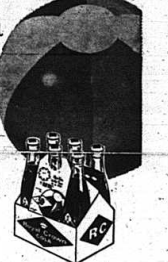

Four local men will act as auctioneers. They will each discuss four items in rotation so that a total of 16 items will be before the audience at once.

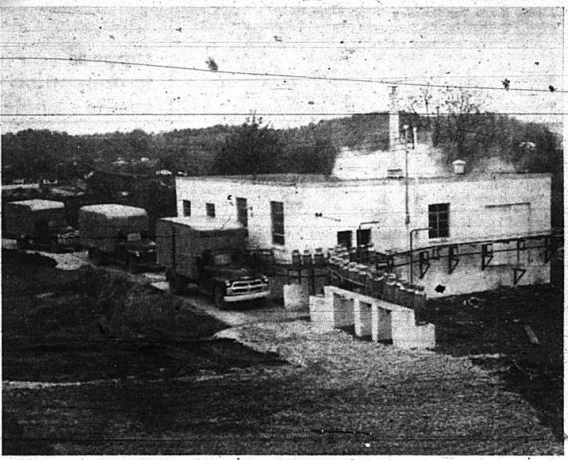
High bidden on items will be announced at intervals.

## Mt. Vernon Armour Milk Plant Is Now Receiving

The first truck load of milk was received at the newly constructed Armour milk plant building at Mt. Vernon, Monday at 10:30 a. m.

Milk collected on the 10 established routes in Rockcastle and surrounding counties has been shipped to Springfield since January.

When a milk truck arrives at the Armour plant it parks within some four or five feet of the building and unloads the milk cans directly on a conveyor. The cans are pulled into the building where it is dumped into a tank.

Each can of milk is tested. The man who makes tests takes a sample of milk with a tiny long handled ladle and pours it into numbered jars.

Empty cans are turned upside down, placed on another conveyor, the can lids are put on a conveyor rack above the cans and they move down the line to be sterilized.

Milk is cooled and then hauled by refrigerated truck to Springfield. Besides being cooled at Mt. Vernon milk is tested.

# Farm And Home News

## Alfalfa Needs Top Dressing After First Spring Cut

Alfalfa crops will need a top-dressing of fertilizer after the first cutting in late May, says Warren Thompson, UK Cooperative Extension Service agronomist.

A ton of alfalfa removes from 12 to 15 pounds of actual phosphorus per acre and 30 to 40 pounds of potassium each year. These plant foods must be replaced and top-dressing is one way to do it.

Test alfalfa field soils to determine needs, Thompson says. Use 600 pounds an acre of 0-10-20, or 300 pounds of 0-20-40 fertilizers if the test shows a deficiency of phosphorus and potassium. If fertilizers are left off, production goes down and the stand goes out faster.

Borax also is recommended for Kentucky alfalfa fields, Thompson points out. This can be applied in the above-mentioned fertilizers or applied as a straight material. About 15 to 20 pounds of borax an acre, depending on soil tests, is usually needed.

## UK EARLY WHITE CORN SEED TO BE AVAILABLE

A small amount of seed will be available this spring for plantings of Ky. 205W, a hybrid released in 1958 by the UK Agricultural Experiment Station.

S. H. Phillips, Extension agronomist, said Ky. 205W is the first early white hybrid released by UK. Seed was produced by seed growers in 1959 and will be commercially available this year for limited

## Plantings.

During a three-year evaluation period, Ky. 205W was as early as US 13 (a yellow hybrid) in maturity; Ky. 205W is much earlier than US 523W, the most popular white hybrid in late plantings, problem soils, and to take advantage of frequent higher pre-harvest prices.

## Suggested Program For Housefly Control On The Farm

1. Sanitation is the most important single factor in the program; practice it without reservation. Clean barns daily and either scatter the litter on fields where it can dry or put it in a pile. In the latter case spray the surface of the pile with Malathion concentrate 8 ounces (1 measuring cupful) in 3 gallons of water. A 3 gallon knapsack sprayer is suggested for this purpose. Wet completely the pile of litter dumped each day.

2. Screen buildings where practical.

3. Spray with Malathion all fly roosting places in barns and other buildings, exclusive of milk rooms. To make this spray mix together at the rate of 1 gallon of 50-percent Malathion emulsion, 20 pounds of sugar and 50 gallons of water. With good sanitation one application should give effective control for 3 weeks. In making the ap-

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plification protect feeds; feeding troughs, water cups, and tanks to avoid contamination.

4 As a supplement to the spraying program use a dry bait. One such can be made by mixing one half pound of 25 percent Malathion wettable powder and 10 pounds of sugar. Sprinkle from a "saltshaker" type jar on floors in barns and on window sills and ledges.

Apply about 4 ounces to 2,000 square feet of surface.

5. Space sprays containing pyrethrins will effectively control flies in enclosed spaces. They should be applied daily with hand sprayers, aerosol bombs, or mist sprayers to give a quick kill of flies in enclosures.

Malathion is a poison and the usual precautions governing the use of such materials should be observed.

## REGISTER BOATS AT COUNTY CLERK'S OFFICE

The United States Coast Guard has approved Kentucky's new boating system set up by the 1960 General Assembly.

According to Scott Barbour, director of the Division of Boating in the Department of Public Safety, the agency now has federal approval to require registration and numbering of boats July 1.

Boats in Kentucky waters have been receiving numbers from the Coast Guard. After July 1, these boats and others being registered will have to receive their numbers under the Kentucky system, Barbour said.

Registration and payment of fees will be made at circuit clerk's offices.

Barbour said the Kentucky system had received Coast Guard approval under the Fed-

eral Boating Act of 1958. The state will supervise numbering of boats, reporting of boating accidents, statistical compilation and furnishing of other boating information.

At the last General Assembly Kentucky joined 31 other states with boating laws. The Kentucky law requires that every boat with a motor be registered and sets up a schedule of fees.

Visitors from out-of-state bringing boats into Kentucky will be allowed to operate them for 90 days without registration, if the boats already have registration numbers from other states or federally assigned numbers.

## Carry-over Power of Fertilizer Aids All Rotation Crops

FERTILIZER'S "carry-over" power helps boost the yields of all crops in the rotation, when plant food is added to any one of them, reports the Middle West Soil Improvement Committee in summarizing a recent report by H. J. Mederski, Ohio State University agronomist.

Corn yields were increased 15 bushels per acre, oats eight bushels, wheat 10 bushels, and hay 100 pounds per acre in Ohio tests, said Mederski, when 500 pounds of a nitrogen-phosphate-potash fertilizer was broadcast for corn in the rotation.

When the same amount of fertilizer was added to a new legume-grass seeding after wheat, the yields of hay were increased 1,800 pounds per acre, corn 12 bushels per acre, oats seven bushels, and wheat six bushels.

Applying the fertilizer to wheat, boosted yields of wheat by 19 bushels, hay by 1,300 pounds per acre, corn seven bushels and oats six bushels per acre.

When corn is in the rotation, said Mederski, the soil's fertility level can be increased or maintained by adding the bulk of the fertilizer at a convenient place in the rotation, such as the meadow crop, and using smaller amounts of plant food in the row at corn planting time.

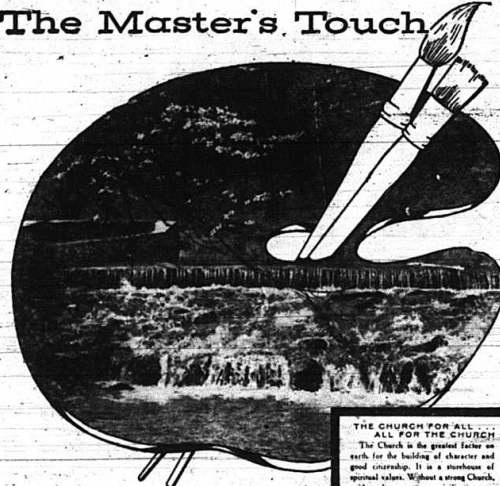

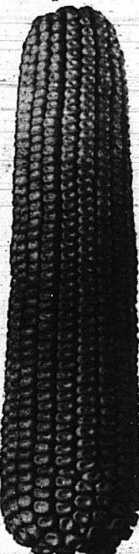
