**NOTICE OF ORDINANCE GRANTING FRANCHISE TO KENTUCKY UTILITIES COMPANY**

The following is a true and correct copy of an ordinance enacted on April 4, 1960, by the Board of Trustees of Livingston, Kentucky, creating and defining an electric franchise, the purchaser and grantee of which was Kentucky Utilities Company.

**AN ORDINANCE THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF THE CITY OF LIVINGSTON, KENTUCKY, DOES ORDAIN AS FOLLOWS:**

SECTION 1. That Kentucky Utilities Company, the purchaser and grantee of this franchise, his or its legal representatives, successors, and assigns, hereinafter called the "purchaser", be, and is, subject to the conditions hereinafter contained, hereby authorized and empowered to acquire, purchase, construct, maintain and operate in and through this City, a system or works for the generation, distribution, and transmission of electrical energy from points either within or without the corporate limits of this City, to this City and the inhabitants thereof, and from and through this City to persons, corporations and municipalities beyond the limits thereof, and for the sale of same for light, heat, power and other purposes; to erect and maintain poles, wires and other apparatus necessary or convenient for the operation of said system in, upon, across

and along each and all of the streets, avenues, alleys and public places, within the present and future corporate limits of this City; to have and hold as by law authorized, any and all real estate, easements, water and other rights necessary or convenient for said purpose; to use any and all such streets, avenues, alleys and public places for the purpose of constructing, maintaining or operating said electric system or works; and to cross any and all streets and streams in this City for the purpose of constructing, maintaining or extending such poles, wires and other apparatus as may be necessary or convenient for the proper distribution of electric energy in and through this City. If, after any pole has been erected, the Board of Trustees shall order the removal of said pole to another location, the City shall pay the cost of making such relocation, unless due to widening, regrading or reconstruction of the street or highway, in which case the purchaser will relocate at its expense. In any extensions of the present distribution system, additional poles shall be placed under the supervision of the Board of Trustees.

SECTION 2. The purchaser shall indemnify, and save harmless the City from any and all damages, judgments, decrees, costs and expenses, including a reasonable attorney's fee, which the City may legally suffer or incur or which may be legally obtained against the City for or by reason of the use and occupation of any street, avenue, alley, or other public place in the City by the purchaser, pursuant to the terms of this franchise, or injury resulting from the exercise by the purchaser of any of the privileges herein granted; and if any claim shall be made or suit brought against the City for damages alleged to have been sustained by reason of the operation of any street, avenue, alley or public place

or the exercise of any privileges herein granted, by the purchaser, the City shall immediately notify the purchaser in writing thereof, and the purchaser is hereby given the right and privilege to defend or assist in defending such suit, in the name of the City.

SECTION 3. The purchaser may furnish electricity for light, heat, power and any other purpose to any person or persons residing along or near the aforesaid streets, avenues, alleys and public places and may make such lawful contracts for the use thereof as may be agreed upon between the purchaser and the said person or persons.

SECTION 4. The purchaser shall extend its electric light or power lines and install additional equipment whenever there is assured to it from additional business to be derived therefrom a reasonable return upon the investment required to install such extension.

SECTION 5. The purchaser shall have the right to make and enforce reasonable rules and regulations necessary to the proper conduct of its business and protection of its property.

SECTION 6. The purchaser shall have the right to charge for electrical energy supplied within the City, rates that are reasonable and that are subject to regulation by the Public Service Commission of Kentucky.

SECTION 7. This franchise and all rights and privileges granted hereunder shall be in full force and effect for a period of twenty (20) years from and after the date when this franchise is granted to the purchaser.

SECTION 8. This franchise may be transferred by the purchaser and the word "purchaser" whenever used in this franchise shall include and be taken

to mean and apply also to all the successors and assigns of the purchaser.

SECTION 9. As additional consideration for the grant of this franchise, the purchaser will pay to the City a sum equal to 3% of the gross revenue received by the purchaser, on and after January 1, 1960, or on and after the date when the grant of this franchise becomes effective, whichever is later, from electric service rendered within the corporate limits of the City to customers supplied under residential and commercial revenue classification, as now defined in the purchaser's system of accounts and reported to the Public Service Commission of Kentucky. The amount payable to the City for each full calendar year during which this franchise is, in effect, shall be computed on the basis of revenues received between January 1st and December 31st of such year, and payment shall be made on or prior to March 1st next following such December 31st; the amount which may be payable to the City for a portion of a calendar year at the commencement or termination of the term of this franchise shall be computed on the basis of revenues received during such portion of a calendar year, and shall be

payable not more than 60 days after the termination of the period for which payment is made. Should any license tax, occupational tax or any other tax, charge or fee except ad valorem taxes be now or hereafter imposed, the amount payable under this section shall be payable only to the extent that it exceeds the sum of all such taxes, charges or fees.

SECTION 10. It shall be the duty of the City Clerk, as soon as practicable after the introduction of this ordinance, to sell at public auction, to the highest and best bidder, the within franchise at the City Hall on some day to be fixed by him after advertising the proposed ordinance and the time and place of sale thereof once a week for three consecutive weeks, in the Mt. Vernon Signal, Mt. Vernon, Kentucky, and in making said sale he shall receive no making of said sale including the cost of advertising, and he shall report his actions hereunder at a subsequent meeting of this Board of Trustees. This Board of Trustees reserves the right to reject any and all bids.

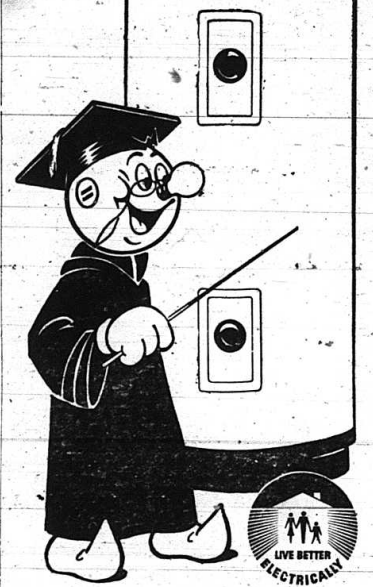

# Farm And Home News

### Tobacco Bed Demonstrations

Two demonstrations, showing the use of HOT Methyl Bromide in treating tobacco plant beds, will be held in the county just as soon as the ground is dry enough to work.

Russell Hunt, Extension Specialist in Tobacco, will conduct the demonstrations. One demonstration will be held on W. S. Stewart's farm at Wildie and the other will be held on the farm of Roy Brown at Quail. Anyone interested in watching either of these demonstrations is welcome to attend. Exact dates of the demonstrations will be announced as soon as possible.

### Lawns

As a companion crop for bluegrass, white Dutch clover should be sown during the last days of March at the rate of two ounces per one-thousand square feet. Mix seed with one-half gallon sand or soil.

Sow some bluegrass every year. Absolute must! One half pound per one-thousand square feet.

### Tobacco Plant Bed Tips—When Weather and Soil Conditions

### Permit!

The late season will change plants and methods for weed control. Suggested treatments are HOT methyl bromide, steaming or burning. For HOT methyl bromide treatment see Extension Circular 346-A—Plant Bed Management—available for the asking at the County Agent's Office.

Do not treat until soils are dry enough to plow and disk without injuring the structure of the soil. Soil temperatures should be 40 degrees F or above.

The late season will likely not permit the use of shallow drenches, since a waiting period of two weeks or more is needed between treatment and seeding.

Fertilize with care—30 to 40 pounds of a 4-12-8 or equivalent per 1000 square yards.

Seeding rate—Two level teaspoons of seed per 1000 square yards.

Using a good grade of canvases and boxing the bed will speed the growth of plants, especially in dry weather. Ditch to keep out surface

water. Surface water brings in weed and grass seeds, also Wildfire and Anthracnose.

### INSECTS:

All insects should be controlled. Parathion should be used to control grubworms in the plant bed. Too late for other materials. Refer to Misc. Publication 37-B "Tobacco Insect Control" available at the County Agent's Office. Snails and Slugs may be controlled by using Parathion dust applied in late afternoon. Fleabeetles—Use DDT as a dust or wettable powder.

Growing plants need water. Prepare to water beds in dry weather, before plants begin to yellow. (Remember Last Year!)

### Spring Out Planting

Spring oats should be planted this month for proper yields, says Verne Finker, UK Experiment Station small grains specialist.

Be sure to plant a spring-out variety; if a winter-out variety is substituted or accidentally planted in place of the spring-out variety, yields will be greatly reduced.

Recommended varieties of spring oats for Kentucky are MO-0295 and Andrew.

If recommended varieties are unavailable, use Putnam, a new Illinois variety that has done well in Kentucky; or any one of the Clinton-type spring oats—Clinton 59, Clintland, etc.—which have had a fair performance in the state.

Finker urged farmers to plant

spring oats as soon as equipment can be gotten into fields. If planted after March 31, he said, yields may be very low; harvest-time for spring oats is generally July; any delayed planting will be adversely affected by summer heat. Recommended planting rate is two bushels per acre.

### Stair Now

Now is the time for starting that spring house cleaning. Even though the weather may not be the best, there are many jobs that can be done now.

A daily cleaning schedule will be helpful in spacing your work so as not to have too many heavy tasks falling on the same day. Remember, don't over do it. It is better to work for shorter periods of time and rest frequently than to become over-tired.

### Proper Care For Longer Wear

Washing garments that contain elastic carefully and often will give them longer life. Oil and perspiration from the skin, detergents and heat can quickly ruin the elastic in girdles and bras.

Wash garments containing

elastic in soap and warm water; avoid using detergents. Do not scrub on heavily soiled areas, use a soft brush. Squeeze out the moisture rather than wringing the garment.

Thorough rinsing of the garment is important. Then roll in a turkish towel to take up the moisture that cannot be squeezed out. Gently smooth the garment into shape and dry at room temperature. Never dry over direct heat or in a dryer.

## Crippling Diseases Affect 28% Of Homes

The three crippling diseases now under attack by the National Foundation affect 28 percent of the Rockcastle County homes answering a questionnaire in the January Mothers' March for the New March of Dimes. Mrs. Earl Hammons, chairman of the National Foundation's county chapter, reported.

The three cripples are birth defects, arthritis and polio. In addition to seeking funds, the Marching Mothers this winter bore small "Door Count" cards asking several basic questions about these cripples.

The Marching Mothers also found that nearly three-fifths of individuals in the households reporting had not yet completed their full series of three Salk polio vaccine shots, the chairman said.

"While the Door Count was not a scientific survey," the chairman said, "it does provide a good working estimate of the size of these problems in our county. It will be of great value to the chapter in planning its future program of assistance to individuals with these conditions."
