Treatments Are Listed For Plant Bed Insects

Several insects will be attacking young plants in tobacco beds in the near future. Prompt treatment can save beds from serious damage.

Here are the insects and treatment from Richard Thurston, UK Experiment Station entomologist:

Flea Beetles And Cutworms:

A ten percent DDT dust, at the rate of one pound per 100 square yards of bed; or DDT spray from the 50 percent wettable powder, at the rate of 12 level tablespoonsful in water per 100 square yards of bed. These can be applied as needed to beds, repeated in six or eight days if necessary, and also applied the day before setting out starts.

Grubworms: The one percent Parathion dust, dusted onto ground at the first sign of grubworms; use at rate of two pounds dust per 100 square yards of bed. Great care should be taken with insecticides, which is very toxic to humans or animals.

Other materials are Aldrin, Dieldrin or Heptachlor, used as a dust or spray or in the granule form; use one and one-half pounds actual material per 100 square yards of bed. These are permanent treatments and should have been applied at least 30 days before seeding and disked in. Summer or fall applications are preferred. This should give three years control.

Slugs (Snails): Metaldehyde baits, used at two pounds per 100 square yards of bed. This should be taken in handling sound plant bed.

Parathion, as a one percent dust, can be used, at the rate of one to two pounds per 100 square yards of bed. It should be dusted on and around plant beds in late afternoon; care should be taken in handling this material.

Bluestone lime, used for disease control, also is an effective control of slugs.

Handle all insecticides with care and follow labeled directions.

One-Shot Fruit Sprays Useful To Home Orchards:

A "one-shot" fruit tree spray is recommended for home orchards who want to protect their yard fruit trees at this time of year.

There are several commercial preparations available which will protect against a number of fruit-tree insects and diseases, says W. W. Magill, Kentucky Extension Service horticulturist.

The mixture—called general purpose sprays, or "package" sprays—are combinations of fungicides and insecticides which can be used on most fruits. Many homeowners, for instance, will have in their

backyards cherry, peach, apple or plum trees, grape vines, etc. The package type will control, for instance, apple and peach scab; the codling moth; peach and plum curculio insects; certain peach rots; black rot in grapes, and others. These pests and diseases are considered more important now than the insects, etc., against which dormant or winter sprays are used. It is probably too late now, to use dormant or winter sprays, Magill says.

Package-sprays will vary somewhat between manufacturers, Magill says, as far as mixing directions are concerned and dilution rates. For that reason, follow label directions carefully.

The "one-shot" preparations may be slightly more expensive he says but their utility makes the nominal extra cost worthwhile.

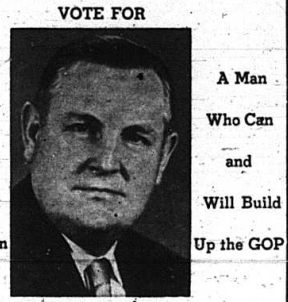

as an artificial lake for swimming and boating. Pit toilets, running water, and parking space with access to the highway are provided. Tables, ovens and firewood are in a shaded area of Cumberland National Forest. Electric outlets are provided for trailers.

General Butler—The camping area in this park near Carrollton is on the shores of a lake that provides swimming and boating. The lake has been stocked for fishing. The area is near the administration building, bathhouse and snack shop. Ovens, tables, firewood and tent platforms are available.

Levi Jackson Wilderness Road—This park on U. S. 25 south of London is in a wooded area near amusements, containing relics of pioneer life. A community building offers hot water showers and restrooms. Recreational opportunities are nearby. Electric outlets and water are in the area.

Lake Cumberland—This is a primitive camping facility. Camping is in a shaded area with parking space adjacent to the park lodge. The park air-

conditioned dining room serves delicious menus. Complete boat dock facilities are available. Entrance is on U. S. 127, 10 miles southeast of Jamestown.
