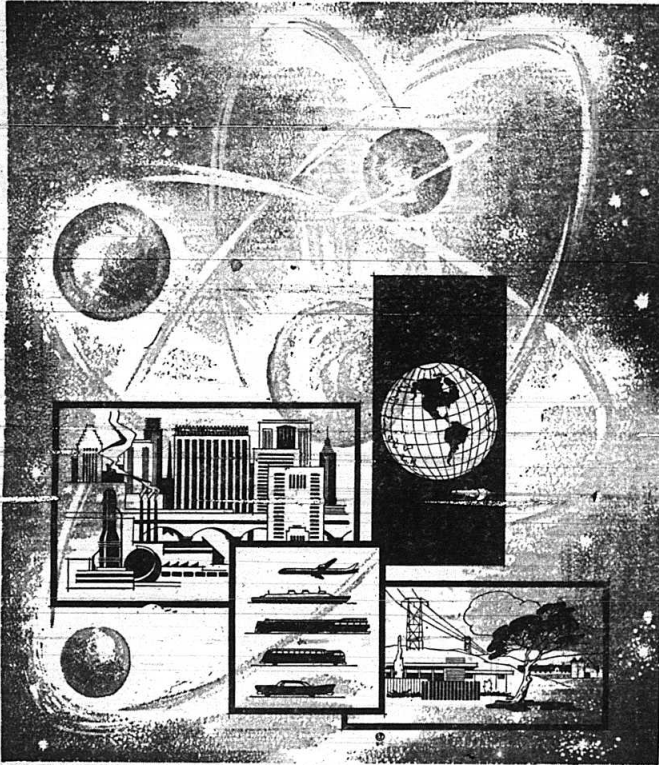

By virtue of a resolution heretofore passed by the Board of Trustees of the City of Livingston, Kentucky, directing the undersigned to advertise for bids and sell a franchise to use the streets, avenues, alleys and public places of the City of Livingston, Kentucky, for the purpose of owning, operating, equipping and maintaining a system for the distribution of electric energy, the undersigned, as City Clerk of the said City, will on the 29 day of March, 1960, at or about the hour of 2:00 o'clock P.M. sell at public auction to the highest and best bidder at the City Hall in said City, a franchise for the purposes above set.

Said franchise is more particularly described and fully defined in a proposed ordinance granting and creating the same and said proposed ordinance defines the terms and conditions upon which said sale will be made, and is in full as follows:

**AN ORDINANCE OF THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF THE CITY OF LIVINGSTON, ROCKCASTLE COUNTY, KENTUCKY, DOES ORDAIN AS FOLLOWS:**

SECTION 1. That, the purchaser and grantee of this franchise, his or its legal representatives, successors, and assigns, hereinafter called the "purchaser", be, and is, subject to the conditions, covenants, terms, and conditions, hereby authorized and empowered to acquire, purchase, construct, maintain and operate in and through this City, a system or works for the generation, distribution and transmission of electrical energy from points either within or without the corporate limits of this City, to this City and the inhabitants thereof, and from and through this City to persons, corporations and municipalities beyond the limits thereof, and for the sale of same for light, heat, power and other purposes, to erect and maintain poles, wires and other apparatus necessary or convenient for the operation of said system in, upon, across and along each and all of the streets, avenues, alleys and public places, within the present and future corporate limits of this City, to have and hold, as by law authorized, any and all real estate, easements, water and other rights necessary or convenient for said purpose, to use any and all such streets, avenues, alleys and public places while constructing or operating said electric system or works; and to cross any and all streets and streams in this City for the purpose of constructing, maintaining or extending such poles, wires and other apparatus as may be necessary or convenient

for the proper distribution of electric energy in and through this City. If, after any pole has once been erected, the Board of Trustees shall order the removal of said pole to another location, the City shall pay the cost of making such relocation, unless due to widening, regrading or reconstruction of the street or highway, in which case the purchaser will relocate at its expense. In any extension of the present distribution system, additional poles shall be placed under the supervision of the Board of Trustees.

SECTION 2. The purchaser shall indemnify and save harmless the City from any and all damages, judgments, decrees, costs and expenses, including a reasonable attorney's fee, which the City may legally suffer or incur, by which may be legally obtained against the City for or by reason of the use and occupation of any street, avenue, alley, or other public place in this City by the purchaser, pursuant to the terms of this franchise, or legally resulting from the exercise by the purchaser, of any of the privileges herein granted; and if any claim shall be made or suit brought against the City for damages alleged to have been sustained by reason of the occupation of any street, avenue, alley or public place or the exercise of any privileges herein granted, by the purchaser, the City shall immediately notify the purchaser in writing

thereof, and the purchaser is hereby given the right and privilege to defend or assist in defending such suit, in the name of the City.

SECTION 3. The purchaser may furnish electricity for light, heat, power and any other purpose to any person or persons residing along or near the streets, avenues, alleys and public places and may make such lawful contracts for the use thereof as may be agreed upon between the purchaser and the said person or persons.

SECTION 4. The purchaser shall extend its electric light or power lines and install additional equipment whenever there is assured to it from additional business to be derived therefrom a reasonable return upon the investment required to install such extension.

SECTION 5. The purchaser shall have the right to make and enforce reasonable rules and regulations necessary to the proper conduct of its business and protection of its property.

SECTION 6. The purchaser shall have the right to charge and collect for electrical energy supplied within the City, rates that are reasonable and that are subject to regulation by the Public Service Commission of Kentucky.

SECTION 7. This franchise shall be in full force and effect for a period of twenty (20) years from and

after the date when this franchise is granted to the purchaser.

SECTION 8. This franchise may be transferred by the purchaser and the word "purchaser" whenever used in this franchise shall include and be taken to mean and apply also to all the successors and assigns of the purchaser.

SECTION 9. As additional consideration for the grant of this franchise, the purchaser will pay to the City a sum equal to 3% of the gross revenue received by the purchaser, on and after January 1, 1960, or on and after the date when the grant of this franchise becomes effective, whichever is later, from electric service rendered within the corporate limits of the City to customers supplied under residential and commercial revenue classification, as now defined in the purchaser's system of accounts and reported to the Public Service Commission of Kentucky, for each full calendar year during which this franchise is in effect, shall be computed and the amount of revenue received between January 1st and December 31st of such year, and payment shall be made on or prior to March 1st next following such December 31st; the amount which may be payable to the City for a portion of a calendar year at the commencement or termination of the term of this franchise shall be computed on the basis of revenues received during such portion of a calendar year, and shall be payable not later than 30 days after the termination of the period for which payment is made. Should any license tax, occupational tax or any other tax, charge or fee except ad valorem taxes be imposed, the purchaser shall include and be taken to mean and apply also to all the successors and assigns of the purchaser.

SECTION 10. It shall be the duty of the City Clerk, as soon as practicable after the introduction of this ordinance, to sell at public auction, to the highest and best bidder, the within franchise at the City Hall on some day to be fixed by him after advertising the proposed ordinance and the time and place thereof once a week for three consecutive weeks, in the Mt. Vernon Signal, Mt. Vernon, Kentucky, and in making said sale he shall receive no part of the cost of advertising, and he shall report his actions hereunder at a subsequent meeting of this Board of Trustees. The Board of Trustees reserves the right to reject any and all bids.

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## Water - Key To Your Survival

Sure and 'tis Saint Patrick's Day, today, so what better time for all us Irish to kiss the blarney stone and go into a discourse on the care and preservation of wildlife and water.

Like humans and all other living things, wildlife needs water. This need, varying with requirements of different birds and mammals, is highlighted during the annual observance of National Wildlife Week, March 20-26, sponsored in Kentucky by the National Wildlife Federation, the League of Kentucky Sportsmen and the Kentucky Outdoor Writers Association.

Theme of the National Wildlife Week observance this year is: "Water—Key to Your Survival!" Certainly, water is the key to survival of many species of wildlife.

The value of Kentucky wildlife cannot be computed entirely by dollar-and-cent standards. Furbearers, of course, have a definite economic worth. And, many resort areas and businesses dealing with transportation and sporting goods enjoy specific gain from recreational activities based upon fish and wildlife. Most of all, however, these wild creatures are important because of the pleasure they provide people. Fishing and hunting-based directly upon fish and wildlife, offer recreation to millions. Wildlife is also an important part of the enjoyment of those who participate in boating, picnicking, hiking, camping, nature study, etc.

It is recognized that water must be used for such purposes as municipal supplies, industry, agriculture, navigation, power generation, etc.

Water conservation means "wise use." In view of conflicts of interest arising from demands of an increasing population, adequate provision must be made for wildlife. This required intelligent planning. It also calls for pollution abatement, siltation control and halting abuses which damage or destroy values of water for beneficial purposes.
